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Just Do It

Nike's famous slogan, "Just do it" is appropriate in describing America's inability to stick with exercise and diet. Americans, without question, have the most opportunities to engage in regular exercise and to follow a prudent nutritional lifestyle than any other civilized country in the world. Home equipment

sales have skyrocketed during our COVID-19 pandemic. Most fitness facilities have survived, even with stringent government restrictions. Unless you have been quarantined in rural Siberia, you, along with everyone, have a general knowledge of what to do to get in shape and reach your ideal body weight. Expert's project, however, that within a few years, nearly half of Americans will be classified as obese. Why do we struggle with fitness compliance?

Although the body is designed to move, it requires a personal commitment to exert some amount of energy. The Industrial Revolution, technology, the internet and a wide variety of human energy savers provides us with every opportunity to become chronically sedentary.

Fitness marketing promotes a "quick fix" mindset. When expectations are not met, we move on to the next "quick fix" solution and repeat the cycle for decades. Even at the cellular level, results are frustratingly slow. Patience is NOT something we as a nation possess. Failed, restrictive diets, over time, cause our body's set point (a weight where it is most comfortable) to creep up and fat storage becomes the body's way of protecting itself.

Enormous amounts of calories can be consumed in a matter of minutes. Although fast food restaurants offer more healthy choices than ever, we have become addicted to the taste of less healthy foods. Habitually poor nutritional choices have become a habit that's difficult to break. Hectic lifestyles leave little time for home cooked, nutritionally sound meals. Our "grab and go" food choices contribute to fat storage, clogged arteries and overall poor health. So, what's the answer?

Understand, there is no panacea, as it relates to what type of exercise you choose. With respect to cardiovascular exercise, all that matters is your heart rate and the time you spend at that elevated heart rate. The body cannot distinguish what type of exercise is being done. It only responds with an increase in heart rate, in order to deliver oxygenated blood to working muscles. It's essential that you select a mode of exercise that's relatively enjoyable. Walking, for example, is something nearly everyone can do. It's inexpensive and safe.

Complete focus on what type and how much food we ingest is essential to reaching our ideal body weight. It's important to understand that severely restrictive diets cannot work. Our body is too smart to be fooled by such behavior. It will simply slow down to conserve. Modest restriction, in the form of portion control, is and always will be the answer to long term weight management.

Slow down. The appestat center of our brain, located in the hypothalamus, requires 20 minutes to register satiety (fullness). Shoveling down food at a rapid pace is a recipe for fat storage. One way to outsmart the appestat center is to eat a small, protein rich snack and drink a glass of water a few minutes before a meal. Hydration is essential because the appestat center often confuses thirst with hunger. Woody Allen once said, "80% of success in life is just showing up." Showing up to exercise each day, even if you don't feel like it, will produce fitness success. Paying attention to what goes into your mouth is essential and probably more important than physical exercise.


examples that brought hope to the region in the past.



This is a continuing discussion of Legal Myths and Reality, because those informed are always the most successful. Please note: Senator Sam Ervin, chair of the Senate Select Committee on Watergate in the preface to their report pointed out that the law is not self-executing. It must be executed by humans. And therefore, it must not be in the hands of those who are not faithful to it.

MYTH: In New York State children as young as seven should be and are answerable the same as adults who commit a crime.

REALITY: In 2019, at least 800 New York children were arrested by police for committing a serious crime. It appears that about 90 percent were minority children. Up to the end of December, 2021, anyone between the ages of 7 and 18 could be charged with committing a crime as a juvenile delinquent. This meant that they could be subject to the adult criminal justice system to answer for alleged serious crimes. Governor Kathy Hocul recently signed a bill that raises the lower age of the state's jurisdiction for juvenile delinquency. Now the youngest age that someone can be charged and prosecuted as an adult is 12 years old, not 7. The hope of Legislators is to lessen the trauma a young child may face as the result of being in the adult criminal justice system, and to set up a "differential response program" for those under 12 years of age within local social services departments. Their mission is to bring services to the child and the child's family to try to resolve issues that led the young child to commit the acts which would be crimes if the child were an adult.

MYTH: Our legal system (common law) comes entirely from the English system.

system, and therefore ours, was influenced in its formative years by several other and different ways of looking at and developing a legal system. Recently, legal scholars have carefully studied and compared the Islam Sharia system of law with ours. They have

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been influenced by Sharia in significant ways.

Our common law was developing slowly in England in the 1100's, under the Norman conquerors. At the same time the Normans who brought our system to England in 1066 were also conquering Greek, Roman and Arab southern Italy and Sicily. They developed a country that became known as the Kingdom of the Two Sicilies. (If you are of Italian heritage and have blue eyes, you may have this Norman Crusader gene!) This was a very enlightened society where Greeks, Arabs, Christians and others lived and worked side by side in peace. They became the wealthiest kingdom in Europe, largely because of peace, diversity, and trade. They traded extensively with England, and required a common legal code, especially in the area of maritime law and contracts. Since Sharia law (Islam law code) was predominant in Sicily, it would have been nearly impossible for the English merchants not to have adopted parts of it and been influenced by it.

Current legal scholars studying the development of common law isolated the various areas in which Sharia law and common law were the same or similar in the 1100's. One major area of Sharia influence was in the development of the jury system, unknown in the rest of Europe at that time. The scholars made comparisons in a particular way. For example: they isolated the nine steps to create a binding and enforceable common law contract. Of those nine steps, seven of the steps are the same as in Sharia law. By contrast, civil law in the rest of Europe only matched up with English law in three steps.

The legal scholars' conclusion is that our common law was directly influenced by Sharia law as practiced in what became the Kingdom of the Two Sicilies in the 1100 and 1200's. MYTH: In the event, hopefully rare, that a prosecutor commits misconduct against a New Yorker in a criminal REALITY: While this is true to a point, the English prosecution, the New Yorker has nowhere to turn to complain.

> REALITY: Historically, a defendant who believes that the prosecutor against him/her committed an specific case

reached the conclusion that our legal system may have ethical violation that had a bad effect on the defendant's conviction would have nowhere to turn except to an

appeals court. In the end of 2021, Governor Kathy Hocul fulfilled the law made by the Legislature in late, 2021, creating an independent commission to govern prosecutors' conduct. The Commission has been given the authority to conduct hearings, send subpoenas, examine witnesses, and require the production of records and evidence. Ultimately, the Commission may make recommendations based on the evidence to the Attorney Grievance Committee and the Governor to advance the process further. The Attorney Grievance Committee has the authority to suspend or remove the attorney's license to practice law.

The Governor recently appointed three men to the commission (no women). When fully implemented, the Commission will have eleven members. Four of them will be appointed by the Governor, two by the State Senate, two by the State Assembly, along with the three just appointed. The Governor is required to appoint two retired judges (one from the defense and one from the prosecution sides of the law), and one full time law professor or dean who has experience in criminal law.

This is the second time that the Legislature has addressed the issue of prosecutorial conduct. The first law was passed in 2018. This law was struck down by a court on the grounds that the law was a violation of the separation of powers between the executive branch (the governor and all offices appointed by and derived from the governor) and the legislative branch (the New York State Assembly and the New York State Senate). Many hope that this new law has corrected the errors of the 2018 law.

Both laws were opposed by the District Attorneys Association of the State of New York. This organization believes that district attorneys and assistant district attorneys can capably govern, control and police themselves. The legislators, defense counsels, and Governor disagree.

Attention to legal myths is not wrong. It can be a starting point for developing an interest in the law. However, if specific legal issues are important in your life, for instance, regarding custody of children or money payable for any reason, it is wise to consult a lawyer who can advise you on the truth of legal myths. 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





Every country in the world faces environmental issues. Rotary empowers people to take measurable action to protect the environment with informed, sustainable, and community-based solutions that prevent the causes and address the effects of climate change.

Although this newest area of focus was approved in 2020, Rotary members have been involved in environmental projects for years. Through other areas of focus, such as community economic development and water, sanitation, and hygiene, Rotary has allocated more than \$18 million in global grants that have a positive impact on the environment. We are aligned with the UN Sustainable Development Goals, which include a call to protect the planet.

What a Rotary club can do.

Clubs around the world are reducing the amount of plastic they use at meetings and events: The Rotary Club of Bandar Sungal Petani, Kedah, Malaysia, worked with its meeting venue to offer pitchers of water and reusable cups instead of plastic bottles; Members of the Rotary E-Club of 9790 in Australia sponsored the Rotary Community Corps of Plasticwise Beechworth. In 2019, the RCC diverted 545 cubic feet of plastic from landfills; The Rotary Club of Walhekarwadi, Maharashtra, India rents stainless steel dinnerware for its meetings and events; The Rotary Club of Annapolis, Maryland, USA, worked with an environmental organization and a composting company to make its annual crab feast zero-waste for the past seven years. The event uses compostable cups, trays, and utensils, and composts all food waste. In recent years, more that 14.5 tons of waste has been composted; At its annual Ribfest, the Rotary Club of Guelph, Ontario, Canada, has a free water-refilling station and sells branded reusable bottles.

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
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Schedule a Yearly Physical Therapy 'Checkup' to Take Charge of Your Health

Yearly visits to the primary care physician and the dentist are often scheduled six months to one year in advance, and have become non-negotiable annual health "checkups." The impact of these visits on your health cannot be underestimated, however, you might be overlooking the health of other parts of the body that are vital to proper function and form. When you make the healthcare rounds this year, consider adding a trip to the physical therapist to the list.

Physical therapists are trained to address the specific needs of your musculoskeletal system, which is comprised of your muscles, bones, cartilage, tendons, ligaments, joints and other connective tissues. An annual PT "checkup" can ensure that these essential internal structures are working together to support, stabilize and move your body. During an annual visit, a PT will gather the patient's health history and perform a series of test and measures, including a screening of the musculoskeletal, neuromuscular and cardiovascular systems.

Research shows that by performing several types of movement screens, including Gray Cook's Functional Movement Screen, physical therapists can more fully assess their patients' functional movement patterns and interpret their strengths and weaknesses. According to a study called "Assessing movement using a variety of movement screens," it's important for PTs to combine several movement screening tools to capture a complete picture of the patient's abilities and limitations.

Whether you're an elite athlete or just getting started with an exercise program, clinical screening tools help PTs understand how your body performs during a series of movements. Based on the information gathered, the PT is equipped to design an individualized program to prevent injuries.

The tests and screens that a PT might perform during an annual checkup to assess your strength, stability and mobility are not all that different from what you can expect during an annual exam with your primary care physician.


Just as PTs do, physicians follow a checklist: Check your blood pressure, listen to your heart and check your oxygen level, and then collect blood and urine samples to identify or rule out health issues like high cholesterol or metabolic disorders like diabetes. The information collected can be compared with last year's results to reveal any inconsistencies that could signal problems. Similarly, during an annual physical therapy appointment, your PT captures an overall picture of your musculoskeletal health that can be compared from year to year.

According to NFPA (Ahrens and Evarts, 2020), local fire departments responded to an estimated 1.3 million fires in 2019. These fires caused roughly 3,700 civilian fire deaths and 16,600 reported civilian fire injuries. Property damage was estimated at \$14.8 billion.

On average, a fire department responded to a fire somewhere in the US every 24 seconds in 2019. A home structure fire was reported every 93 seconds, a home fire death occurred every three hours and 10 minutes, and a home fire injury occurred every 43 minutes.

In 2019 a civilian was fatally injured in a fire every two hours and 22 minutes. Every 32 minutes, a civilian suffered a non-fatal fire injury.

Fire risk management practice can reduce the possibility of fire in the home, which in turn reduces the likelihood of a fire related injury.

When cooking, make fire safety a priority by keeping these tips in mind: Be alert; if you are sleepy or have consumed alcohol, don't use the oven or stovetop.

Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, grilling, boiling or broiling food. When simmering, baking or roasting, check the food regularly, remain in the kitchen while cooking and use a timer.

Keep anything that can catch fire away from your stovetop.

Heating is the second leading cause of home fires. Follow these tips:

Keep all flammables, like paper, clothing, bedding, drapes or rugs, at least 3 feet from a space heater, stove or fireplace.

Never leave portable heaters and fireplaces unattended; turn off heaters and make sure fireplace embers are extinguished before leaving the room.

If you must use a space heater, place it on a level, nonflammable surface, like ceramic tile, not on a rug or carpet.

Keep children and pets away from space heaters.

When buying a space heater, look for models that shut off automatically if the heater falls over.

In addition to cooking, other top causes of fires include smoking, electrical problems and candles. To minimize risks:

Institute a "no smoking" policy in the house.

Check all cords and replace any that are frayed or have bare wires.

Switch to flameless candles.

Keep matches and lighters high and out of children's reach in a locked cabinet.

Working Smoke Alarms Are a Must. Smoke alarms are a key part of a home fire escape plan providing early warning reducing your risk of dying in a fire. The National Fire Protection Administration recommends you:

Install smoke alarms on every level of your home, inside bedrooms and outside sleeping areas on the ceiling or high on the wall.

Keep smoke alarms away from the kitchen, at least 10 feet from the stove, to reduce false alarms.

Use special alarms with strobe lights and bed shakers for people who are hard of hearing or deaf.

Test smoke alarms monthly.

Replace batteries annually, and change the batteries in your carbon monoxide detector at the same time.

Replace smoke alarms that are 10 or more years old.



Occasionally the heavy wet snow we are plowing on your road may affect your mailbox. We apologize for the inconvenience but are happy to stop by and be sure to repair or reset the mailbox. We just need you to let us know. As we do every year, we will also be out to reseed or repair lawns near the road which were damaged due to plowing, as well as sweeping roads throughout the Town. This is all weather dependent and takes about 4 weeks to complete throughout the Town.

Straightening our Town stop, yield and street signs also are a priority. Additionally in March, your Highway Department also looks to trim trees that hang over roadways to prepare for the new growth.

We are working diligently to get the new 2022 green waste and brush schedule out in the mail by the middle of March and pick-up will commence Monday April 4th for brush pickup. This schedule will be on the Town's web site and in the mailer.

Trash drop-off to your Highway Garage will begin Monday, April 4th from 7:00- 2:00 and will be Mondays ONLY through to fall except for the month of June when your entire Highway Crew will be out in your neighborhoods for our annual curbside pick-up. If Monday is a holiday the drop-off will be on Tuesday.

Please refer to the schedule for what is included.

Again this year, we are happy to announce that we are continuing weekly (Monday) pick up at your residence if you opt to purchase a tag from the Town Clerk's Office by Friday before the scheduled Monday. The tags this year are still \$5.00 per item and a great value if you have that occasional large item that you need to get rid of prior to, or after, the June curbside pick-up. Tags can be purchased at our Town Clerk's Office located at 8635 Clinton Street at Town Hall the old Gander Mountain Building from 8:00am- 4:00pm.



A. What you have is a whale oil lamp. We know that based on the size of the receptacle, which was much smaller in whale oil lamps. Yours is a great example of this important item from our past. I would value it at \$100.

Q. I have a collection of 38 political campaign buttons that are framed under glass. They have been hanging on the wall in our den for as long as I can remember but I don't know their origin. They start with McKinley and go to Humphrey for President. Do you know anything about them and what they might be worth?

A. I do know something about your campaign pins. They were issued by the Standard Oil Company during the Presidential election of 1972. You got one of the pins for every fill-up of gas. Later the company offered the frames for displaying the entire set. Although you have a great display piece, due to the large number of these that were produced, the value is only around \$20-30.

Q. I bought this blue pitcher with Shirley Temple on it at a garage sale several years ago. I can't remember what I paid for it but I'm curious what it might be worth?

A. Your cobalt blue depression glass pitcher was just one of a myriad of glass items bearing the image of the iconic child star. Yours was produced in the 1940's by the Hazel-Atlas Glass Company of Wheeling, West Virginia. Here again, the fact that these items were mass produced and widely distributed, their value in today's market is affected. I would place a value of \$25 on your pitcher.

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

Bass-who wrote and directed the inspiring family drama-made sure the film would be shown at the Marquee Cinema in New Hartford so his family, friends, and everyone else living where he grew up could see it.

"With a nationwide release opening in my own hometown where my dream actually started-that's really special. I've come full circle," said Bass, a 1974 Notre Dame High School graduate who was born in Utica and grew up in both the city and town of Frankfort. "I would be honored if people in this area would support my cinematic creative endeavor and find it worthy of their time."

Rated PG, Tyson's Run is the inspiring story of a 15-year-old home-schooled boy who doesn't let autism hold him back. He attends public school for the first time and, to mend a rift between his parents and make his family whole again, aspires to become a marathon champion. Through the process, he learns that with faith, belief in himself, perseverance, and the support of those who understand him, anything is possible.

If one parent's reaction after an audience test-screen is any indication, Bass's story will resonate with its audience. The man approached Bass to say the movie had inspired him to be a better father to his teen-aged daughter with Downs Syndrome. He began to cry and hugged Bass before wrapping his arm around the daughter and exiting the theater.

In his personal life, Dodson parallels his character in several ways. He's on the autism spectrum, was homeschooled, and overcame his own challenges to become a successful actor.

"He initially began acting as a means of therapy to open up and express himself," Bass said. "Until this film, Major had never set foot in a public school. He also wasn't a runner before taking this role and did all his own running in the film."

Bass said the inspiration for the story came from a little boy who lost his joy of running and wanted to give it up because he couldn't keep up with the other boys.

"Sometimes winning a race is about more than speed," he said. "It's about heart and determination and belief in yourself."

Bass-the third of six children born to Juanita (Holmes) Bass of Frankfort and the late Clarence Bass, Jr.—likened his own journey to the transitional arc that Tyson goes through.

"There I was, a young kid in Utica in the early '60s with no reason to believe I could do any of this," he said, referring his film career. "It was an unrealistic dream, but my mom always encouraged me to go for it. She said, 'Not only do you want to do it, you're going to do it!'—and I absolutely believed it.

"It didn't matter what others said. I've always believed that with enough effort and faith in yourself and with support from those who care about you, you can achieve anything," Bass said. "With love and support from my family and friends and with faith in myself, I have a career in a field I love."

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





CNY Drones, the New York State / Region II US Drone Soccer Affiliate is happy to focus our efforts on the 2022 US Drone Soccer Season! We took the dive with the support of some great organizations & are deep into helping teams get started!

Drone soccer is an exciting e-sport for middle/high school students designed to enhance drone building skills & flying technique through exciting, full-contact team robotics game strategy. Matches consist of 2 teams of 5 players in a 10'x20' fully enclosed field. Practice fields are easily set up in classrooms. Official competition arenas can be set up in a gym or building lobby. The sport was developed in Asia & is spreading Worldwide with teams forming the US, Canada, Nigeria & Spain. US Drone Soccer was recently sanctioned by the Academy of Model Aeronautics (AMA).

Regionally supported by the Air Force Research Lab in Rome, TACNY, & SUNY Polytechnic Institute, CNY Drones is working with the SUNY AMA Student Club to host the first annual New York State / Region II Championship (announced earlier as April 23, 2022). We're in the process of securing Sunday, April 3, 2022 in Utica to better align with the National event. Competitive qualifying teams will have an opportunity to move on to the National/World Championship in Colorado on Sunday, May 1, 2022.

Middle School/High School, BOCES & after-school program teams can easily jump into the sport requiring minimal practice space and prep. US Drone Soccer can be set up as an intramural sport, camp, or competitive program. Who is already involved? In Central New York, Rome Free Academy has tapped their Mohawk Valley Community College Gear Up Program to start 2 teams. Griffiss Institute is looking at adding drone soccer camps to their wildly popular summer programs. Farther south, our friends at the New York City Police Department are preparing to bring drone soccer to the five boroughs as an after school program. Hmmmm. That could work here too! Consider These Three Suggestions if you **Inherit a Trust**

David "Chico" Esparza, Senior Fiduciary Advisory Specialist with Wells Fargo Private Bank, remembers meeting two clients, a brother and sister whose parents had passed away. "Unfortunately, their parents had not discussed their estate plans with the adult children. When the siblings learned they were the beneficiaries of a sizable trust," Esparza recalls, "they had no idea what to do next."

The brother and sister had many questions. Who handles the estate? What are the terms of the trust? And what should their next steps be? "Wells Fargo Bank, N.A., was the trustee, so we explained the timeline and process for settling the trust estate," Esparza says. "It helped to ease their minds to know that professionals would be handling everything."

As Esparza's clients found, stepping into the role of beneficiary can feel a bit like stepping into the unknown. Here, Esparza offers three suggestions to ease the process.

1. Build an advisory team

A good first step for the beneficiary is to meet with the trustee who is tasked with executing the terms of the trust. It may be an individual, such as a CPA or lawyer, family member, or a corporate trustee.

"There will be a lot of questions, so it's important to establish a communication plan and a general timeframe for how long it will take to settle the estate," Esparza says.

In some instances, once the estate is settled, a new trust is funded with the beneficiary's share of the estate; in other cases, assets will be distributed outright to the beneficiary. If the assets will be retained in trust, the trustee typically collaborates with an investment advisor to help manage the assets according to the terms of the trust.

"The trustee and investment advisor will create a plan that is based on the terms of the trust and considers the needs of the beneficiary," Esparza says. "Beneficiaries also should consider seeking the guidance of a tax consultant regarding tax implications related to trust distribution."

2. Understand the terms of the trust

One of the first questions a beneficiary might have for the advisory team is, "What does the trust mean

3. Ask questions before taking distributions

"Before taking a trust distribution, some beneficiaries find it useful to inquire about the potential tax consequences. That's where a tax advisor should provide guidance," Esparza says. "Beneficiaries also may consider consulting with the trustee and investment advisor about additional considerations or impacts a trust distribution may have." In addition, beneficiaries should consult with their own legal counsel if they have specific questions regarding their rights with respect to a trust or the possible impact of a trust distribution.

Esparza shares the story of a young beneficiary who wanted to use her trust fund to purchase a luxury car when she turned 16. "As trustee, I posed this question: 'Would a less-expensive car meet your transportation goals and preserve trust assets for the long term?" he says. "It is important for beneficiaries to stay connected with the trustee and to ask clarifying questions so they understand the impact certain distributions may have to the trust. As a fiduciary, a trustee is there to educate and can help the trust sustain longer term financial wellbeing for the beneficiary."

Esparza explains that a trust is a useful tool for holding, managing, and distributing property as outlined by the trustor(s) — the creator(s) of the trust — in the trust agreement, but each trust is unique in how assets can be distributed to beneficiaries. It is important to understand the terms of the trust. Some key trust aspects to discuss include:

· Beneficiary or beneficiaries: Is there a sole or several beneficiaries of the trust? How do the terms address the rights different beneficiaries have to distributions from the trust?

· Age restrictions: Does the beneficiary have to reach a certain age before accessing some or all of the trust?

Distribution restrictions: Can beneficiaries access the principal or just the income from the trust? Does the beneficiary need to provide the trustee with proof of the beneficiary's own income and expenses to receive distributions? What categories of expenses can the trust cover for the beneficiary? For what reasons may distributions be adjusted?
