Planting Successful Summer Containers

Planting containers with annual plants is a very important skill. If done properly, every plant will grow and thrive to its full potential, while lasting the entire growing season. When overplanted, the plants will grow to compete with one another for root room and sunshine, causing your pots to look overgrown and straggly.

Let's review the steps to planting. Always choose a container with drainage holes. Next, decide the number of plants you will need to purchase with this guide in mind.... a container up to about 8" in diameter can only support one 4" annual and possibly a single plant from a 4-pack or 6-pack. That's all it can support to grow and thrive! A 12" pot can support three 4" plants, 16" possibly five if it's deep and a 20" pot can support one 6" statement plant with four or five 4" accent plants. So, as you can see, it does not take very many plants to fill your pots.

I always fill my containers with loose, moistened potting soil to the rim or slightly below. Water the soil in to settle and drop a few inches down from the rim, allowing you just enough room to make a hole and plant your newly purchased annual. When fully planted, gently water again to settle everyone into their new growing space. Stand back and start to admire your good work! Planting this way allows for a nice reservoir for water to fill each time you water without spilling over the edge of the pot and carrying soil with





it! That is so frustrating.

Whenever I first plant a pot, I want to be able to see the soil in between the plants. Here is where the number of plants in a pot comes into play. Over-planting makes it very difficult to have a successful season with your container. Let's use hanging baskets as an example. Often people lose their hanging baskets a month into the season because they purchased the biggest, most beautiful, fully developed hanging basket at the garden center. They were in love and so very proud of their purchase! The hanging basket was the biggest, beautiful basket at the time, but little did they know that the pot was already filled with roots, leaving very little growing space for new roots. When plants get to that stage (pot-bound), they require much more water. One hot day they return home from work to find it wilted. They water it immediately, wipe their brow; phew, it bounced right back! Then the next day the same thing happens and this time it does not bounce back it dried out to the point of no return, leaving them with a dead hanging basket. Off to the garden center they go to replace it. That same thing can happen with your containers if you overplant them!

My goal as a grower is to grow the best quality annual plants, share my horticultural knowledge, setting everyone up for success. Your success is my success! I'm already smiling thinking of all the gorgeous annual planters you will grow this season. I hope you are also!




Free Blockbuster New Hartford

Upstate University Hospital's Mammography Van will return to the New Hartford Public Library at 2 Library Lane in New Hartford, on Tuesday, May 30, 2023. The screenings will be available between 9:30 a.m. and 4 p.m. Appointments are recommended for women who want to get a mammogram, to ensure they will be seen that day.

To schedule an appointment for a mammogram with the van, women should call 315-464-2588.

Appointments can also be requested online at: www. upstate.edu/noexcuses.

To be eligible for a mammogram on the van, women should be 40 years and older; not have had a mammogram in the past 12 months; and not be experiencing breast problems.

The mobile mammography program was started through New York State's "Get Screened, No Excuses" Breast Cancer Initiative, and continues with the support of Upstate University Hospital.

The program aim is to get rid of obstacles to breast cancer screening for women in New York.

The average rate for screening mammography in New York is 81 percent.

Local Educator Had Strong Ties to Cooperstown's Baseball HOF

Last month's TC article highlighted a turn of the century Schoolhouse. The forty pupils (twenty boys and twenty girls) were listed in no particular order with their teacher, Miss Mary Bailey. In the article we "believed" it may have been in Chadwicks on School Street but that could not be confirmed. An astute reader contacted us on our Facebook page asking if the Ralph Perry in that photo was the same Ralph Perry who would later be named Supervising Principal of the New Hartford Central schools in 1947?

That inquiry led us to dig out our file on Ralph W. Perry. It's a rather large file as Ralph had a long and distinguished career in education. His BIO is extensive as well and it references him

attending a two-room school house in Washington Mills where he was born on his maternal Grandfather's farm. A 1917 graduate of New Hartford, where he was a star baseball pitcher, he went on to graduate from Hamilton College where he was an Honor student. Through out his academic studies and career, he continued his love of baseball where he would play in many amateur leagues and on some semi-pro teams well into his 50's.

Ralph's scholastic career would take him to several teaching and administrative positions in and out of New York State before returning home to New Hartford. And the connection to the Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown? You'll have to wait for Part II of this article in next month's Crier.



Normally April showers bring May flowers, but this year April afforded most residents the weather to clean yards and garages. The brush and leaves from last fall are coming out to the front yards at the curbside. Just a reminder that again that curbside trash has been moved from the month of June to the month of October. The Highway Department is using the month of June for construction work, not picking up curbside trash.


Please when putting out the brush and leaves make sure they are separated and not mixed together. Please DO NOT place leaves in plastic, or paper bags. DO NOT place stones or rocks underneath the piles of leaves that

will damage the machinery. We have found stones and rocks in the piles already this year. The highway crews are working hard to clean up after our recent rain which gave us 3.5" of rain causing flooding in some areas of the town. We are cleaning ditches, catch basins and rocks and gravel from front lawns of resident's homes and patching roads and shoulders.

I want to thank all homeowners for their patience as your highway employees worked diligently to collect branches and brush from the towns 82 miles of streets. Recently you should have received the Town's annual TRASH & BRUSH COLLECTION SCHEDULE 2023 outlining curbside brush collection dates including trash that residents may drop off at the highway garage building at 111 New Hartford Street. Additionally, the schedule is available on the town's website at townofnewhartfordny.gov go to the town services, go to Highway click on curbside and the schedule will pop up. You can also stop by the Highway Garage or Town Hall and pick up a schedule, or we would be happy to send you another schedule or respond to any questions by calling us at 315-733-7500.

Again, this year we will also offer the garbage tag service for anyone who is unable to get items to the highway garage at \$5.00 per item. Tags can be purchase at the Town clerk's office at 8635 Clinton Street during business hours and the items will be picked up the first Monday of every month May through September by the highway crew. May 13th from 8:00-12:00 we will again have the CONFIDATA DESTRUCTION SERVICES to our constituents. Each person is limited to ten boxes to shred. A certificate verifying that your material has been destroyed will be issued.

The New Hartford Highway Department along with the New Hartford Library will be working together to put this event on again this year for the young children and adults to check out and touch the town's equipment. Again, please watch for the date and time for touch the truck at the library. Finally, as spring rains begin to appear, we will endeavor to continue our maintenance on our town creeks and catch basins. 
Memorial Plaque Dedication to Honor Local Irish Legend

They chose to treat us extremely well in our time of need and demonstrated what it means to be service oriented and "Socially Well." This may sound corny or a little overblown, but we were on a Social Wellness high as a result of the wonderful people we had met. That is, until we made the mistake of turning on the nightly news and saw nothing but negativity. We turned the TV off after a few seconds and discussed the great people we had met over the last few hours.

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

Your New Hartford Volunteer Fire Department responded to 101 alarms during the month of March 2023 as indicated by the monthly call report listed below by category:

Fires = 2 EMS = 65Hazardous = 2 Service Type = 13Good Intent = 4Other Alarms = 15Weather Related = 0Other = 0



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Total Calls for the Month of March 2023 = 101.

Of the 101 alarms, 84 were in the town, 16 were in the village, and one mutual aid call.

This brings the total alarms for 2023 to 185.

Some of the calls listed above - such as Fires, EMS, and Hazardous - are self explanatory. Others such as Service, Good Intent and Other Alarms are not. Service Calls includes water or animal problems, public assistance or standbys. Good Intent refers to responding but did not find anything or canceled in route. Other alarms include explosions, carbon monoxide, smoke or sprinkler detector activations.

The figures above do not include other activities by members of the department such as Fire Prevention details, training, parades, Open House and other various department committee meetings that take place throughout the year.

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

This is a continuing discussion of Legal Myths and Reality, because those informed are the most successful. MYTH: If you help someone in distress and they do not recover, you will be legally responsible for their injuries.

REALITY: Recently a friend asked me to advise her on the New York State Good Samaritan Law as it pertains to her church safety team. Most states have a form of this law. In New York State the law protects anyone who is arrested or sued as a result of giving assistance to someone seeking medical assistance for himself

or another in a medical emergency. That can mean any emergency, for example someone collapsing, or a car accident, or even a drug overdose. A lay person, not a medically trained person, who renders or tries to render help in an emergency will be protected from conviction or from a civil penalty of money damages if (s)he gives medical care and the treatment fails. It does not protect anyone from being arrested or from being sued. It is a DEFENSE in both cases, to be used only after arrest for assault or worse, or after being sued.

It applies only when the following occurs: a. help must be given in a manner that does not harm the victim; b. the helper must act in good faith; c. the helper must act to save a victim's life or provide emergency stabilizing care; d. the care the helper gives must be reasonable under the circumstances; e. the victim must be in imminent danger; f. the victim does not object to the help. The helper cannot be responsible for creating the emergency and must not be grossly negligent or reckless in giving care. If the helper is willfully and intentionally negligent or reckless, then the law will not defend the helper.

These are all legal terms of art. Reckless negligence is reckless indifference to the rights of others. It will not be a defense if the helper failed to use even slight care or the conduct is so careless as to show complete disregard for the safety of others. Someone acts recklessly when (s)he is aware of and consciously disregards a substantial and unjustifiable risk that a particular result may occur. For example, the helper sees a car accident and pulls the victim out of the car into a busy lane of traffic without stopping the traffic, and the victim is injured or worse. The Good Samarian law will not protect the helper because the helper probably was recklessly negligent and placed the victim in greater jeopardy for harm than (s)he was before the helper intervened.

MYTH: A trial lawyer choosing a jury in a criminal case, whether as prosecution or defense, has free rein to dismiss from service on the jury whoever (s)he chooses.

REALITY: Decades ago, the U.S. Supreme Court said that excusing certain people from a jury by either prosecution or defense in a criminal case solely because of the potential juror's race or gender is unconstitutional and illegal. To do so would undermine the parties' and the public's right to a fair trial and equal justice under law. This applies especially to persons of color as an accused. The reason for the rule is to prevent attorneys from selecting all-white or majority-white juries, who tend to convict at higher rates, and sometimes tend to engage in less rigorous deliberations. Race can be a determiner of a lot of life experiences that may make someone more or less sympathetic to the prosecution or defense. This is not acceptable because a juror must be as completely open-minded and unbiased as possible, so that a verdict is only on the facts and the law and nothing else.

The judge in the trial must be the one who decides on excusing or retaining a particular person for the jury. However, other than being admonished by the judge, and perhaps being forced to keep a potential juror over objection, there is no other form of punishment for the offending lawyer. Or at least none that has been regularly used.

Now a new committee of law professors called The Accountability NY is examining this kind of misconduct back to 2021. Ten current and former New York State prosecutors who have been noted by judges for illegally screening out potential jurors because of race or religion must face ethical complaints brought by the new committee. These complaints, if proven, could bring disciplinary actions. Of these ten, several were promoted. In some cases, convicted persons won on appeal and their convictions were overturned as illegal. Sadly these defendants had

spent years in prison before their conviction was overturned. Between 2004 and 2008 courts found that prosecutors committed this kind of misconduct 151 times, but only 3 were publicly sanctioned. One of the prosecutors complained of, all in downstate New York, was prosecuting a Latino accused. The prosecutor kept notes filled with racist and sexist instructions like "No Hispanics", and "Stay away from grandmotherly types." (as a grandmother, I find this particularly offensive!), and Italians if the accused is Italian (presumably because all Italians stick together!).

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Some experts in this field believe that other things can be done to reduce bias in jury selection. One way may be to raise the daily juror pay since the vast majority of people who show up for jury selection are white who can afford to serve at a low daily pay rate. A bill was introduced in the Legislature in 2021 to try to address this issue, but never came out of committee. Arizona, Washington state, and California have already addressed the issue by passing corrective legislation so that they are now in accordance with the direction of the U.S. Supreme Court.

Attention to legal myths can be important. They can be a starting point for developing an interest in the law. However, if specific legal issues are important in your life, for instance, regarding custody of children or money payable for any reason, it is wise to consult a lawyer who can advise you on the truth of legal myths. This discussion is not intended to render legal advice on specific cases or to express an opinion on any specific case.

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

"From the Mailbag"

Q. I inherited a pocket watch from my great uncle. It is gold filled and is running and the name on the face is "South Bend." Can you tell me anything about it and its value?

A. Your nice pocket watch was made by the South Bend Watch Co. which was in South Bend, Indiana. It is purported that they made 1,000,000 watches in the 26 years of their operations. The company was founded by the Studebaker brothers of automobile making fame. A fire at the company headquarters in July of 1957 ended the operations of this iconic American company. I would say your watch is from the early 1920's and is valued at \$200.

Q. I have 3 antique salt cellars that are hexagonal in shape. They were in my grandmother's china cabinet and given to me when she passed. Are they worth anything?

A. Since every household of the time before salt shakers came into fashion had these and so many have survived, they usually don't command more than \$5 each. Yours are more distinctive because of their shape so I would value your 3 salts at around \$30.

Q. I have a small metal horn that I believe was from an old phonograph. It is about 14" in length. I use it as a display piece but wonder if it's worth very much?

A. Your horn is indeed from an antique phonograph. I believe based on its small size that it is for the popular Edison Home Phonograph of the early 1900's. I do believe that the horn would be sought after by anyone who is missing theirs. I think it could realistically fetch \$100-150 to the right person. Finding that person could be a challenge though.






This horn went with an early phonograph.

Will the Secure Act 2.0 Affect Your Retirement Planning?

You may want to review your retirement planning strategies because of key provisions in the Secure Act 2.0, which was signed into law in December 2022.

Currently effective

You may want to consider potential opportunities to adjust your retirement savings and distribution plans and charitable giving strategies.

1. Should you wait an extra year to take distributions from your retirement accounts?

The required minimum distribution (RMD) age has increased to age 73 for individuals who turn age 72 in 2023. This means they do not have an RMD due in 2023. Individuals who turned age 72 in 2022 or earlier must continue taking their RMDs as scheduled.

2. Does making qualified charitable distributions (QCDs) make sense?

QCDs are available to those age 70½ or older and have a Traditional IRA and/or Traditional Inherited IRA. Beginning in 2023, you may distribute a one-time \$50,000 QCD paid directly from your IRA to certain splitinterest entities that qualify under the new rule. The \$50,000 is part of the \$100,000 QCD annual limit. The rules governing what split-interest entities are allowed to receive the one-time \$50,000 amount are complex, so consult a planning or philanthropic specialist who can provide more information.

3. Should you direct employer matching contributions to your before-tax qualified retirement plan (QRP) account or designated Roth account?

Your employer may now offer you the option of receiving vested matching contributions in a QRP designated Roth account instead of a QRP before-tax salary deferral account. Contributions to a designated Roth account are made with after-tax dollars and qualified distributions are tax-free.¹

Starting January 1, 2024

1. Should you delay taking distributions from a designated Roth account?

Currently, if you have a Roth IRA, you are not required to take RMDs while you're alive, but you do have to take them from a designated Roth account. Starting in 2024, you will no longer have to take RMDs from either type of Roth account.

2. Would a 529 plan designated beneficiary get a head start on saving for retirement by transferring their unused balance to a Roth IRA?

Beginning in 2024, a 529 designated beneficiary may make a rollover contribution from their 529 to their Roth IRA if certain conditions are met. Distributions are subject to annual Roth contribution limits, the 529 beneficiary must have equivalent earned compensation, and the aggregate distributions are limited to a \$35,000 lifetime amount.

To qualify, the 529 account must have been in existence for at least 15 years and the amount rolled over to the Roth IRA may not exceed the aggregate amount contributed (plus earnings) before the five-year period ending on the transfer date.

3. Will you get credit for your student loan payments?

If you are paying off qualified student loans, your employer will have the option to match your loan payments with contributions to a retirement account, offering you an additional incentive to save for retirement. For this purpose, matching contributions can be made into a 401(k), 403(b), governmental 457(b), or SIMPLE IRA plan.


4. Should you take advantage of employer-sponsored emergency savings accounts linked to individual account plans?

Your company will have the option to automatically sign you up for an emergency savings account for up to 3% of your salary or up to \$2,500, indexed for inflation, to your retirement plan if you earn less than a certain amount of money. These contributions would be made on an after-tax basis with the potential for an employee match. If your company participates, you will be allowed at least one withdrawal per month and the first four withdrawals in a year cannot be subject to any plan fees.

Starting January 1, 2025

Should you take advantage of higher retirement catch-up contributions?

Currently, if you're age 50 or older and want to increase your tax-advantaged retirement savings, you can make an additional \$7,500 contribution annually to your QRP and \$3,500 to a SIMPLE IRA.



The increased catch-up amounts will be adjusted for inflation beginning in 2025. If your wages exceed \$145,000, indexed for inflation, in the preceding calendar year, you will be required to make your catchup contributions to a designated Roth account.






