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

We are currently accepting newer fiction & non-fiction hardbound and paperback books and magazines. As well as records, DVDs, Children's books, puzzles and games.

We DO NOT accept moldy/damaged books, textbooks, medical books, encyclopedias, Reader's Digest Condensed books, National Geographic magazines, and multi-volume book sets. We are also no longer accepting Audio cassettes, VHS tapes, and Computer games/books.

This is a major fundraiser for the Friends to assist the library in buying quality materials and in providing programs especially for our youth. Your support is very important.

Outdoor Book Locker

Upstate University Hospital's Mammography Van

The Mammography van will return to the New Hartford Public Library at 2 Library Lane in New Hartford, on Tuesday, May 30, 2023. The screenings will be available between 9:30 a.m. and 4 p.m. Appointments are recommended for women who want to get a mammogram, to ensure they will be seen that day. To schedule an appointment for a mammogram with the van, women should call 315-464-2588. Appointments can also be requested online at: www. upstate.edu/noexcuses.

To be eligible for a mammogram on the van, women should be 40 years and older; not have had a mammogram in the past 12 months; and not be experiencing breast problems.

The mobile mammography program was started through New York State's "Get Screened, No Excuses" Breast Cancer Initiative, and continues with the support of Upstate University Hospital. The program aim is to get rid of obstacles to breast cancer screening for women in New York. The average rate for screening mammography in New York is 81 percent.

The mammography van is equipped with a state-ofthe art 3D digital mammogram system, private exam room, dressing rooms and a waiting room.

Breast cancer is one of the most common cancers in women, effecting one in 8 women. It is also one of the most treatable cancers when detected early. Mammograms—x-rays of the breasts—are the most effective screening procedure for the early signs of breast cancer. For information, contact: Wendy Hunt at 315-492-3353.

An Online Conversation with Danny Morrison

Join us at The H.A.R.P. Museum at the Irish Cultural Center of the Mohawk Valley or from the comfort of your own home on Wednesday April 26 6:00 PM for a conversation, via Zoom, with former Sinn Féin spokesperson Danny Morrison.

Few Irish can forget the Irish Long Kesh Prison hunger strikes of the 1980's that left an indelible mark on Ireland's struggle with Great Britain. It was an event that held the world spellbound and would change the face of Irish politics forever cementing Sinn Féin's standing as a major political party in Ireland. At the age of 22, Danny was the editor of the Sinn Féin newspaper, Republican News and later would become editor of An Phoblacht/Republican News. Having served time himself in Long Kesh, he became the spokesperson for Bobby Sands and others during the 1981 hunger strikes which would later that year take the lives of Sands and his comrades. Danny's penchant for writing soon led to the publication of several books on the struggles faced at the hands of British oppression.

You can attend this presentation at the H.A.R.P. Museum located on the second floor of the Irish Cultural Center of the Mohawk Valley, 623 Columbia St, Utica or from the comfort of your own home. A brief history of Death Cafe:





New Hartford Highway News

The 2023 Season Dumpster – Drop-Off Collection Schedule is complete. This year's schedule will be mailed to every constituent and home address it will not be in the April Town Crier like in the past. Remember, our program this spring is expected to begin April 3rd and end September 29th. For pickup items for the Highway Garage, you need to purchase tags for the Highway Crew to pick up those items at your home. Remember if you want items picked up you must see the Town Clerk and purchase a tag by the last Friday of the month. The cost will remain the same as last year \$5.00 per item. The Town Clerk's Office is open Monday-Friday 8:00am to 4:00pm. Additionally,

we will have the dumpster drop off along with the tag pick up for the months of April, May, June, July, August, and September. The regular drop off is still every Monday 6:30 -2:00. This year's curbside trash pickup has been moved to the month of October. In this year's flyer there was a small mistake made where it talks about the curbside schedule under the one time pickup. This should have October's dates not June's. I apologize for any inconvenience.

The Highway Department is asking every residence to PLEASE use containers (garbage cans) for the brush (branches) etc. and green waste so that the container can be dumped in the compactor. The larger tree limbs can be 6" in diameter and 6-8" in length. Place the limbs in a neat pile at the edge of the roadway. If you have a tree come down that is larger, call the Highway Department to schedule an appointment and we will stop by with the chipper and chip the larger limbs. The brush trucks have a boom with a grapple on the end of the boom for picking up brush. Please do not put out any rocks, metal, or any kind of objects in the brush and green waste piles or they will not be picked up.

The Storm water projects are moving forward and as soon as the weather permits, the Highway Department will be starting on Tanglewood Rd to finish up last year's project. The contractor on the Mud Creek project will be back to finish up the Mud Creek project around the dam. The town crew will be working in the back yards off of Stone Bridge Rd cleaning out an old retention pond that has not worked in years. The crew will also build two retention basins around the Roman Rd and Hughes Lane area for stormwater. This will be our huge stormwater project for this year.

Our winter shifts will end on March 31st and the crew will start the day shift on April 3rd. The spring cleaning will start on April 3rd with street sweeping along with cleaning of the sidewalks, and the brush trucks will start on that same date.

Please welcome our new secretary to the Highway Department, Sue Keller, who will be answering our phones and the day-to-day issues that may arise.

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

Changes in the Weather Mean Changes to Your Exercise

When the weather gets cold, you should make some changes to how you exercise. We're not talking about starting earlier because of the shorter days or making a playlist that motivates you to leave your warm house. There are some physiological changes that occur in your body in the cold that you need to consider. Joints become stiffer, your body reduces blood flow to your skin and muscles to stay warm, and your heart has to work a little harder. This doesn't mean that you shouldn't be active in the cold, it just means there are a few changes in your routine that are warranted. Here are a few:

Warm up well

A good warm up is always important to get your heart rate up, more blood to your muscles, and your aerobic system started. In the cold, it's even more important because of the changes we just listed. To start, get your heart rate up with a brisk walk or light jog. Follow that with a dynamic warm up rather than static stretches. Things like walking or jogging while pulling your knees up high to your chest, high kicks in front of you with straight knees to get your hamstrings loosened, or a walking lunge with an upper body twist can get you ready for more intense activity. Cater your warm up to what you have planned in your workout. If you're not sure how it should look, ask your physical therapist!

Stay hydrated

Drink water before, during, and after your workout. The temperature may be down, but you'll still sweat and you'll still lose water vapor in your breath. The drier air in winter makes your sweat evaporate quickly, so it's easy to underestimate how much fluid you've lost.

Cool down

When you're done, don't rush inside. Cool down properly. Keep moving with a walk or another form of active recovery to let your heart rate come down. A cool down also helps your muscles to transition back to a relaxed state and can reduce soreness following your workout. After exercise is the right place for static stretching. You can also head inside for some foam rolling or self massage.

The shorter days and lower temperatures don't mean you're stuck inside. If you follow these tips, you can safely keep moving outside. If you'd like a customized warm up or cool down, or have questions about your exercise routine, your physical therapist is a great person to ask!









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




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Kids These Days

It was the summer of 1980 and I was out nearly every lunch hour and most nights speaking to a variety of groups in order to sell "pre-opening" memberships. Those membership sales would be used to collateralize our new business loan. Fran Keyes, the coach of the Roback Angels, invited me to talk to his local baseball team. He said there would be several adults (parents) in attendance that might be interested in joining the All-American Fitness Center. After my 12-minute speech, a guy named Roger approached me in order to sign up his 13-year old son, Mark. I responded firmly that "we wouldn't allow anyone under 18 years of age in our facility." He was determined to get his son involved in a fitness program at our center. I struggled with my decision because Roger was convinced his son had the potential to become a good ball player. You guessed it, I relented and allowed 13-year old, Mark to workout, along with several of his teammates. Mark Lemke went on to have a successful career with the Atlanta Braves and earn a World Series ring.

Until a little over a two decades ago, the criteria for children to begin a resistance program was the growth also be modified every 6-8 weeks. Initial improvements

a monthly period. Currently, research suggests that enough to accept instruction. I have mature eight year olds that are doing very well, while struggle to teach some 14 year olds how to perform even the simplest exercises.

For four decades, I have had a personal goal for each child I train. I want them to learn every component of a successful exercise program, most importantly, exercise form. Safety is assured if proper form is used at all times. These "life skills" can be incorporated anywhere in the world. Bernie, a former client of mine, lives in Italy and trains with weights 3-4 times a week and has never been injured while working out.

Unfortunately, prepubescent boys produce far less circulating androgens (mostly testosterone) than they will in adulthood. Boys will not build muscle like men a few years older. Without pharmacological aid, a man can pack on 12-15 pounds of lean tissue, by engaging in a regular resistance program over his entire lifetime? Women, far less, possibly 5-7 pounds of muscle in a lifetime, with consistent training. Taught the correct training form at an early age, along with a naturally maturing body, creates an opportunity for girls and boys to become as muscular as their genetic predisposition

Left unsupervised or poorly supervised, resistance training for youngsters can be a dangerous endeavor. Prepubescent children should use moderate weights for 10-15 repetitions, using good form. Good form may be defined as follows: take two seconds to move a weight from its starting position through a full range of motion, pause one second to minimize dangerous momentum and return the weight to its starting position in four seconds. I suggest doing 2-3 sets per exercise, no more than 3-5 sets per body part. Workouts should be done on three, non-consecutive days a week. Workouts should

of facial hair and young women needed to experience (first 6-8 weeks) in perceived strength are the result of improvement in neuromuscular efficiency (learning the children, both female and male, only need to be mature movement), not actual muscular strength. After a 6-8 week period, strength, although painfully slow, is the result of microscopic muscular growth and strength. The sequence of exercises in a workout should begin with the body's largest muscle groups (legs, upper back, chest, shoulders) and finish with smaller muscle groups (biceps, triceps, abdominals, calves).

> Adults should seek the guidance of a certified trainer for their children. Credible certifications include CSCS, ACSM, ACE and ISSA. Someone who has earned a master's degree in Exercise Science would also qualify.







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
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


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NHFD News

- Material must be sorted and contained as specified in category description.
- No batteries, paints or liquids will be collected.

Option #2: Drop off at Dumpster

Drop off at dumpster located at DPW Garage on 2 Mill Street.

The **<u>second Saturday</u>** of April, June, July, August, September and November.

- Open from 8:00 am to 4:00 pm
- Categories accepted: A, B, C, D, E

The <u>second Saturday</u> of January, February, March and December.

- Open from 8:00 am to 12:00 pm
- Categories accepted: B, C, D, E

An attendant will be present to aid loading and verify proof of residence.

Waste must be separated as described below:

- **A)** Construction and Demolition: Wood and lumber tied in bundles not exceeding 8 feet long by 18 inched in diameter, plaster and shingles in containers, porcelain sinks and toilets, storm windows and doors.
- B) Sanitary Waste: Clothes, mattresses, stuffed furniture, toys, televisions and rugs.
- **C) Metals:** Pipe not exceeding 8 feet long, tire rims, bikes, cast tubs and sinks, washers and dryers. **D) Appliances Containing Refrigerants:** Refrigerators, freezers, dehumidifiers, A/C units. Limited to 1 per collection.
- **E) Tires:** Dismounted from rims, 16 inch or less, no tractor or heavy truck tires collected. <u>Limited to 6 tires per collection.</u>
- ${f F)}$ Hard fill: Stones, dirt, rocks, 1 cubic yard per collection.

Green Waste Guidelines

April 1 through May 15 & October 1 through November 15

Due to the large volume of green waste during this period, no specific collection day can be given.

- ◆Each street will be collected once a week ◆Loose leaves will be collected between the
- sidewalk and the curb.
 •No leaves in plastic bags.
- •If you prefer to contain waste, use cans only.
- •Brush and vegetation will be collected but must be kept separate from leaf piles.
- •Do not pile material in roadway.
- •Limbs must be tied in bundles no more than 6 foot in length and 18 inches in diameter. Pile limbs parallel to curb.

This is an overview of the collection schedule for our solid waste code and is not intended to be inclusive of all sections of code. This schedule may be subject to change.

May 16-September 30

Collected Wednesday. Have at curb by 7am.

- •Leaves, grass clippings, and hedge clippings must be in metal or plastic bins.
- •No plastic bags allowed.
- Limbs must be tied in bundles no more than 6 foot in length and 18 inches in diameter. Pile limbs parallel to curb
- •Individual limbs not to exceed 6 foot long or 12 inches in diameter.
- •No stumps allowed.
- Do not pile in roadway.
- •Tree removal contractors must remove their waste.

It is a violation of our county and local ordinance to transport waste from one residence to another in an attempt to avoid paying for your own waste. Violation of an ordinance results in the issuance of a ticket, court date, and fine per local law.

NYS Dept. of Transportation Update

The New York State Department of Transportation announced a preliminary project timeline for the NYS route 921E (Genesee Street) and 921T (Oxford Road, Mill Street, and Campion Road) Pavement improvement project in New Hartford.

This project will address pavement, signals, curb ramps and watermain betterment on Genesee Street from the Village Apartments crosswalk to Oxford Road/Mill Street and Campion Road. Construction work will take place over two construction seasons, starting with the watermain replacement work and possible signal and curb ramp work in 2023 and the pavement work in 2024.

Watermain work will take place under the sidewalk, so traffic flow in both directions will be maintained, but shifted. Any affected sidewalks will be replaced. Work is expected to start with tree removal in mid-April. All residences and businesses where tree removal will be taking place will be notified by mail. Watermain work will begin mid-May and night work is expected to start late June through late summer on Sunday -Thursday from 9 pm - 6 am. Watermain work is expected to be complete by November 30, 2023.

Copies of the map and plans of work are in the Village office at 48 Genesee Street if any resident or business would like to review. The office is open Monday through Thursday 9:00 am to 4:00 pm and Friday 9:00 am to 1:00 pm and 2:00 pm to 4:00 pm.

Turn of the Century Schoolhouse Picture

This undated photograph is a gem! Why? Because someone took the time to write the names of those pictured. On the back of this picture lists the names of the forty school children (twenty boys and twenty girls) including the teacher, Miss Mary Bailey. The only thing missing is a date and location. Researching the names has been challenging to say the least. We do find a Miss Mary Bailey who was a teacher in Chadwicks, Clark Mills and New Hartford. She graduated from Utica Free Academy in 1904 and she married William Neal in 1909. So, if we have the correct Miss Mary Bailey, the picture is circa 1905-1909. And it is likely taken in front of the schoolhouse that was located on School Street off of Elm Street.

The names appear to be written in pencil and have faded over time. In addition, the handwriting is smudged and difficult to read in some areas. The names below we've discerned from that photo graph. 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Judge Joan Shkane

This is a continuing discussion of Legal Myths and Reality, because those informed are the most successful.

MYTH: Selection of a Chief Judge for the entire New York court system is based exclusively on merit, years of experience, and demonstrated skill, similar to the British system.

REALITY: New York is currently without a Chief, which makes policy for the whole system difficult and cumbersome. The Chief is the leader of the highest appeals court in New York State, and the top manager in the state's judiciary dealings for court structural changes and allocation of resources. Those who wish to apply for the position must submit an application to the State. The Senate Judiciary Committee will interview only some of the applicants and submit seven names for the Governor to consider. The Governor will chose the proposed Chief Judge from the list of seven nominees. The Governor's candidate is entitled to a full Senate vote on acceptance or rejection.

The Senate vetting of applicants is nearly all done in public. The last candidate who the Governor selected (whose nomination failed in the Senate) was vetted during a five-hour hearing in a packed room. But the work of the Judiciary Committee that leads to seven nominations is nearly totally done privately. The proceedings are confidential and privileged. Only the Governor has access to the documents pertaining to the seven nominees. Once the Governor choses one candidate, then only the Senate has access to that nominee's documents, and no one else. The public does not know who applied for nomination, or who was selected for an interview. Questions have arisen like "Why did a person end up on the list of nominees who had never been a judge before?". And, "Why did certain experienced appellate judges fail to make the nomination list?". One commentator said that the selection process is similar to the Roman Catholic College of Cardinals selection of a Pope. Some are

now wondering why New York needs such secrecy.

No one can reasonably argue that the process is not political. Members of the Commission are selected by the Governor, legislative leaders and the vacating Chief Judge. A candidate of a political party not in power will likely not be chosen. Some argue that some secrecy is required to avoid embarrassment to those not selected to be among the seven nominees. Others say that the initial secrecy is understandable for embarrassment reasons, but once the seven have been selected, the public should have the opportunity to review the materials about the seven, with personal details like addresses redacted. This will let the public in on the process so they can assess each one of the During the month of February the reporters celebrated

The latest judge selected by the Governor would have been the first Latino chief judge in New York history. Lobbyists tried to influence the state Senate to select him. Lack of transparency around lobbying efforts makes it nearly impossible for observers to follow the money surrounding those seeking to influence judicial and other nominations. The Commission on Ethics and been asked to decide whether groups trying to influence politicians to vote in a certain way on nominees are required to disclose the details of lobbyist spending and fundraising, It only says it is considering making rules on ethics and lobbying.

Since the last judge this Governor nominated to be Chief Justice was rejected by the Senate, a very unusual move, the Governor asked for a vote in the full Senate. This was held, and the candidate was rejected. Now the process must start all over with nominations to the Commission, from which the seven will be chosen for recommendation to the Governor. This becomes a very cumbersome and expensive process with little transparency all down the line, and the State remains without this very important position filled.

MYTH: Lawyers and judges are the most important in the courtroom and no one else is indispensable.

REALITY: One of the most overlooked persons in the courtroom is the Court Stenographer. Maybe this is because they rarely speak! They are key to justice because they are the "guardians of the record". The record is the transcript that shows every word spoken in the courtroom. The stenographer must certify as accurate the all-important transcription of the court's proceedings. This is an integral part of every case in a court of record, and is used by all appellate courts in reaching decisions on appeals, and by trial courts and lawyers to understand exactly what happened in a case.

Juries often ask to have parts of the record re-read to them to aid in reaching a decision.

The position of court reporter is a hidden gem as a profession. Nationally there is a shortage of over 5000 court reports. They cannot be entirely be replaced by technology, such as tape recorders, because the accuracy and certification by a real person is still needed. Reporting occurs not just in a courtroom, but in important depositions before and during a case. Institutions such as the National Football League use reporters in hearings. Because of the shortage of reporters, some federal courts are recruiting even before a student graduates from reporting school. National Court Reporters week. Sadly, many reporting schools have closed. There are fewer than five New York State. Court reporting can be very lucrative. In addition to earning a comfortable salary with chance of advancement and benefits as a state worker, many reporters, retired or working during private time, make an attractive annual wage from producing transcripts privately. As I write this, one of my former reporters Lobbying in Government, as of January, 2023, has not is spending the Winter in Florida, while continuing to work on transcripts. And she is doing it from the beach! Those interested in the law but not wishing to attend law school, should consider this profession.

Attention to legal myths can be important. They can be a starting point for developing an interest in the law. However, if specific legal issues are important in your life, for instance, regarding custody of children or money payable for any reason, it is wise to consult a lawyer who can advise you on the truth of legal myths. This discussion is not intended to render legal advice on specific cases or to express an opinion on any specific case.

FAKES & REPRODUCTIONS - BUYER BEWARE!

Ever since anything of value existed, people have been busy making fakes and reproductions to sell to unsuspecting consumers. The antiques and collectibles market is no exception. The problem of fakes has reached epidemic proportions. The marketplace is literally flooded with them. They range from well-executed copies that would challenge even an expert eye, to poorly rendered fakes that should be easily detected even by an amateur collector.

One of the problems in spotting a reproduction antique is that some forgeries are very well made and the purveyors of them often take great pains to make the item look old. Many diabolical methods have been employed in this deception including burying items, using blow torches, and inducing rust. To add to the problem of detecting fakes, not all of them are newly made. The item could have been produced several years ago. It will obviously show age, which adds to the confusion. Yes, an expert will certainly be able to tell the difference, less experienced collectors could, however, be easily fooled.

On the other side of the spectrum, you have reproductions in which there is no effort to "age" them. An item that is supposed to date from a period before screws came into common use will reveal itself with its machine-made screws with shiny heads. A utilitarian item like a crock or pottery jug that is supposed to be over 100 years old that looks like it just came off the potter's wheel should be equally suspect. You don't have to be an expert to pause when examining an antique or collectible and question its appearance: should what this item is and what it was used for look like this today? Does its construction, the materials used, add up for the claimed age and origin of the item?

One of the best ways to get experienced at spotting a fake is to see the fake and the original side by side. In most cases you will readily see differences and discrepancies. There is a great book that does a good job of displaying the reproductions and originals side by side and pointing out the differences for you. It is the Antique Trader Guide To Fakes & Reproductions, 4th edition by Mark Chervenica. It is profusely illustrated and covers many of the most highly collectible items in today's marketplace. You would do well to add this excellent resource to your bookshelf. It is available at Amazon.com and elsewhere for \$46.48. A little pricey but money well spent. An older book, but still very good, is Antique Fakes & Reproductions by Ruth Webb Lee. It is available through Amazon for \$14.98.

And keep in mind that no category of antiques and collectibles is exempt from fakes. From glassware to china, furniture and jewelry, and just about everything else, have reproductions out in the marketplace. It is no longer safe to assume that only valuable and rare items are reproduced. Today, items as common as buttons and bottles are being reproduced and sold and traded to unsuspecting collectors.

Knowing where an item came from and where it has been since then is still the best way to avoid acquiring fakes. If you obtain an item from a relative, for instance, who received it from their mother who received it as a wedding gift a hundred years ago; you have a trail that covers the life of the item. This is called provenance, a word that any aficionado of Antiques Roadshow® hears often. You don't always have to be dealing with the person who inherited the item directly. Provenance can also be established through letters, newspaper clippings, receipts and auction catalogs. What you want to see is a chain of possession that gives you a reasonable sense that you are dealing with the real thing. This probably will not be practical or

too important in regards to your purchase of a Depression glass sugar and creamer at a flea market. On the other hand, when you are about to invest hundreds or perhaps thousands of dollars on what you believe to be a significant antique item, then it will matter greatly.

A word to the wise- be cautious and careful in your purchases. As the title of this piece says, "Let the buyer beware." This is still the best advice.





This article appeared in the March 2023 edition of Rotary; a magazine printed by Rotary International that every Rotarian receives when they join a club. The article was written by

Ian H.S. Riseley, a past President of Rotary International and currently serves as a Foundation trustee chair. The article is entitled A Precious Resource Inaccessible to Many.

"Living in Australia, you think a lot about water. When you travel to the nation's vast interior, the Outback, you can't help but wonder how such an arid climate has supported life for millennia. There, each sip of water feels precious.

Each sip seems to get more precious by the day as climate change continues to impact water supply everywhere. Where Juliet and I live, on the temperate coast not far from Melbourne, I remember times not long ago when water supplies were so low that severe usage restrictions were put into place. We now live on rainwater that falls onto our roof and is collected in a tank. In many parts of the world, people don't have that luxury.

Water is essential for life no matter where you live. Yet many of us take it for granted. Think of all the times today you turned on the tap. About 1 in 4 people in the world have quite a different experience when they do – if they have a tap at all. Today, 2 billion people lack access to safely managed drinking water, according to the United Nations. It is heartbreaking that each year, about 300,000 children under age 5 die from diarrheal diseases caused by poor sanitation, poor hygiene, or unsafe drinking water – all preventable circumstances.

This is where Rotary comes in. Through your support, The Rotary Foundation provides water and sanitation for countless communities around the globe. Foundation global grants have ranged from providing toilets and hygiene education for villages in the Philippines to building infrastructure for year-round access to safe, affordable drinking water in Brazil.

The water and sanitation problems that we face are too great for any of us to solve alone. But whether we work with global grant partner districts across the world or with large agencies such as USAID, we are making a difference."

Tax Season Surprise? Take **Steps to Reshape Your Strategies**

- 2. Evaluate the tax impact of the types of investments you select for your taxable accounts.

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




