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Erie Canal History Featured in October

Explore the history of the Erie Canal throughout the month of October with exhibits, displays and a special program at the New Hartford Public Library.

October plays a key role in the history of the canal. The first segment of the canal – between Rome and Utica – opened in October of 1819. The full length of the canal – from Albany to Buffalo – opened in October of 1825. The canal helped open the interior of the United States and sparked growth and development in Mohawk Valley communities in the process.

Programs include:

History exhibit: A special exhibit on the canal's history, on loan from the Central New York Library Resources Council, will be on display near the fireplace in the center of the library. Four panels will outline the construction challenges posed by the canal, the movers and dreamers who made it possible, the unique culture of the canal and the how the canal not only became an important waterway for trade, but an "information superhighway" for ideas.

Library talk: Join us at 6 p.m., Monday, Oct. 16, at the library for a presentation on the role beer played in canal history. (See related article for details.)

Artifact display: The showcase at the library's main entrance will feature a variety of canal-related artifacts and images, on loan from three area museums. Items include canal-related tools, drawings and postcards featuring canal scenes and vessels, and canal commemoratives. The library expresses its thanks to the museums loaning material for this project. They are the Oneida County History Center in Utica, the Erie Canal Museum in Syracuse, and the Chittenango Landing Canal Boat Museum.

Books for check out: A limited number of books about the canal's history and fictional accounts of life on the canal will be available for check out.

Maps: Maps and brochures about the present-day canal and information about the museums will be available for patrons to take home.

Beer and the Erie Canal – making the connection

Derrick Pratt will present The Beer-ie Canal Was A-Risin': Brewing on the Erie Canal. The program begins at 6pm in the library's Sammon Room. According to Pratt, the Canal was a transformative waterway for various industries along its route, including brewing, which flourished from Albany to Utica to Buffalo. A native of Chittenango, he received a B.A in Social Studies Education from SUNY Cortland and a M.A. in Museum Studies from Syracuse University. 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VILLAGE OF NEW HARTFORD CURBSIDE JUNK COLLECTON GUIDELINES

The following pertains to VILLAGE OF NEW HARFORD residents only and <u>does not</u> include the TOWN OF NEW HARTFORD.

For more detailed information, refer to your Village Garbage Collection flyer or call the Village DPW at 315-724-0379 or the Village office at 315-732-1147.

The Village of New Hartford will have a curbside junk pick up on Monday, October 9, 2023. Materials must be at the curb by 5:00 am on October 9th.

Materials must be sorted into separate piles as listed below:

- 1) <u>Household Junk</u>: lumber bundled, piled parallel with the roadway, roofing and plaster in containers weighing 60 pounds or less, furniture without fabric, porcelain sinks, toilets, and storm windows
- 2) <u>Sanitary Waste</u>: clothes, bedding, stuffed furniture, hardcover books, empty paint cans with lids removed, and toys
- 3) Metal: major appliances and metal products
- 4) <u>Tires</u>: Tires must be off rims and no larger than 16". No large truck or tractor tires
- □ Only one pickup of each category listed per street.
- □ Nothing longer than 8 feet long will be collected.
- Collection limits for categories #1 (Household Junk) and #2 (Sanitary Waste) are each limited to a pile not to exceed 4' wide, 8' long, and 3' high.

The DPW will not accept:

- 1) Recyclable materials, lumber exceeding the limit stated above, and shingles not contained. For construction and demolition projects, please contact the Village DPW or a private waste hauler to make arrangements for a dumpster.
- 2) Propane cylinders and liquids such as paints, thinners, waste oil, herbicides, and pesticides. These items may be disposed of at the Oneida-Herkimer County Waste Authority drop site per their collection schedule. For more information, call 315-733-1224.
- 3) Automotive batteries. Due to employee and environmental hazards, batteries may be returned to a redemption or recycling facility.

Thank you for your cooperation with sorting materials and observing these guidelines. It helps reduce costs and insures the continuation of this program.

VILLAGE OF NEW HARTFORD GREEN WASTE AND LEAF COLLECTION

Leaves, grass clippings, and brush will be collected every Wednesday through the end of September. Brush must be bundled and leaves, grass, and trimmings must be contained in reusable cans. Limbs must be less than 12" in diameter and less than 6' long for collection.

From October 1st through November 15th, leaves will be collected loose at the curb once weekly. Please keep leaves separate from brush pile. <u>Plastic</u>

bags used for leaves and green waste are not permitted and will not be collected. Please do not pile leaves in the roadway.

October is here and a reminder the Town Highway Department will start picking up leaves shortly. Please don't put leaves in plastic bags or containers. Place the leaves to the curb so that our leaf vac trucks can pick them up. Once the leaves start falling the trucks will be out every single day. Please don't mix the leaf piles with other debris like sticks, dirt, rocks, brush, and pumpkins.

The Brush Collection is finished for the 2023 season. We will not be picking up any

trees, and brush until next season. The compactor trucks will still be out to pick up the green waste of flowers and grass clippings. The drop off trash program at the Highway Garage is finished for this season.

Our next stormwater project is located near the Hughes Lane, Roman Rd, Oxford Rd area. We will begin on this project in the next couple of weeks, will start with cleaning the ditch on Roman Rd and working our way up the hill. Then we will start building a road and cutting trees where the pond is going. This project is also funded through the Oneida County Soil&Water program and Oneida County.

The Highway mechanics have started working on the plow equipment to get it ready for the upcoming winter season. The Highway trucks are being checked and the plows, wings and hoppers will be installed for the 2022-2023 winter.

The Highway department is still working with FEMA for reimbursement on our projects. The FEMA project in Sauquoit Creek is finished at Hillside Gardens. The athletic park in Washington Mills is out to bid, this will start late this fall. The Rayhill Trail repair is still being engineered and Clinton Street Bridge has been placed together with FEMA and the State working together to get this back on track to get the necessary repairs done. This bridge project is in the design stage.

Curb Side trash will start the first week in October in ward 1. The second week trash will be picked up at the curb in ward 2. The third week trash will be pickup in ward 3. The fourth week trash will be picked up in ward 4. Any questions please call or e-mail me.

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

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

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Vacation Exercise Mishaps

My wife, Cindy and I enjoyed an Alaskan vacation for nearly two weeks, seven at sea, five on land and two traveling. We exercised daily, on the cruise ship, at hotel fitness facilities and outdoors at the base of North America's highest mountain, Denali. For 43 years, we have done our best to instruct proper exercise form, appropriate sequencing of exercises in a workout, specific movements for all body parts and prudent nutritional practice. Working out among people from all over the world was a real eye opener. We saw how the internet may be passing along inaccurate fitness information and how some public facilities are not instructing properly. Some of the common mistakes we witnessed were:

*Poor Exercise Form-this may be the most common exercise mistake of all. Too often, programs place most of the emphasis on sets and repetitions and not on proper form. Aimless and sloppy performance of a prescribed number of repetitions is useless. A quick review may be of benefit here. A "set" is a number of repetitions performed continuously without stopping. Performing less than six repetitions in a given set, tends to improve strength. Sets of 6-12 reps produces muscle hypertrophy (increase in muscular girth) and more than 12 reps encourages improvement in muscular endurance. Proper form requires that each rep must be performed, taking two seconds to move the weight from its starting position, followed by a one second pause, in order to prevent dangerous momentum and a four second return to the reps starting position. Throwing a weight through a range of motion, in order to complete a prescribed number of repetitions is not only dangerous, but ineffective. The majority of folks we watched exercise while on vacation demonstrated poor form.

*Improper Exercise Sequencing-the order with which you place each exercise

in a workout is critical. Resistance Training 101 suggests performing exercises addressing the largest muscles of the body first in a workout, followed by exercises that stimulate smaller muscle groups.

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Exercises that address the legs and upper back should be done early in the workout. Movements addressing the chest and shoulders done next, and ending a workout with exercises that stimulate the arms, calves and abdominals. We observed "vacation exercisers" doing biceps curls and triceps extensions first in their workout. Fatiguing those smaller body parts early in the workout dramatically compromises the performance of movements addressing the larger muscle groups. Bottom Line: Large to Small.


*Stretching Mishaps-in order for a stretch to be effective, the body's core, which can be defined as anything but arms and legs, must be engaged. Simply touching our toes with our fingers doesn't cut it. A slight arch of our lower back, combined with minimal abdominal contraction makes straight leg toe touching optimally effective. Again, every stretch should begin with an engagement of our core.

*Atrocious Nutritional Behavior-we indulged in small portions of desserts and when we returned home, we stayed away from the scale for a few days. Although being detained on a cruise ship for seven days may encourage everyone to eat more of the foods they generally don't eat, the gluttony we witnessed while at sea was mind boggling. Before, during, after and in between meals, we saw multiple servings of ice cream, pastries and candies being ingested by the vast majority of cruisers. Again, a small piece of pie for dessert was a real treat for Cindy and me. We do our best to follow a low glycemic load nutritional program at home and for the most part, made fairly good nutritional choices on vacation. It's quite easy to see why the majority of humans wandering our planet are obese.

For 43 years, Cindy and I have done our best to create a fitness environment where we exercise properly. We have come to take it for granted that everyone uses good form, sequences appropriately, engages their core while stretching and makes prudent nutrition choices. Exercising with the general population, while on vacation was a real eye opener.

Your New Hartford Volunteer Fire Department responded to 133 alarms during the month of August as indicated by the monthly call report listed below by

category: Fires = 1EMS = 75Hazardous = 7Service Type = 19Good Intent = 12False Alarms = 17Other Alarms = 1Weather Related = 1



Total Calls for the Month of August 2023 = 133.

Of the 133 alarms, 116 were in the town and 16were in the village and 1 mutual aid alarm.

This brings the total number of calls year-to-date through August 31, 2023, to 877.

Some of the calls listed above - such as Fires, EMS, and Hazardous - are self explanatory. Others such as Service, Good Intent and Other Alarms are not. Service Calls includes water or animal p9larms, roblems, public assistance or standbys. Good Intent refers to responding but did not find anything or canceled in route. Other alarms include explosions, carbon monoxide, smoke or sprinkler detector activations.

The figures above do not include other activities by members of the department such as Fire Prevention details, training, parades, Open House and other various department committee meetings that take place throughout the year.

The New Hartford Volunteer Fire Department will host its Annual Halloween Parade and Open House on Tuesday evening, October 31, starting at 6pm at the Fire House on Oxford Road in the Village.

Roof Project: Stone Presbyterian Church

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In the spring of 2024, Stone Presbyterian Church in Clinton will be placing a new roof on the building. The current shingles were installed over thirty years ago, and the roof has developed various leaks. Some shingles have blown off the roof, prompting additional concerns for safety and interior damage. Even though the church has seen that these areas are repaired, it is clearly time for a new roof. Contractors and engineers have been consulted for this very extensive undertaking, and the work is scheduled for June, 2024. The expected cost for this project is \$45,000.

Stone Church has a long and rich history. The first Church congregation met on the Village Green in the late 1700's. A wooden church was constructed there and used for around thirty years. In 1835, a church built of stone was constructed on the present site. A tragic fire in 1876 destroyed this church and a new one was built on the same property. The parishioners at the time raised the funds for the construction, and the church was completed in 1878. It has served the community for 145 years and is still very active, not only in support of local activities but also in aiding many charitable organizations, including the Country Pantry, Hope House, The Center, Abraham House and the Thea Bowman House. The church also houses a highly successful Fair-Trade Shoppe, one of the largest in New York State.

Hoosier Cabinets An American Classic

Whenever there has been a need to do something more efficiently or make our lives easier, American ingenuity has always rose to the occasion. That was certainly the case with the introduction of the Hoosier Cabinet, a familiar item in many households in the first decades of the 20th Century.

The Hoosier, as you may be aware, is a cabinet for the kitchen, typically in three parts, which combined to make an ideal work area for the homemaker of the day. Typically, a porcelain work surface was surrounded by a multitude of cupboards and cubbyholes to hold baking supplies, spices and utensils that one would need, all within easy reach and nicely arranged and categorized to simplify the homemaker's tasks in the kitchen. Almost all would have had a pull out flour bin, some complete with a sifter. There was typically a bread box with a tin lining, sometimes with a stained glass or roll

top door. The bottom piece featured a roomy storage area while the upper level had clearly marked areas for spices, extracts, oils, utensils, etc. It is easy to see why these were a homemaker's dream.


When I first became active in the antiques business over 5 decades ago, Hoosiers were a much sought after item. Any auction that listed one for sale attracted multiple bidders and bidding was often spirited. I chose to write about the Hoosier because of late I have seen some being offered for sale again after several years of not seeing any. From what I've seen it appears they have held their value, and when factoring in inflation, they have somewhat increased in value. They are currently commanding prices in the \$500-1000 range, the upper range being reserved for the very finest examples with the best features- stained glass, roll top, flour sifter, etc.

Perhaps you're fortunate enough to already own one of these iconic cabinets. If not, I hope I have piqued your interest enough to take a look, They are a great piece of Americana and given the fact that they can be repurposed for other applications in the modern home, it is easy to see why they are still desirable some 100 plus years since their introduction. If you've always wanted to own one, now may be the perfect time to do so before they disappear from the marketplace again! Happy collecting!

John C. Devereux Entrepreneur, Statesman, Benefactor

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

Grandparents Can Teach Lessons About Money and Investing

Typically, being a grandparent is mainly about fun and games (and candy, of course). But you can choose to do more by helping teach your grandchildren about money, saving, and investing. Remember, the lessons they learn while they're young may become so engrained they will help guide them well into their adult lives.

You might want to start by talking with their parents to help ensure what you're going to tell them aligns with what they're hearing at home. As a result, you should be able to reinforce the lessons their parents are teaching rather than sending conflicting messages.

Begin with the three "buckets"

The next time you slip your grandkids some money (you know you do), consider employing this classic method for teaching the value of money and saving, especially if they're very young.

The idea is simply to have them divide the money into three "buckets" — whether they're literal or figurative is up to you:

away on whatever they want, like a toy or a special treat (with their parents' permission, of course).

2. Saving. The second is for saving for something down the road. This can teach them about delaying gratification and setting a savings goal. If you're looking for a good excuse to set up a custodial savings account for them at a bank, this could fit the bill.

3. Giving. Finally, have them use part of the money good place to start.



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Introduce investing

When you think they're ready, introduce them to the potential rewards, and risks, of investing. Help them understand the difference between owning a stock taking an ownership position in a company that may pay a dividend — and a bond — lending money to a company or government entity in return for interest payments.

Discuss the value of not putting all their eggs in one basket or, in other words, diversification. Explain that a portfolio that's mainly stocks may have a greater return potential than one that's primarily bonds but is also likely to experience greater volatility from market activity.

You could also encourage them to begin setting longterm investment goals. Although being able to afford retirement is motivating for adults, it may not resonate with them at this point. However, higher education, a new car, or a fun trip just might work.

Making it real

Since they've already learned something about banking through that savings account you (hopefully) helped them open, as they get older, it could be a good time to help make investing real by assisting them with starting an online investment account and providing some start-up funds. Keep in mind you can give up to \$17,000 (\$34,000 for a couple) in 2023 to an individual without incurring gift tax implications.

After they've seen firsthand how investing works, explain that as they get older, potentially accumulate assets, and have a more complicated financial situation, they should consider working with a professional financial advisor to help them work toward their longterm goals.

Diversification cannot eliminate the risk of fluctuating prices and uncertain returns.
