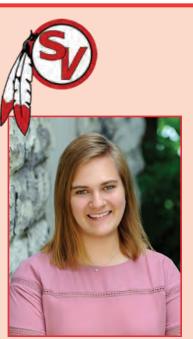

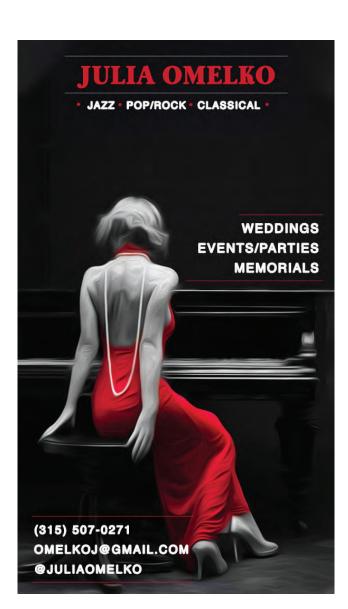

This is a continuing discussion of Legal Myths and Reality, because an informed citizen is always the most successful citizen:

MYTH: The New York State court system only reacts to issues that fit a particular mold. It is not proactive.

REALITY: Our modern state court system is very proactive, and seeks to help where needed. A good example is the Veterans Treatment Court. Everyone agrees that the men and women who have served our country in the military are true heroes and should be a source of inspiration. Sadly, they often serve multiple tours, sometimes without their families, and that can cause added stress. Not all can easily readjust to civilian life, and some have very little support system, in part because of frequent moves of residence. The incidence of mental illness and substance abuse among veterans is steadily increasing. This can result in legal troubles. In 2006, the concept of a Veterans Treatment Court was developed for New York State. The goal was to create a safe environment to help veterans in legal trouble regain stability, sobriety and good mental health. The courts are accessed through lower level trial courts whenever a criminal charge is pending. Through this procedure, the veteran and his/her issues come to the attention of the court system, and help can be offered.

Now there are 33 Veterans Treatment Courts across New York State, and over 400 across the U.S. Oneida County is fortunate to have such a court. These fall under the umbrella of "problem solving courts". They are making a difference in the lives of these heroes, who helped to make our lives safer. Sadly, 37 New York counties do not have such a court. In many cases it is because of lack of court finances. New York is considering a law that would permit veterans in this kind of trouble to go to an adjacent county for adjudication and treatment.

MYTH: A prosecutor in a criminal case can pick and choose which witnesses (s)he will call to testify at trial.

REALITY: There are various legal rules governing who the prosecution MAY call as a witness, and who they MUST call. There can be serious consequences if the rules are not followed. One of the required witnesses the prosecution must call to testify is called a "missing witness". If the accused is aware of a witness who might help the defense, then the accused must prove to the judge several facts in order to punish the prosecution case with the "missing witness" charge to the jury. They are: 1. there is a witness the prosecution did not call to testify, who has testimony to offer; 2. the testimony is on a critical issue; 3. the witness may testify favorably to the accused. If these factors are established, the judge must tell the jury about the existence of a "missing witness" who may offer testimony favorable to the accused. It's not difficult to imagine the effect on the jury verdict if it appears that the prosecution is hiding evidence favorable to the accused. If the judge does not advise the jury of the "missing witness" and the witness's expected testimony, even when the required factors have been shown to the judge, then the entire case can be reversed in the event of a conviction, and sent back to be retried.

The premise is that telling the jury that the prosecution withheld the information this missing witness may offer will tip the scale in favor of the accused and result in a verdict of not guilty. The idea is to keep the

prosecution honest, but only if the accused can show

the three steps have been met.

MYTH: When a child is conceived by artificial insemination using stored eggs and sperm for future

use, that child cannot inherit from a deceased genetic REALITY: Life truly used to be simpler. If a person leaves eggs or sperm for future use, and then dies, a

child can still be conceived by artificial insemination after the death of the donor. In November, 2014, New York State passed a law that such a child will be considered a "genetic child" and may inherit from the deceased parent if these four conditions are met: 1. the genetic parent must have said in writing no more than seven years before his/her death that the genetic material can be use after death; 2. notice of the existence of the genetic material must be given to the executor or administrator of the decedent's estate within seven months of the death; 3. the decedent/donor's writing about the material must be filed with Surrogate Court; and 4. the genetic child must be conceived within two years of the donor's death or born no later than 33 months after the death. If all these steps are met, then the genetic child can inherit from the genetic parent. The purpose, of course, is to allow for the support of the after-born child, while protecting the rights of other heirs. All of this should be discussed with your estate lawyer if you are considering leaving eggs or sperm for future use.

Giving attention to legal myths is not wrong. It can be a starting point for developing an interest in the law. However, if legal issues are important in your life, for instance regarding custody of your children or money payable for any reason, it is wise to consult a lawyer who can advise you on the truth of legal myths. ### **Americans:** All or None

Depending on what data we peruse, only 22-25% of Americans exercise regularly enough illicit any benefit. Being sedentary has become a national pastime. Bryant Stamford, a friend and

PhD in Exercise Physiology wrote a best selling book, several years ago titled "Fitness Without Exercise." His actuarial-like analysis suggested, if the vast majority of US citizens, who do not exercise, actually began performing household chores, like yard work, house cleaning etc., we could cut the cost of healthcare in our country dramatically. It's difficult to believe, nearly 80% of Americans do not exercise, but in our "device" filled culture, it may get worse, before it improves at

On the flip side, the 20+% that exercise regularly, most believe that "more is better." Although it is well documented, exercise reduces the risk of most physical maladies, improves one's mood and helps maintain a reasonable body weight, too much exercise offers its own disadvantages. Many of my orthopedic friends with a focus on Sports Medicine, attribute their filled weighting rooms to exercise induced, overuse injuries. Overuse injuries usually occur over time and repeated bouts of intense exercise. In 1979, while working on my Master's Degree in Exercise Physiology, I contracted mononucleosis. I was weight training six days a week and running 3-5 miles at least five days a week. I also, mistakenly thought "more was better." My immune system was simply overtaxed and given almost no time to recover. During my couple weeks of bed rest, I researched recovery and what is termed "super compensation." Our body's cardiovascular and musculoskeletal systems, when asked to perform at a high level, i.e., weight training, running etc., then allowed time to recover, super compensate by growing thicker and stronger, in order to prepare for the next physical challenge.

After my bout with mononucleosis, I began resistance training more intensely, on three, non-consecutive days a week. I ran 2-3 times a week for 2-3 miles. My progress was astounding, I felt energized and I couldn't wait for the next workout. Over the next 10 months, I won the Mr. Southeast USA and placed 2nd in the Mr. Kentucky.

In reality, exercise does little to improve one's physical condition. Adequate recovery, however, allows the body to heal and grow stronger. Results occur only after the body is allowed to recover. Some signs of overtraining include: \*Prolonged soreness, \*Stalled progress, \*Elevated resting pulse (elevated 7 beats/minute or more indicates at least a day of rest), \*Lethargy, \*Lack of enthusiasm, \*Actual muscle weakness.

The bottom line: Non exercisers need to simply move, household tasks will do for now. Avid exercisers must understand the signs of over training and grasp the all important concept of recovery.

## Our Lady of Lourdes/ **Notre Dame Elementary** Annual Bazaar

This year Our Lady of Lourdes Parish, on Genesee St., in Utica, NY, will hold their 2019 Bazaar to benefit the Parish and Notre Dame Elementary School using a New-Operating-Schedule. The Bazaar will begin on THURSDAY, August 22nd at 4PM with rides, games, food, entertainment and cash prize raffle tickets totaling \$7,500 and will continue on FRIDAY, the 23<sup>rd</sup> and SATURDAY, the 24th. Hours of operation are 4 – 11PM Thursday, 4-11PM Friday, and Noon to 11PM on Saturday when the Bazaar will shut down.

Friday features a fish fry dinner with many other choices available including pizza, sausage and peppers, clams, steak sandwiches, hot dogs, hamburgers and ice cream. Entertainment on Thursday is Frank Cannistra from 5:00 – 7:00PM, followed by Two of Us from 8:00 – 10PM. On Friday afternoon/evening Joe LaPaglia opens from 5 - 7PM and is followed by Showtime from 8:00 – 10:30PM. Saturday's music is by DJ Rob Kane from 5 – 7PM, followed by Nervous Rex from 8 – 10:30PM. Also, on Saturday at 10:30PM is the drawing for Saturday's on-site 50/50 raffle, the Basket Raffles, and the one grand prize raffle ticket drawing for \$5,000.

Again this year is Main Event Amusement's rides and games for kids and adults. 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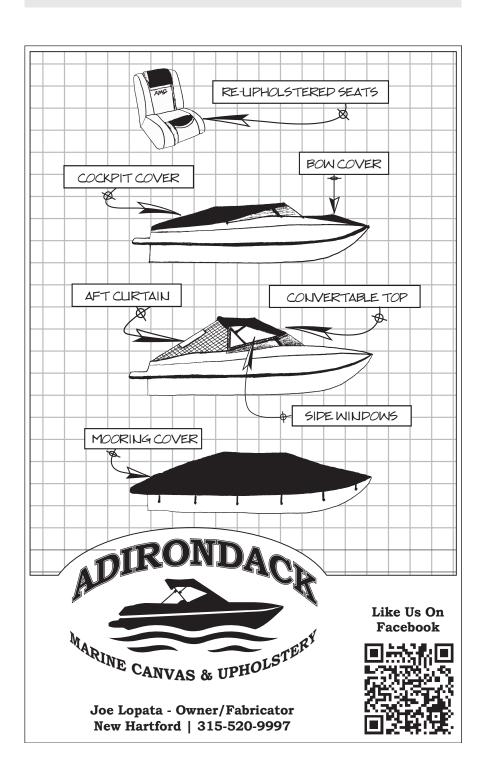

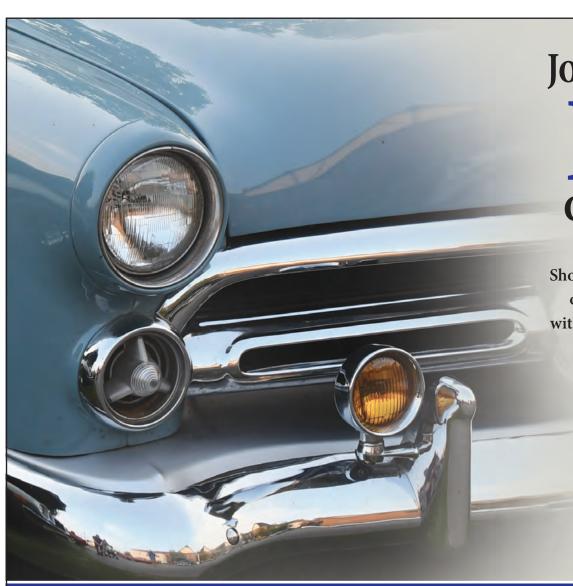
up a long week with co-workers or kicking off a fun-filled weekend with the family.

#### New Hartford Highway News Submitted by Highway Superintendent, Richard Sherman

The Highway Department has a busy schedule in the month of August. The compactors have been out picking up brush piles. Remember to place the brush so that the crews can grab it easily and place small items

I have had a lot of questions asking why we changed to compactors trucks picking up the green waste. The new trucks can compact up to around 10 tons before going to empty. When the trucks get filled, we go to Wurz Ave and drop off at the Oneida-Herkimer counties site and we handle the green waste once. The old way we had several brush trucks waiting to get filled by a front loader with a clam bucket. Sometimes divots were left when picking up the piles either in the lawns or shoulders of the road. The trucks would get filled, then they would bring the loads to the Town of New Hartford property, where we would accumulate a large pile of brush that we would have to get chipped

sometimes twice a year by a tub grinder. This operation took place it was time consuming and would require two front end loaders to push the brush to the chipper and another loader to pile the chips into a larger pile. So this operation required us to handle the brush three times. The NYS DEC required that we keep our site cleaned every year so we would handle the pile of chips for the fourth time during the winter and try to get rid of the chips. By picking up the green waste with compactors and taking them to the county, we are able to go back and pick up the grass clippings and dispose of them.

For the past couple of years the Town has been composting our leaves and now we have 2 year old compost. This compost is excellent and is free for our constituents to take. The pile of compost is outside our gates so that it is available any time for the constituents to pick up.

Our paving crew has been in town and slurred the roads that were paved last year. The paving crew will be here around July 8th to start work. The schedule got changed by the paving crew so that the smaller paving jobs went first and the bigger jobs will be done the end of August. This operation is quite in depth and will be taking a lane one at a time. The road will be milled to depth and new stone dumped in front of the paver with a tanker pumping new oil into the machine as new recycle pavement is laid. After this sets for a while, the new pavement will be sealed with a stone and oil mixture.

I have an update for the Chenango Rd Bridge. Lochner Engineering has been designing the repair for this bridge and obtaining the necessary permits from DEC and the Army Corp of Engineers. The permits take time to get approved. As I write this story permits still have not been issued. The bridge has gone out to bid awaiting bid opening and Town board approval. The money for the repair was obtained by a grant from Senator Griffo's office in the amount of 250,000.00 to fix the scouring damage underneath the New Hartford end of the bridge. This will include placement of extra heavy rip-rap stone or concrete blocks that will be drilled and pinned together. Heavy and medium size stone will be placed along the stream bank. The bridge is closed until this is repaired.

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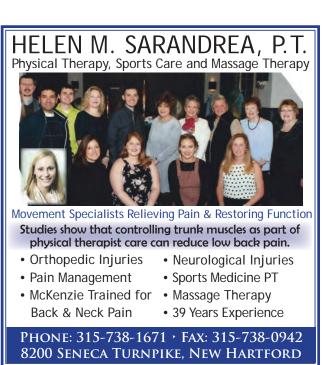

## **Sitrin Keeps Athletes in Balance with Concussion** Management

Each year, more than 1.6 million people experience concussions during sporting or recreational activities. Some estimates suggest as many as 3.8 million concussions occur each year overall. As many as 300,000 of those cases are sustained by high school athletes, and those who experience a concussion once are four to six times more likely to suffer a second time.

A concussion is a type of traumatic brain injury that causes temporary loss of normal brain function, and

brain operates. Typically, it is triggered by a sudden bump, blow, or jolt to the head or body that results in the brain quickly moving back and forth.

While the human skull protects the brain against penetrating trauma, it cannot absorb the impact of blunt force. Therefore, if a person's head is abruptly injured, the brain will make contact with the inner side of the skull, essentially bruising it and tearing its blood vessels. These injuries can cause the brain to swell, limiting blood flow and the necessary intake of oxygen and glucose. Brain swelling after a concussion can amplify the severity of the injury.

In many cases, there are no external signs of head trauma. However, internally there is an alternation of mental status. Though a person may not lose total consciousness after a concussion, he or she may demonstrate confusion, memory loss, imbalance, and delayed reflexes.

Moreover, mild brain injuries do not always show up in neurological examinations, which is why it is important to understand the signs and symptoms of a concussion. These include the inability to maintain a coherent stream of thought, heightened distractibility, vision disturbances, dizziness, and prolonged headache and nausea, among others.

"It is not uncommon for initial symptoms to resolve, only to return when an athlete exerts him or herself mentally and physically," says Dr. James Wallace, Director of Clinical Rehabilitation Services at Sitrin Health Care Center. "Proper care when a concussion first occurs is essential to prevent further injury or complications."

Program begins the healing right away after an injury. First, the program utilizes sensitive balance assessment technology to measure the stability of the whole body. > As a unique component of the program, baseline tests help facilitate improved return to play/school/ work decision-making. These, combined with other standardized assessment tools, allow for sensitive and specific testing that guide treatment recommendations and maximize outcomes. Sitrin's concussion specialists will create a supervised "return to play/learn" program for the athlete, a step-by-step progressive rehabilitation process to take that person from recovery to normal physical activities, as well as return to scholastic endeavors.

> Activities that take a great deal of concentration, such as sports, can cause concussion symptoms to reappear or worsen. Therefore, that team may determine it is best to limit activities that require high-levels of thinking, such as playing video games, reading, or using a computer, and then slowly increase these activities as symptoms lessen.

> "Active rest and rehabilitation are key to helping an athlete recover," says Wallace. "The brain needs optimal individualized treatment to heal after a concussion, which is why working with a medical professional is crucial."

#### MVCC to Host Aviation Career Day in Rome

Mohawk Valley Community College is hosting an Aviation Career Day from 2 to 4 p.m. Friday, Aug. 9, at the College's Aviation Training Center at Griffiss International Airport, 116 Langley Road, Rome. This event is open to those looking for careers in aviation maintenance and those interested in MVCC's aviation programs — an associate degree in Mechanical Technology: Aircraft Maintenance and an Airframe and Powerplant Technician certificate — and is free of charge.

All of MVCC's airline partners from New York will be present at the event to discuss career options and open positions, including CommutAir/United Express Airlines, JetBlue, Embraer, SkyWest Airlines, Bombardier Aerospace, Mercy Flight Central, and Piedmont Airlines/American Eagle Airlines. These employers cover aircraft manufacturers, airlines, and aftermarket aviation product manufacturing. Possible signing bonuses also will be available.

Airframe and Powerplant Program Director Walt Constantini, other instructors, and current students also

will be available to discuss MVCC's programs.

The FAA-authorized certificate program (Certificate #VXYT570K) is structured as a full-time, 40-hour-perweek training program that runs in three consecutive semesters. It is the only community college-based aviation maintenance program in New York State and one of only a few one-year programs in the country. Twenty-four-student cohort start dates include August 2019, January 2020, and April 2020. The program runs for 12 months and 2019 program cost for a New York State resident (without room and board costs) is \$17,300, which includes the required tool set.

Students gain hands-on experience with real equipment and four live jet aircraft. Based on MVCC's Rome, N.Y., campus, the majority of instruction takes place in the College's state-of-the-art aviation training center, located on the flight line of Griffiss International Airport. The center is about a half-mile from the full-service Rome Campus, which offers advising, financial aid, dining, and other student services.
