

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Realistic Fitness Goals

THE most influential component in achievement is also the most overlooked and misunderstood. Several years ago, I presented to a group of healthcare professionals and made a

statement that what humans can achieve is about 40% genetically predisposed. At the conclusion of my talk, a veteran physician complimented me on the presentation, with one caveat, he believed 50% or more is genetically predisposed. Anyway, the composition of our human genome and the set of genes housed in twenty-three pairs of chromosomes is our physical launching pad for human development. Each chromosome contains several thousand genes (stories). The human body contains about 100 trillion cells that carry out our genetic mission.

Each muscle contains both white (fast twitch) and red (slow twitch) muscle fibers. Other types of fibers are present that tend to take on characteristics based on the type of physical training we do. Tendons, running from a muscle's origin are attached at different locations on bones. The origin and insertion of muscles determines the efficiency of our body's lever system.

Nerves run from the brain to each muscle and stimulate varied levels of muscular contractions. Where and how much fat we store is another factor. Leaner individuals possess less excess tissue to carry through physical tasks. Muscle fiber type, origin and insertion of muscles, neuromuscular efficiency and leanness are the primary contributors for our body's ability to perform. All of these are handed down to us though generations of our ancestors.

World class athletes are first of all, genetically gifted. Because of this gift, results tend to come easier to them than us "normals". Results fuel the performance flame and position these "genetic freaks" for physical success. I once trained with a friend who frequently ate 2-3 donuts for breakfast, two Big Mac's for lunch and anything he wanted for dinner. He was 3% body fat, bench pressed 450 pounds and squatted 650 pounds. To say he was genetically gifted was an understatement. On the flip side, another friend followed a Spartan dietary program, worked out much harder than my "gifted" training partner, maxed out on the bench press at 295 pounds and squatted 385 pounds. He was the same weight as the the "gifted" one but sported 15% body fat.

All of this should assist you in setting realistic goals, based on your heredity. Genes, handed down to us are a "non-negotiable. We get what we get! With proper training, following a prudent diet and allowing for adequate recovery, you can become the best possible YOU. A sure recipe for disaster is to compare yourself with others, especially those who are genetically gifted.

This is a continuing discussion of Legal Myths and Reality, because an informed citizen is always the most successful citizen:

MYTH: Adults adopted in childhood in New York State may never find information about their birth parents.

REALITY: A birth parent's right to privacy is more and more taking second place to the child's right to know. In June, 2019, New York State passed two bills that address this issue. Previously a parent's right to privacy when giving up a child for adoption was protected from disclosure to anyone. Now a new bill allows an adoptee over age 18 to obtain the long-form birth certificate. This certificate contains the full names and addresses of the birth parents. Adoptees have been seeking such information for many years. Some have spent large sums of money to find this information, often without success. To many adoptees, having the information is more important than ever as science tells us more and more about genetics, such as tendency to a particular illness or disease. In the past, if you have the money, you can obtain this information with the help of private detectives. This bill, still unsigned by the Governor, will allow access to all without the cost of a private detective.

A second bill passed by the Legislature and not yet signed by the Governor is the Preserving Family Bonds Act. This law will apply when parental rights to a child were cut off by court order and a child was permanently removed from the parent's care. Under this law a Family Court judge can decide whether or not a child can contact the birth parents in such cases. The judge will consider, after proof, if such contact with birth parents may be harmful to the child. However, some studies show that such contact is mostly good for children, depending, among other things, on the age of the children. The hope is that the access may help prevent the child from self-harming, and may give the child access to family medical history. The judge will decide whether the contact would be in the child's best interest, which is the standard for most important child decisions around the world, not just in the U.S.

MYTH: If one who is injured and successfully sues wins a money judgement, then little further action is required to collect the judgement.

REALITY: From time to time a defendant person or corporation tries to hide assets before, during, or after a lawsuit. They do so in order to avoid having to pay a money judgement to a successful plaintiff. This is especially relevant now when there may be big judgements coming against the Catholic Church or the Boy Scouts, among others. A person who has been sexually abused can now sue the abuser more easily than in the past. A defendant my transfer his/her/its assets to relatives, friends, or others, or may

go bankrupt to avoid paying the judgement to the successful plaintiff. Right now a successful plaintiff trying to collect the judgement must prove in court that the defendant's transfer of assets was done with the purpose of FRAUDULENTLY defeating a judgement. An example of such a claim would be a fatal car accident where the guilty party transfers a house, savings, etc. to a spouse or third party to avoid paying the judgement. In other words, the successful plaintiff must prove what was in the defendant's mind when the transfer was made. Not so easily done in many circumstances.

The New York State Legislature has passed a bill to assist the plaintiff in collecting the judgement. The Governor has not signed the bill, so it is not yet law, and may not become law. The bill, called the Uniform Voidable Transactions Act, would provide assistance to those seeking to collect a money judgement where assets have been transferred. This law would make collecting the judgement easier.

The New York State Court system has assigned 45 judges in different counties to handle lawsuits that target individuals accused of abuse, including the Catholic Church, the Boy Scouts, certain schools, daycare centers and organizations representing foster care parents. Collecting a judgment where there has been a fraudulent transfer of assets may become less difficult and not as slow as it currently is. Those receiving the fraudulently transferred assets as well as those making the transfer may be subjected to deposition under oath, as well as other procedures to determine if the transfer was fraudulent.

MYTH: The Board of Elections in any particular county is not required to follow mandatory rules.

REALITY: The Board of Elections is composed of workers who have been recommended by the Democrat and Republican parties. No third parties are represented. Some believe that the Boards should be civil service appointments, and not politically appointed. However appointed, each Board is bound by strict laws and regulations. Since the two major parties are equally represented, there are checks and balances. Each person watches every other person! No ballot can even be moved anywhere without a representative from each party accompanying the ballot. It may be appropriate to rehaul some of the rules to bring the Boards into this century. But essentially the checks and balances work well, and, with minor changes, should continue to serve the State well into this century.

Giving attention to legal myths is not wrong. It can be a starting point for developing an interest in the law. However, if legal issues are important in your life, for instance regarding custody of your children or money payable for any reason, it is wise to consult a lawyer who can advise you on the truth of legal myths. 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

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




The VILLAGE of New Hartford will have a curbside junk pick-up on October 14, 2019. Materials must be at the curb by 6:00 a.m. on October 14th and sorted into separate piles as listed below:

- Please note anything longer than 8' feet will NOT be collected.
- Collection limits for categories #1) Household Junk and #2) Sanitary Waste are each limited to a pile not to exceed 4' wide 8' long and 3' high.
- 1) Household Junk: Lumber bundled, piled parallel with the roadway, roofing and plaster in containers weighing 60 lbs. or less, furniture without fabric, porcelain sinks and toilets, and storm windows;
- 2) Sanitary Waste: clothes, bedding, stuffed furniture, hardcover books, empty paint cans with lids removed, and toys;
- 3) Metal: major appliances and metal products;
- 4) Tires: tires must be off rims and no larger than 16". No large truck or tractor tires.

The DPW will NOT accept:

- 1) Recyclable materials, lumber exceeding the limit stated above, and shingles not contained. For construction and demolition projects, please contact the Village DPW or a private waste hauler to make arrangements for a dumpster.
- 2) Propane cylinders, liquids, such as paints, thinners, waste oil, herbicides, and pesticides may be disposed of at the Oneida Herkimer County drop site per their collection schedule. For more information, call 315-733-1224.

From October 1st through November 15th leaves will be collected loose at the curb once weekly. Please keep leaves separate from brush pile.

Plastic bags used for leaves and green waste will not be collected.

Limbs must be under 12" in diameter and less than 6' long for collection.

Please do not pile material in the roadway.

Compost is available free of charge while supplies last and can be picked up outside the Village hardfill dump located at the end of Graham Ave. Bring a shovel and containers.




Stanley Presents moe. New Year's Concerts

Councilman James Messa **Dear Residents:**

It's amazing that the fall season is upon us and over the past several months a lot has transpired. I would like to take this opportunity to update you on a few items that were accomplished in the 1st Ward.

Grange Hill Storm Water Project

I'm pleased to announce that the final phase of this project has been completed and tested. This was a project that I spearheaded and advocated for as this area had experienced severe flooding over the years. I've had full board support since I introduced the need for this project as it helps businesses and residential homes in Chadwicks. Unfortunately, projects of this magnitude take time to complete and I would like to thank the residents and business owners for their patience and support during the construction phases.

FEMA Project - Oneida St.

The FEMA Project for the demolition of homes, leveling the ground/planting grass and putting in new sidewalks in those sections has been completed. Unfortunately, FEMA does not allow future building on these parcels due to the buyouts so they will remain a grassy area.

Unsafe Buildings

There have been a few structures in the 1st Ward that met the criteria of our new law "Unsafe Building". I was instrumental in the creation of this law. We had Utica and New Hartford line and one on Irving Ave.

Major Paving Projects

Grange Hill

Snowden Hill

These were two major roads that were in very bad conditions for motorists, school buses and our highway vehicles They are heavily traveled roads and were becoming a safety issue.

Oneida Street Paving Project (Multi-Year Plan)

I have prepared and presented to the town board during our September 18th meeting a multi-year plan to pave Oneida St over the course of three years. The road measures approximately 3.1 miles and through my proposed plan, we would pave a 1 mile section each year over the course of three years. In my proposal, I would have the paving start where the Town of Paris line meets the Town of New Hartford line in Chadwicks and move towards the Utica line. This road is another heavily traveled road by many as there are a number of residential homes and business properties on that street. I will be contacting our NYS and Oneida County elected officials to see if there are any grants or funding



Neighborhood Traffic and Speeding

Shorter days and cooler temperatures mean fall is officially here. It is a good reminder to travel through our neighborhoods safely. Sometimes the town board receives concerns about speed and traffic issues in the neighborhoods. When we receive a concern, they are turned over to the police department. The police department may deploy the radar-speed trailer to encourage residents to comply with the speed limits. The police department may also increase patrols for speed enforcements. If commercial vehicles are speeding and/or not following other traffic laws, then they can call the company and put in a complaint.

Residents may wonder why the town board does not just lower speed limits or put up stop signs since other strategies only provide temporary results. The town does not have the authority to establish speed limits (linear, area, or school zones); this authority rests solely with New York State Department of Transportation. A linear speed limit is one which applies only on a two structures demolished, one on Oneida St near the specific road or highway; by state law, no such linear speed limit, other than a school speed zone, may be less than 25 mph. An area speed limit applies to all streets and roads in a specific area; by state laws, area speed limits cannot be less than 30 mph. If the town board were to establish speed limits less than 30 mph, the town would be violating state law and such speed limits could not be enforced.

> Speed bumps and speed humps can be used to slow drivers down and increase driver awareness, but they are not without disadvantages. Speed bumps and speed humps may cause damage to vehicles, increase emergency response times, increase traffic noise, and impede snow removal.

> There is no strategy that will end speeding in the neighborhoods. Increased police patrols, routine deployment of the radar-speed trailer, and increased signage may reduce speeding and increase driver awareness albeit temporarily. Residents need to be mindful of their speeds as they travel throughout the town. As summer draws to a conclusion I want to thank the many residents that helped us with their brush pickup by placing it at the road. It has been a very busy season with brush starting in the month of April and here we are 6 months later in September. We are winding down on the brush but still will be picking up green waste, dead flowers, and waste from vegetable gardens. I am putting together a pot hole crew that will be using the new machine that was purchased last month. There are a lot of pot holes that need to be filled.

Leaf removal will begin as warranted in the months of October and November. So please get your leaves to the curb-roadside early. Don't wait. If you think you might have a larger than normal leaf pile, please call us and let us know so that we can ensure that the truck is empty so that it can take your entire pile of leaves. Please do not place leaves in plastic bags or containers such as plastic garbage cans. The two new trucks will be out daily and will add an evening shift as necessary to get the leaves picked up in a timely manner. Please do not place articles such as brush, pumpkins, and rocks in with the leaves as the machines impeller fan will be damaged, causing down time on the machine in our busiest season.

Our sewer truck will be out cleaning our sewer lines of grease debris by our restaurant corridors. We want these cleaned going into the winter months. The town still has a few large catch basin repairs this fall that are on our list to be finished along with cleaning catch basins until the winter season arrives.

The town has our engineer designing a new detention pond in the area of Foxcroft and Hubbardton Road area. The Town Highway Department will be working to clear the property, vegetation and building a roadway to the construction site hopefully this fall. On Concord Blvd, there will be a rebuilding of a new Pump Station with new pumps, electrical panel, and a new diesel generator to keep the station running when it loses power. This went out to bid and Beebe Construction Company was low bid for \$146,530.00. This will be replaced this fall 2019.

The Chenango Bridge finally went out to bid and Central Paving won the low bid of \$320,255.00. The work was started on September 5th and is continuing until finished. 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



Financial Windfall? Consider These 6 Actions First

If you recently came into a substantial amount of money, you might be tempted to start spending that financial windfall right away. But whether the money is from an inheritance, the sale of a business, life insurance proceeds, a major bonus, or some other means, you should consider the long-term consequences (and potential benefits) before you start spending, says Kyle Fuehne, a Financial Planning Consultant with Wells Fargo Advisors.

"Often, people don't spend enough time thinking through what they want to do," Fuehne says. "They just jump in and start spending. But the money always goes quicker than you expect."

Fuehne offers this advice on making sure you're getting the most out of your financial windfall.

Consider the tax implications. Fuehne recommends consulting a certified public accountant or tax specialist to learn the steps you should take to help minimize the potential tax burden of your windfall. Laws governing inheritance tax vary by state, for example. Different types of assets have different tax implications, and your tax rate will depend on what kind of windfall you received and where you received it.

Consider stashing it somewhere smart for the short term. Consider placing your cash somewhere stable, such as in a money market account or even a short-term CD, which offer better returns than most savings accounts.

Consider investing, even slowly. "It's okay if it takes one or two years to invest it all," Fuehne says. "Investing slowly over time can allow you to implement a dollar-cost averaging strategy, which is an investment technique designed to help protect against a big downturn."

List your goals and priorities. You may have an immediate need or wish, such as paying for a child's wedding or paying off a college loan. But consider how that will impact future financial needs. Would you be better off paying off your mortgage, for example? Could this impact your ability to retire early? Do you want to start a business? You may want to talk to a financial advisor about these short- and long-term goals and how the windfall fits into your overall plan. You can even ask to run tests of your plan in different market environments to gauge its effectiveness.

Update your estate planning and gifting plans. If you want to share your wealth with loved ones, you can give someone up to \$15,000 a year without paying gift tax under current law. Also consider updating your estate plan. Setting up a trust is probably the best way to provide for your family and



can advise you about the different types of trusts and help you choose the best one for your family.

Consider alternative ways to give to charity. When considering the tax impact of your windfall, you may want to give appreciated stocks or concentrated equity positions to be more tax efficient versus donating directly, Fuehne says.

Two additional options:

A donor-advised fund, which gives you a tax deduction now but lets you make a long-term impact.

A charitable remainder trust lets you make a donation to the trust, and then it would make monthly payments to you. After a specified time or at your passing, the remaining assets in the trust would go to a charitable beneficiary.


