Keep Your Annuals Growing

I'm hoping that by the time you read this, the lawns have finally dried out enough to allow us to mow at a normal pace and that you have at least started to plant flowers and your vegetable garden!

Maintaining your annual plantings takes some work. It's not just a plant and walk away kind of deal. If properly cared for, your annuals should last well into the fall, or at least until mum time when you want to switch seasons.

best to thoroughly soak the root zone and then let it color! dry, but not to the point of wilt. If we allow our plants to wilt repeatedly, they will be weak and not have the bushy robust habit that is optimum. They will also be more prone to be attacked by insects and diseases. Let me repeat that fact; weakened plants are more likely to attract pests! This point alone should make you want to water your plants properly. Remember...not a small

amount of water everyday...a thorough soaking when needed is best.

Nothing will kill plants quicker than having their roots in standing water. Always remember to check that the drainage hole is not plugged in your pot, or if it's a new pot, that you remembered to "punch" out the drainage holes or remove the plug. Roots require air and water to thrive and you need the correct balance to have a healthy plant.

Fertilizing is a must. Now is the time to start fertilizing weekly with a water soluble fertilizer. Remember to fertilize even if the weather has been nothing but rain. You would think that it would make sense to wait until the soil dries out and then fertilize, but you really should fertilize the first sunny day after a rain...the soil in your container can only hold so much moisture....if you add more, the extra will come out the drain holes. If you add fertilizer, you will be forcing rain water out the drainage hole so that the roots will immediately begin sucking up much needed nutrients from the soil. The key is simply to remember to fertilize. You need proper nutrition, and so do your plants!

Yellowing leaves are a sign of either; too wet, too dry, too much fertlizer, or not enough fertilizer. When I tell customers this, they usually can tell me which one they suspect it is... they know what they have done!

Most annuals will benefit from a "haircut" or trimming to promote lush, bushy, new growth. This can be as simple as a "pinch", as what a coleus plant might need to keep the flowers from forming or as drastic as pruning back around a hanging basket because you are no longer able to keep it watered even with watering twice a day. Remember...if that hanging basket gets to be too much to maintain...simply replant it into a bigger pot and use it as a statement planter next to your First off, let's once again review the watering...it's front door or wherever you need a huge "splash" of

Great **Expectations**

Marketing combined with a generous amount of "mistruths," are present in nearly all fitness promotions. Unfortunately, it is doing more harm than good.

Crazy statements, like, "Lose 10 pounds your first week," dominate the airwaves and create unrealistic you automatically get your property back. expectations, yet generate huge profits. Fitness is truth, as it relates to fitness, nutrition etc.

weight loss=Fast weight gain. Slower loss=Fat loss.

Regular exercise is essential, yet using it exclusively as a fat loss method is painfully slow. It's important to remember, there are 3,500 calories in a pound of fat. Burning 500 calories in a 30-45 minute bout of exercise equates to a measly one pound loss every seven workouts. If combined with a 500 calorie a day caloric intake reduction, it is still a slow process. Increasing muscle mass with resistance training does allow our body to burn a few more calories during a workout and at rest.

*Enormous muscle gains are physiologically impossible: In spite of muscle magazine stories of large muscle gains, increases in lean tissue is also painfully slow. Experts tell us, lifetime lean muscle gains, without pharmacological aids (Steroids, Human Growth Hormones) will not exceed 15 pounds for men and 7 pounds for women.

*Aging is NOT a myth: Researchers report, the aging process begins at the age of 25. Loss of lean muscle, flexibility, muscular power, muscular strength, neuromuscular efficiency, bone tissue and cardiovascular performance is 2-3% per decade after age 30. Those who are sedentary may lose 4-5% per decade

*There is no "magic" machine that will get you fit in record time: Neither new nor preowned equipment can talk. Proper instruction is the most important ingredient in fitness improvement. Barbells, dumbbells, machines, rubber chords and any other resistance will produce lean muscle gains, if used properly. Equipment that involves the use of large muscles in a rhythmic fashion for 30+ minutes will also encourage cardiovascular improvement. Fitness equipment companies do not have to tell the truth and seldom do. They're in business to generate a profit, period. In addition, cardio machines are designed to overstate distance traveled, speed and calories burned in order to sell their product.

Fast of deed theft is when a bad actor identifies a homeowner facing foreclosure or other financial burden. The bad actor then pressures the victim homeowner to take part in a quick, cheap sale by pretending to be the authorities, or by making outrageous promises. The companies who engage in this often target seniors, homeowners struggling financially, and those for whom English is not their first language. Sometimes these bad actors will pretend to be police or government representatives. They will also claim that the deed transfer is only temporary. This is happening more often especially downstate where neighborhoods are being developing into upscale properties. But it can and does happen anywhere. A new bill has passed both the New York State Assembly and Senate, and is waiting for the Governor to sign. It provides, among other things, that if a district attorney successfully prosecutes the bad actor, so that he/she/ it has a criminal conviction for fraud regarding the homeowner's property, then the district attorney can ask the court to throw out the illegal deed and return the house/land to the owner victim. If this bill is signed or otherwise becomes law, those victims will finally be able to get their stolen property back. Without this law, they may not be able to get it back, even though they were innocent victims.

MYTH: New Yorkers are governed only by New York

REALITY: We are governed by many sets of laws. First and foremost are our State courts. State courts have "general" power, which means that they have the power to deal with cases of all kinds, including cases that involve interpretation of our New York State Constitution. They have many divisions, including Supreme Court, Family Court, County Court, Surrogate (deceased persons cases), etc. All cities have a City Court, often divided into other courts including Veterans Court, Debtors Court, Drug Court, Housing Court, etc. Each town and village is entitled to have a court with the power to hear minor criminal cases, minor property disputes, and traffic cases. Clearly the variety of cases across the State is varied and covers nearly every facet of life in this State. New York State courts hear more than three million cases every year.

Those living in New York State are also subject to Federal laws. Federal Courts handle alleged violations of federal laws, including some federal crimes, and lawsuits among people and corporations.

called courts of "limited" power because they can only handle cases that are governed by the U.S. Constitution, and federal laws such as the Bankruptcy Code, and including cases between residents or businesses of different states. The courts are divided into districts. In New York State we have four District Courts, the Southern, Northern, Eastern, and Western. They are often referred to by initials, that is, the Southern District of New York (SDNY), and the Northern District of New York (NDNY), etc. In this area we are governed by the NDNY. The SDNY is often in the political news lately because they hear cases coming out of parts of New York City. The US has 94 District Courts.

MYTH: Asking your lawyer to hold or disburse your money is risky business.

REALITY: Under the ethical rules that govern all lawyers, there is no risk. A lawyer is held to a very high standard when he/she holds a client's money in escrow. The lawyer must keep records of all deposits into or withdrawals from any escrow account, including the date of each deposit or withdrawal, to whom it was disbursed, and a description of each disbursement. The lawyer must keep all related bank statements, and all other related bank documents. The account must be for each individual client only, and the funds cannot be mixed with other clients' money. A lawyer may delegate an employee, such as a bookkeeper or secretary, to be responsible for the escrow account. However, the lawyer must adequately supervise the work of the non-lawyer. A client should feel free to ask his/her lawyer for a full accounting of the money and the lawyer must quickly respond to the request. Failure in any of these areas will subject the lawyer to discipline, including suspension or revocation of the license to practice law.

Giving attention to legal myths is not wrong. It can be a starting point for developing an interest in the law. However, if legal issues are important in your life, for instance regarding custody of your children or money payable for any reason, it is wise to consult a lawyer who can advise you on the truth of legal myths. 

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

As the police department and town courts finish their move into the new Town Hall, I would like to take a moment to discuss the different ways that

residents can contact departments and/or services within the Town. The new Town Hall offers "onestop" convenience for residents to access multiple departments and/or services. While residents have always been able to contact town departments in person or by telephone, residents can now contact departments through the town website or through email. Residents can report concerns directly through the town's website. Residents and businesses can also sign up for an account with the Customer Portal which allows registered users to subscribe to email newsletters; subscribe to meeting calendars and event calendars; update contact information for non-emergency communication; and create, track, and manage nonemergency service requests and direct those requests to the appropriate department. The police department and parks & recreation department maintain Facebook pages. Court fees, dog license fees, reserving park pavilions, and registering for park recreation programs can all be done online. The Town Clerk has posted the various forms and permits on the town website which

allows residents or vendors to print the forms from the on the phone, holding public meetings, or visiting them in convenience of home or the office. The Town Supervisor and Town Board members can be contacted by phone or email as well. As always, please contact me with any suggestions, questions, or concerns you may have. 
their back yard. I believe it's the job of the Councilman to advocate for all my neighbors in the 4th Ward and to act as an ambassador of good will for the town."

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
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

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New Hartford Highway News

The Highway Department has a busy schedule in the month of June. The street sweepers have been out cleaning streets for spring cleanup. The compactors have been out picking up brush piles along with the leaf truck to pick up the leaves left over from the fall.

The month of June will be our curbside pickup. Ward 1 will be June 3rd thru June 7th. Ward 2 will be June 10th thru June 14th. Ward 3 will be 17th thru June 21st. and Ward 4 will be 24th thru June 28th. Please put out the items for curbside

the week that we are coming through, not ahead of time.

On the June 8^{th} drop off at the Highway garage we will have our annual shredding from CONFIDATA DESTRUCTION SERVICE 8:00am-12:00pm. The only drop off in the month of June is June 8^{th} 8:00-12:00. The Monday drop off will resume on July 1^{st} .

The New Hartford Library will be hosting the annual TOUCH THE TRUCK on June $8^{\text{th}}\ 10:00\text{AM}$ TO 12:00PM

Also in the month of June I have been prioritizing the roads based upon the limited financial resources available. The Highway crews will begin road work on approximately 8.6 miles of town roads. Some of the roads that we will be working on are:

Gun Safes

Gun owners; how secure are your firearms? Whether you have one,

two, or one hundred, your firearms should be secured in a 'real' safe. As far as we're concerned, cabinets and lock boxes just don't cut it. Rifles, pistols, shotguns, and the like should all be kept in a fire and burglary rated gun safe to be kept out of the hands of thieves and children alike. Gun safes and firearm storage containers come in many different sizes with different options to accessorize and customize to your needs. Most gun safes have a one or one and a half hour fire rating. Most gun safes also come standard with either a mechanical or electronic combination lock. Liberty, Gardall, Amsec, Cannon, and Sentry are just a few of the well known and most common gun safe manufacturers. Gun safes can be used for other things, too. Almost all safes are big enough to include room for paper and file storage, jewelry, watches, family heirlooms, and other valuable items that you'd normally keep locked up in safes that are just too small and or unsecure for your weapons. The 'higher end' safes will come with things like door organizers for your pistols and weapon accessories, bow racks, interior lighting, and dehumidifiers. Some Liberty safes come with an electronics hub on the inside of the safe to power up the interior of the safe to store and charge your electronics at the same time. There's also antenna ports and auxiliary jacks so you can store your camera system's DVR inside, or even your internet hardware. Let's talk locks. You primarily have two options when it comes to the lock on your gun safe; mechanical or electronic. There are benefits to each, and even though our primary recommendation is mechanical, here are some tips to help you decide. Mechanical locks require low maintenance and no batteries, therefore they are generally deemed more reliable. No electronics to fail means you know that your lock will open almost 100% of the time (leaving some leeway, because even mechanical locks can fail.. sometimes). The downside to mechanical is that you have to dial the combination in a 4, 3, 2, 1 sequence (most times). This means that you will need a light at night, glasses if you wear them, and that card with the combination on it out of your wallet. If you are in a panic, have jittery hands, or you're just the type of person who prefers keys over combinations, maybe an electronic lock is a better option for you. Keep in mind, however, that you now have to change out batteries, and don't worry, you can change them from the outside of the safe with the best locks (we recommend doing so as often as you change your smoke alarm batteries, which should be twice a year). Additionally, most higher end safes do not come with key overrides, so if something should fail with the electronics, your safe lock will likely have to be drilled open. That being said, we do not always recommend that you store your home defense weapon(s) in a gun safe with a mechanical lock. Safe manufacturers make 'quick access' containers for handguns and shotguns alike. In fact, there are some pretty cool options out there. For instance, Amsec's pistol boxes offer a mechanical push button combination lock for ease of use. This makes storing a handgun and smaller items like a flashlight and keys safe and rapidly accessible in the event of an emergency. In addition, you can get an under-the-bed safe for storage of the same things as well as a rifle or shotgun. These are bolted down under the bed and utilize a slide out tray. Hornady's RAPiD wall mount safe allows for secure storage of a rifle or shotgun and comes with six different ways to open the safe. Fingerprint, key, keypad, RFID bracelet, key fob, or sticker. Those are some easy ways to secure your firearms for rapid deployment. 



Ten Questions Answered About Utica's Irish Cultural Center

Submitted by Peter A. Karl III, Vice President and Counsel to the ICC along with being President of the Great American Irish Festival

- 1 What is the Irish Cultural Center of the Mohawk
- It is a 21,000 square foot multi-use facility encompassing a museum, event center and an authentic 19th century Irish tavern-restaurant located at 623 Columbia Street, Utica, NY.
- 2 Why was the location in Utica's Brewery District chosen?

It is the location of the first Irish Catholic Church in Utica (St. Patrick's) which subsequently merged with St. Joseph's. During the excavation stonework from the original Church's foundation was preserved in order to be used on the site.

3 - Who is the owner of the realty?

The owner of the realty is the Irish Cultural Center (ICC) of the Mohawk Valley, Inc., a 501(c)(3) charitable organization. The ICC owns a separate for profit entity, Five Points Hospitality, Inc. that operates the tavern-restaurant and event center. As a result, all applicable taxes including real property assessments will be paid by Five Points.

4 - What type of cultural activities are anticipated at the facility?

It is projected that a wide range of Irish cultural activities will be held at the ICC ranging from Irish music, movies and dance performances. In addition, the building will be the headquarters for the nearly dozen Mohawk Valley Irish organizations who currently do not have any central location.

5 - What is the overall goal of the Irish Cultural Center?

The purpose is to educate the public of the rich history of the Irish over the last couple of centuries in Upstate New York and nationally.

Is the ICC open to the public? Yes, the entire facility is open to the public. The Irish tavern and restaurant will be open daily from 11AM. The event center is available to host a number of activities such as wedding receptions, reunions, and business meetings. The event center has a capacity of 285 attendees with the ability to be separated into three separate smaller rooms.

7 - What will the tavern/restaurant feature?

The tavern restaurant portion of the ICC, the Five Points Public House, was named after the epicenter of the Irish in New York City during the late 1800's because of the NYC location being at the intersection of five streets. The ICC has the same five corner configuration at one end of Utica's Brewery District.

Five Points will be offering an American and Irish menu. There will be an outdoor patio while inside there is a music stage for performers. All of the furniture, tile, wooden bar and room dividers were built in Ireland and shipped in three containers to Utica in order to provide patrons the feel of a 19th Century establishment in Dublin.

8 - What will the second floor museum offer?

Initially there will be exhibits displayed which will be borrowed from other Irish museums from across the country. Subsequently, the museum will feature displays of Upstate NY Irish history which items will be donated or loaned to the ICC.

9 - When will the ICC be operational?

Events have been scheduled for June including a wedding reception and college alumni dinner which functions are being catered by Pat O'Connor of A Moveable Feast. The Five Points Public House will be opened upon the issuance of a NYS liquor license (noting that a grand opening weekend is being planned for mid July).

10 - Where can additional information be obtained for the scheduling of events or programs being offered by the ICC?




















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Tommy Goodelle Places Third in Nation

Devon calls the connection "absolutely, truly organic as it unfolded and [forming the band] was obviously the next step."

. You have a Morgan silver dollar that was Aminted at the Carson City, NV mint. That is what the initials signify. The Carson City mint was created to handle the huge silver supply from the famous Comstock Lode, the largest silver strike in the nation's history. Morgan silver dollars with the "CC" mint mark are highly collectible and are very desireable. As to value, with coins, condition is the key, and while it is not possible to judge your coins condition from a photograph alone, it appears not to be in the most sought after "almost uncirculated" and "brilliant uncirculated" conditions, which command the highest prices. Carson City silver dollars are, however, getting harder to find, and as a coin gets increasingly scarcer, even those in lesser condition rise in value. My guess based on the condition I think your coin would fall in, it would be valued in the \$50-75 range. I suggest seeking out a coin dealer who could give you a more expert opinion. At any rate, you have a great piece of Americana with an interesting history, not to mention the sentimental value of it being a family keepsake.

Q have a sheet music cabinet that is made of mahogany. It has a label on the back from the Larkin Co. What can you tell me about it?

A. Your Larkin sheet music cabinet was found in many Victorian era homes. Your's appears to from the early 1900's. The sheet music stand was one of the staples of the Larkin firm in that period, which started as a soap company, based in Buffalo. They originally gave away the furniture, which included tables, chairs, ice boxes and of course, sheet music cabinets as a premium for buying their soap products. It is an amazing story of an ingenious marketing plan. Larkin furniture pieces with their label intact are highly desireable today.





Other alarms include explosions, carbon monoxide, smoke or sprinkler detector activations.

The figures above do not include other activities by members of the department such as Fire Prevention details, training, parades, Open House and other various department committee meetings that take place throughout the year.

Be Safe this Summer

Summertime has arrived and presents your New Hartford Volunteer Fire Department with calls for assistance, which are unique to warm weather conditions. Please keep these hazards in mind when enjoying a safe summer.

Lawn Mower:

Never allow a child to ride with the operator of a garden tractor mower. And, never allow anyone (especially children) to be present in the immediate area of any operating lawn mower. Flying stones or objects can injure or kill bystanders. Always wear substantial footwear when operating any lawn equipment. Never be barefoot!

Swimming Pools:

If you have a backyard swimming pool always secure the access gate to the pool. Keep all electrical devices well away from the edge of the pool at all times. A ground fault detector is required by New York State Electrical codes for all outdoor electrical receptacles. And, do not allow children's 4-wheeled walkers in the patio or deck area as children may walk them into the

Safe storage of pool chemicals is always a must. Chemicals should be stored in a dry, cool, well ventilated, location and preferably not within the residence. Small rescues are overwhelmed with the oil, dirty rags or any foreign matter. Dispose of all empty containers properly.

Outdoor Grills:

According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) three out of five households own a gas grill. And, the latest information shows that an average of 8,800 home fires are caused by grilling and close to half of all injuries involving grills are due to thermal burns. While nearly half of the people grill year-round, July is the peak month followed by May, June and August.

When starting your outdoor grilling there are a few safety tips we would like to pass along to ensure an enjoyable summer for everyone while reducing the risk of injury.

Propane and charcoal grills should only be used

Keep items that could catch fire away from the grill

Use long handled utensils;

Placement of the grill should be well away from your home, deck railings, and out from under the eaves and overhanging branches;

Keep children and pets at least three feet away from

Keep clothing away from the flame;

Maintain keeping your grill clean at all times. Remove any grease or fat that builds up on grates and trays;

Never leave your grill unattended.

In addition, regarding gas grills, we recommend that you always check the major connection points between the gas (propane) tank and cylinder, and where the hose Some of the calls listed above - such as Fires, EMS, connects to the burners and tighten if necessary. To

Apply a light soap and water solution to the hose

Turn the tank on and if there is a gas leak, the propane will release bubbles around the hose and big enough

If there are no bubbles, your grill is safe to use;

If there are bubbles, turn off the tank and check the connections. If the leak continues, have your grill serviced by a professional before using again.

If the leak doesn't stop...call the fire department. When the gas grill is on...

As you are cooking, if you smell gas, turn off the gas tank and burners;

If the leak stops immediately, get the grill serviced;

If the smell continues, move away from the grill and call the 911 and do not move the grill.

Regarding charcoal grills:

There are several ways to start a charcoal grill. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the grill using newspapers as fuel;

If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire;

Keep charcoal out of the reach of children and away from any heart source;

There are electric starters too. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use if you use these devices;

When you finish grilling, be sure the coals are completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

Small Rescues – **Big Challenges**

The number of abandoned, neglected and abused cats amount of cats and kittens arriving daily. The laws for cats in New York State are non-existent, and the problems small rescues face because of this are shutting

One of the biggest problems we face today is animal abuse and neglect. Cats and kittens are dumped, abandoned, and killed with little or no hope of finding the persons responsible. As well, our laws do not require owners to spay, neuter, or license and microchip their pets. Because of this, cats are considered disposable.

Another problem that arises from not having mandatory spay/neuter, licensing and micro-chipping laws in place is that anyone claiming a rescued cat in our care can do so without any proof of ownership. If someone chooses to claim one of our rescues, we have no legal standing to retain the cat, and expenses for their care are lost, as well.

We are often attacked on social media and accused of stealing pets. We have no resources to protect ourselves from damaging accusations from people who claim they own the cat, although they can provide no proof of ownership. Indeed, social media has become a rescue's nightmare. We are often labeled as thieves, liars, scam artists, frauds and much worse ... simply because we cannot prove ownership of a particular cat. This can and has affected our ability to raise funds for our legitimate non-profit rescues. Filing harassment charges against the offenders does little to stop this. Instead, the rescues are told not to engage and to stop posting, when that is one of our only financial resources to continue to help the animals in our care. Meanwhile, the abusers are left to damage our reputations and characters without consequences.

We are a small rescue that has recently fallen victim to all of the above and more. We recently filed a neglect case with the ASPCA and were harassed on social media with damaging effects. The person who caused this had no proof of ownership. The cat was not returned to the acclaimed owner, but not before the damage to our rescue was done. Because of the nonexistent laws for cats, our mouths are gagged and our hands are tied. However, our feet are not bound. We can and will stand and fight for better laws.

One of the most difficult obstacles in dealing with animal abuse is the unsubstantial AG & Markets Laws as they are written. Legislation needs to be passed requiring all cat owners spay/neuter, license and microchip their pets - only then will many of these issues cease to exist.

We ask for your help ... call our local politicians to ask for a bill to be passed for mandatory spay/neutering, licensing and microchipping for all cats.

Downshifting From life in Overdrive

A favorite former boss of mine, affectionately known as MAC, carried a lot of responsibility in her position. She would occasionally post a sign on her door that said, "Unless you are Denzel Washington, don't even think about knocking on this door." Although she typically had an open-door policy, this was her time to dig in, focus and get caught up, undisturbed. While we may believe that multitasking is a necessary evil for efficiency, in truth we make more mistakes and are 40% less efficient.

When you ask someone how they've been, how often do you hear, "So busy!"? Busyness is a badge of honor today. More than ever we worship productivity and are slave to our back-to-back calendars and endless to-do lists.

Allowing ourselves to be over-scheduled can lead to being over-stressed, overweight, overtired and just plain overwhelmed.

We rarely step outside of the frenetic pace and question our choices. What if you weren't so busy? What if your goal was to downshift from your life in overdrive, creating more time and energy for what matters most in your life? What if you decided to reevaluate every single thing you do, determining if it fits your life now? Does it contribute to the goals you are pursing today (assuming you've paused long enough to set goals)? And if not, how would it feel to say, "I'm not going to do that because I have other priorities I am pursuing."?

Some people think of self-care as getting a massage or a pedicure, and those certainly can be examples, but to me self-care is doing what's best for me on a regular basis, whether I feel like it or not. Choose to step off of the treadmill of over-scheduled, recharge your batteries, define what's best for you in this phase of your life, identify what tasks need to stay and what tasks should be deleted, and have the courage to make the changes.



Four Ways to Invest More Confidently in a Volatile Market

When financial markets fluctuate, even the calmest investors can start to question their financial strategies. But volatile markets can present opportunities, says Tracie McMillion, head of global asset allocation strategy for Wells Fargo Investment Institute (WFII).

"Financial markets are frequently volatile—that's their nature," she says. "Over longer periods of time, that volatility can add up to attractive portfolio growth."

McMillion shares an analogy that compares this worry to seasickness: "If you stare at the waves directly ahead of you (the current financial market), the water may look bumpy and turbulent, and you might feel ill at ease. However, if you look outward at the horizon (your long-term investment goals), the ocean as a whole appears to be on a fairly even keel."

In addition to focusing on your financial horizon, regularly with your advisor." here are some strategies you can use to help weather economically turbulent times.

1. Match your investments to your time horizon. The simplest way to feel more comfortable about your investments is to align them with your financial calendar, no matter what happens in the financial world this month or year. For example, do you need some of your money fairly soon, or want it close at hand in case of an emergency? If so, McMillion says you should consider investments such as cash holdings and short-term bonds that shouldn't lose much, if any, value over the short term.

On the other hand, if you won't need some of your investment money until you retire multiple years in the future, equities or longer-term bonds are worth a closer look. Those investments carry more risks but also offer potentially better returns.

2. Know what to expect from your assets. Some rights reserved. investors lose confidence because they don't fully understand how their investments work. In that case,

McMillion says, some knowledge of typical asset behavior is a good thing.

Consider reading up on different types of investments and asking questions of your financial advisor. Once you know how your investments are more likely to perform in certain financial markets, you can help ensure that your investment strategy is in line with your tolerance for risk.

3. Tune out the noise. By "noise" McMillion means the constant barrage of financial reports from the 24/7 news media. "It's common for the financial markets to temporarily get a little bit messy as they sort through the current news cycle," she says.

However, investors usually don't need to react to the everyday financial news, no matter how topsy-turvy things may seem. "Remember: The U.S. news tends to report on a very small slice of available investments, particularly U.S. large company stocks," she says. "Your portfolio, if it's diversified as it should be, probably isn't going up and down to the same degree as these stocks. Your portfolio changes are probably much more moderate."

4. Regularly revisit your plan. There's no such thing as a completely set-it-and-forget-it investment strategy, McMillion says. It's always smart to check in regularly with your investment advisor. "Your life circumstances may change, or your financial goals could shift," she says. "You'll feel much more confident that your investments are doing their job if you review them regularly with your advisor."


