New Hartford Youth Employment Program Kicks Off the Season

The New Hartford Youth Employment program is looking for industrious young men & women ages 14-19 to be matched with local residents & businesses that need seasonal or part-time work done. This program matches youths with residents or businesses that need odd jobs done such as babysitting, lawn maintenance, painting, cleaning, copying, filing, organizing, party set up & clean up, cellar and/or attic clean out, moving, snow shoveling, holiday decorating, wrapping of presents etc. Jobs are often short term and the rate of pay is at the discretion of the business or resident.

Residents and local businesses are encouraged to contact the Youth Employment Director if they have a job to offer.

Youths may sign up in person with the Youth Employment Director in the Town Clerk's Office located at 8635 Clinton Street, New Hartford, NY 13413 or call 733-7500 ext. 2322 or email cheryj@townofnewhartfordny.gov

Once registered, the Program Director will try to match the skills offered by the youth, with the appropriate employment opportunity. When a match is found, the youth and employer will be given the name and contact number to reach each other, and at that time the youth will be asked to initiate contact with the employer to determine the rate of pay and hours of work for the job to be completed. The Youth Employment Director will follow up each referral with a phone call to the employer to ensure that there was a satisfactory conclusion to the match, and determine whether

a youth will be given additional job referrals. It is important to know that youths will not be employees of the Town, but rather working for individuals within our community.

It is the intent of the program to fill a need in the community by providing a part-time work force in the Town, and to help youths communicate with potential employers and be responsible for constructively planning out the arrangements of employment.

The program runs year round! If you are between the ages of 14 to 19 and have time to offer your energies and skill to residents and/or businesses of New Hartford, or you are a Town Resident and/or Business in need of work done around your home or business, please consider contacting the New Hartford Youth Employment Director Cheryl A. D'Amore Sisters Recently Became College Graduates



Philo Selected to Receive Senate Commendation Award

New Hartford Resident Raymond Philo recently was selected to receive the 'New York State Senate Commendation Award'. The award was presented by State Senator Joseph Griffo at a ceremony hosted by Munson. Philo, who is a Professor of Criminal Justice at Utica University and served as New Hartford Police Chief from 1993-2010, was recognized for research, teaching and scholarship in the field of criminal justice and forensic science. Philo provided testimony before the New York State Senate on two occasions on the issues of fraud against the state government and cybersecurity.

New Hartford Highway News

"Springtime is the land awakening. The March winds are the morning yawn" so said Lewis Grizzard. We here at your Highway Department are not only working hard to prepare for the green, but continue the follow-up from our winter snow fall.

Occasionally the heavy wet snow we are plowing on your road may affect your mailbox. We apologize for the inconvenience, but are happy to stop by and be sure to repair or reset the mailbox. We just need you to let us know. As we do every year, we will also be out to re-seed or repair lawns near the road which were damaged due to plowing, as well as sweeping

roads throughout the Town. This is all weather dependent and takes about 4 weeks to complete throughout the Town.

Starting in the month of March the old employee's door at the Town offices will be opened to the public as an entrance. Three new windows have been added to this hallway, one window for codes department. The second window will be for Highway Departments secretary. The third window will be for the New Hartford Central School for people wanting to meet with the school.

We are working diligently to get the new 2024 green waste and brush schedule out in the mail by the middle of March and pick-up will commence Monday April 1st for brush pickup. This schedule will be on the Town's web site and in the mailer.

Trash drop off to your Highway Garage will begin Monday, April 1st from 7:00 am - 2:00 pm and will be Mondays ONLY through to fall, except for the month of October when your entire Highway Crew will be out in your neighborhoods for our annual curbside pick-up. If Monday is a holiday the drop off will be on Tuesday. This year the curbside pickup will be in the month of October not June, just like last year. The month of June allows the highway crew to do more construction work by moving the curbside dates to October. Please look to the schedule for what is included.

The town's two new plow trucks have arrived after waiting two years from the time they were ordered to the time they were delivered. These two trucks replaced two trucks that were 2006 Internationals being 18 years old. The pictures that are included are the new trucks. The first truck is a 2024 Mack tenwheeler with a double wing so when it is feasible, the operator can plow and sand the whole road in one pass. The second truck is a single axel 2024 Mack with a stainless dump box and sander.







Ogham Writing—Come to the H.A.R.P. Museum on Thursday, March 21st to listen to Deirdre Mcarthy talk about the ancient Irish writing known as Ogham writing.

Ogham is a primitive form of script used in Old Irish, Old Welsh, and Pictish writing. The Ogham or Celtic tree alphabet inscriptions appear on stone and wood monuments from the 4th century AD but some scholars believe its origins may go back to 1 AD or further. Writings were typically around the edges of rocks running from bottom to top and left to right, or left to right and horizontally in manuscripts.

In this class you will learn about the characters or "letters" of this alphabet and how it was used. You will also get a chance to practice writing a few simple ancient Irish words in Ogham. Our presenter is Deirdre McCarthy, an Irish speaking native of Limerick who now lives in the Syracuse area. Deirdre is a storyteller, musician and teaches the Irish language and adult Ceili dancing.



Packy's Pub: Premiere St. Patty's Day destination & still run by same family after 38 years!

When Andrea (Braun) and Donald Scott along with her brother Bruce Braun opened Packy's Pub in December of 1985, the feel of an authentic Irish Pub was evident. Don did much of the renovation himself spending countless hours getting just the right "look". No one could deny the establishment would quickly cement itself as a popular spot for food and drink in the heart of Washington Mills. Popular all year long, it would also become a prime location to celebrate St. Patrick's Day festivities! The Scott's were no strangers to the bar/restaurant business. At the time they opened Packy's, they already owned and were running Tiny's Grill in Utica, having purchased it four years earlier.

When Scott and Andrea purchased Tiny's, it was already a well-established business and the risk was lower. But when they opened their new business on Kellogg Road in an old residential building, there was no patronage, no following, nothing! They were starting from scratch. There was however "history". The home bought and renovated was once owned and occupied by Thomas Roy Hart who was the Postmaster in Washington Mills for 20 years. He ran the post office out of his service station that was located around the corner at the Washington Mills four corners. In 1954 his son-in-law Lewie Smith would take over the station with Thomas still running the attached Post Office until his retirement in 1963.

Back to Packy's. The success of their new endeavor was soon evident. After the first five years in business, they knew they had a winner. For several reasons, they would sell Tiny's to focus on Packy's. Bruce would sadly pass in 2001. His sister Andrea would continue to run their dream. Fast forward another 21 years and the torch would pass again. Andrea's nephew Dean Braun and his wife Amy would purchase the restaurant. Amy's father, Corey Benoit, is no stranger to the restaurant biz. Cooking in many establishments for decades, he has been Packy's long-time head chef.



"Read More in 2024"

Olivia, age 19 months, doesn't speak many words yet, but she loves to select a book for her Nana to read to her when she visits. Sarah, age 2, always chooses the "lift the flap" books for her mom to read to her at bedtime. And Daniella, age 4, reads Disney princess stories every night. They have all discovered the joy of reading, even if they can't yet read on their own! Children exposed to reading at an early age – even from birth – are in a better position to do well in school and later in life. According to the National Institutes of Health, "Some studies have found that early reading abilities are both directly and indirectly related to longterm reading success." According to a 2023 study by The Lucy Project:[i] "There are 45 million adults in the United States alone who cannot read. That is more than 5 times the population of New York City. If a child is not reading at grade level by fourth grade, they are statistically likely to remain illiterate throughout their life. Not only do struggling readers experience higher levels of stress and feelings of isolation during their school years, but they also have a dramatically increased chance of dropping out of high school and entering the criminal justice system."

The Genesis Group's Literacy Committee launched the Dolly Parton's Imagination Library (DPIL) program in September 2023 in partnership with Perch Place LLC's R4K (Ready for Kindergarten) Program. The Imagination Library mails more than 2.4 million high-quality, age-appropriate books each month to registered children from birth to age five. Local school districts are eligible to join the program. The Utica City School District and Camden Central School District are currently participating in the program in our region to send a free book every month to children under five years of age. As of January 31, 2024, 765 books are being sent out each month. The Genesis Group of the Mohawk Valley was started over 24 years ago with a mission to support and strengthen our entire community in a variety of areas: Education, Healthcare, Data Analytics, Small Businesses, to name a few. The focus on Education includes yearly events such as Teacher Appreciation Week, Excellence in Education

Recognition, Drone Camps, and Career, College, and Life Ready programs. The Literacy Committee was formed this past year with the goal to provide information, resources, and events to promote literacy in our region. In September 2023, over 30 people -- a collaboration among area libraries, school districts, colleges, not-for-profits and businesses—gathered to inventory available programs and resources and create new initiatives, goals and an action plan. The launch of the DPIL is just the start of the Committee's plans.

As a tribute to her father who could not read, Dolly Parton created the Dolly Parton's Imagination Library (DPIL) to inspire kids to love to read. As of January 2024, over 229 million books have been gifted since the program's inception in 1995. The Genesis Group is one of 2,700 local program partners of the DPIL in collaboration with our local Ready for Kindergarten (R4K) Program. Local school districts need only contact Robin Robinson at robinr@perchplace.org to inquire about joining. Let's commit to instilling a love of reading in our children, our future leaders. Consider adding another new year's resolution to those you selected at the start of this new year: "Read more in 2024!" Dr. Seuss wrote: "You can find magic wherever you look. Sit back and relax, all you need is a book." Encouraging our children to read daily expands their world and gives them a foundation for future success.



NHFD News

Your New Hartford Volunteer Fire Department responded to 114 alarms during the month of January 2024. The monthly call report is listed below by category.

Fires = 2

EMS = 67Hazardous = 3

Service Type = 11

Good Intent = 10

Other Alarms = 20

Weather Related = 1

Other = 0

Total Calls for the Month of January 2024 = 114.

Of the 114 alarms, 100 were in the town and 13 were in the village with 1 mutual aid alarm.

Some of the calls listed above - such as Fires, EMS, and Hazardous - are selfexplanatory. Others such as Service, Good Intent and Other Alarms are not. Service Calls includes water or animal problems, public assistance or standbys. Good Intent refers to responding but did not find anything or canceled in route. Other alarms include explosions, carbon monoxide, smoke or sprinkler detector activations.

The figures above do not include other activities by members of the department such as Fire Prevention details, training, parades, Open House and other various department committee meetings that take place throughout the year.

In Other Department News

The Chief and members of the New Hartford Volunteer Fire Department, and all emergency personal would like to remind everyone that... The last Word....is your house or business number posted?

In case of an emergency, being able to have the Fire Department, Emergency Medical Services (EMS), and the Police Department, find your house or place of business quickly is important. If there is no number on your house, mailbox, or place of business, critical time is lost. A difference in minutes can mean the difference to a positive outcome in an emergency. New Hartford fire fighters are equipped with many tools to help their arrival time. Some of these tools are text messaging and radio transmissions of the call address, some others are maps and computers with GPS of our fire district. However, clearly affixed house or business numbers are imperative for us to get to the scene in a timely manner.

Many residents overlook the fact that ordinary street numbers attached to the front of the house, or business, are often impossible to see at night. This is true regardless of the season, but it becomes particularly critical in the fall and winter. This is the time when daylight hours get shorter, and there is fog, rain or snow, and locating a poorly marked residence or business from the street becomes much more difficult.

So, you may be wondering, what are some of the requirements for house or business numbers? How small is too small? What about colors? The following are some of the basic requirements:

- · Must be Arabic numerals. Fancy numbers or numbers that are spelled out may be aesthetically pleasing but are very difficult to read from the street. They should be displayed horizontally as well.
- · Needs to be a minimum four (4) inches high and in a contrasting color to their immediate background. Brass or bronze numbers are difficult to see in the day to nighttime. A reflective - type material would be a good consideration as well.

- · If the dwelling is located more than 45 feet from the front property lot line, the number should be displayed on a gate post, fence, mailbox, or other appropriate place that will make it visible from the street from all directions when approaching from the street.
- · Cannot be obstructed by shrubs, trees, decorations, etc.

· Encourage your family, friends, and neighbors to post their house numbers too!

Also, if the emergency happens to occur during the night, we ask that you please put your porch light or other outside lights on. This too will save time.

One last word... Will a Fire Truck fit down your driveway? With all the new housing developments and individuals adding "gates" to their property, we ask that before installing gates, thought is given as to the width of your driveway and the width of the gates opening as we never know if the Fire Truck fits down your driveway until an alarm is sounded.

Remember, emergency personnel cannot help you if they cannot locate your home or business. If we cannot find you in an emergency, the delay, however slight, might be the difference between life and death.

Unfortunately, they have only scratched "If you're passionate about making a difference and a walkers outing and the chatter is mostly about long the surface of what it means to use their exercise time can either train hard for short distances or easy for long stimulating improvement in the vessels away from the heart, which is a necessity. I would suggest engaging in two Long Slow Distance workouts a week at a heart rate of between 65-70% Heart Rate Maximum.

> High Intensity: Competitive endurance athletes know the importance of High Intensity training. This less favorite form of cardio is not comfortable, but necessary, because it stresses the left ventricular wall blood throughout the cardiovascular system. Again, you can train hard for a short period of time or easy for long periods of time. High Intensity workouts usually last no longer than 30 minutes at 80-90 % of one's maximum heart rate.

> Intervals: Interval Training is a part of the High Intensity family. Short, very intense bursts, lasting between 30 seconds to 2-3 minutes, followed by adequate recovery, is the formula for interval training. Where most trainees go wrong is in the timed recovery between intervals. Allowing for recovery creates the opportunity for very high intensity intervals. Lack of recovery between intervals, compromises the upcoming intense burst. An accepted formula allows for a 1:1 ratio of intense effort and recovery. An example would be a two minute intense burst, followed by a very low intensity recovery period lasting two minutes.

> Active Rest: As I've aged, I've discovered the value of Active Rest. It's greatest value is in its ability for muscles and connective tissue to recover for the next High Intensity workout. Circulating oxygenated blood to challenged muscle cells, increases the odds of a full recovery, in preparation for an upcoming High

Intensity workout. Performing your favorite mode of exercise at a very low intensity, 40-50% of your maximum heart rate will encourage full recovery from an intense workout. Active Rest should even begin with your cooldown, immediately following an intense session.

You can calculate your training heart rate, using two

Basic Method - subtract your age from the number 220, then multiply by the percentage at which you'd like to train. For example, a 40 year old, who would like to train at 75 % of their maximum heart rate would subtract 40 from 220 and multiply 180 by .75, which calculates to 135 beats per minute. (220-40).75=135)

Heart Rate Reserve Method - this takes into consideration your current fitness level, by using your resting pulse. A lower resting pulse indicates a higher level of cardiovascular fitness and conversely, a higher resting pulse means you are less fit. HRR formula Everyone knows cardiovascular exercise, done looks like this (HR max.- HR rest).75 +HRRest. (180-60).75 + 60= 150 beats per minute and takes into consideration the fitness level of this 40 year old with a 60 bpm resting pulse.

> Every workout must have a specific purpose. I'm sure there are many physically fit people who simply go through the motions, doing the same workout, wisely and become optimally fit.





Seven Actions to Consider Before Leaving Your Job

Before you make the decision to move on from your job, review this checklist of important financial considerations. Some involve making sure your personal finances are in order, while others can help you explore all the implications of leaving your current

1. Review your current retirement benefits. Check the schedule for your employer's 401(k) and profit-sharing contributions to see how long you have to work to claim any matched funds. If you're close to being fully vested (meaning you're entitled not just to the dollars you contributed but also to the dollars your employer did), it may be worth sticking it out a little longer.

Keep in mind that some plans require that you be employed on the last day of the plan year to get employer contributions for that year, even once you are vested. You may want to wait until after the plan year ends before you terminate employment so you don't lose those contributions.

2. Make a plan for your employer retirement account. If you have an employer-sponsored retirement plan, such as a 401(k), 403(b), or governmental 457(b), understand your options for your account. You may decide to take your money out and pay the associated taxes. And if you are younger than age 59½, there may be additional tax penalties for early withdrawal.

Another option is to roll over your account into your retirement account at your new employer (if they allow it) or into an individual retirement account (IRA) that you set up.

Some company plans allow you to keep your money in their plan; however, you will continue to be subject to the rules of that plan regarding investment choices, distribution options, and loan availability. If you have any concerns about the future viability of the company you are leaving, you may want to move your money out of that plan into an account that you manage and control.

3. Manage your health insurance. If you don't already have a new position lined up or if your new employer's health plan has a waiting period, figure out where you will get coverage to fill the gap.

employees, you'll be able to keep your current plan for 18 to 36 months after you stop working under the Consolidated Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act (COBRA). (The length of time depends on a variety of factors.) You'll likely have to pay more because you will pay both your share of the premium and what your employer used to pay. If that's the case, you may want to compare costs to coverage available on the government's health insurance marketplace.

Another thing to consider is that if you live in a state with a health insurance mandate and you do not purchase coverage, you may have a tax penalty (depending on your income).

- 4. Spend your flexible spending account (FSA) money. If you put pretax money into FSA to pay for health care or child care, try to spend all the money in the account before you resign because FSAs typically operate on a use-it-or-lose-it basis (though you may be able to extend it with COBRA). In contrast, if you have money in a health savings account (HSA), that money is yours to keep.
- 5. Consider a group life and disability insurance conversion. If you have life or disability coverage through your employer, you may be able to convert your group policy to an individual policy that you can take with you. Check with the insurer to see if that's the case. Often you have a short window after your resignation to apply for continued coverage. This can be an especially good option if insurers consider you a risk because of your age or medical condition.
- 6. Check your employment contract and noncompete agreement. If you signed any legal documents when you were hired, have a labor attorney evaluate their terms and enforceability.

Some contracts may require you to pay back relocation money, education grants, or bonuses if you don't stay for a certain period. Others include "golden handcuffs" that may indicate you will lose unvested options, restricted stock, deferred compensation, and other benefits upon resignation. Still others may require waiting for a specified length of time before taking a job with a competitor.

7. Check the terms of stock options, restricted stock, or other forms of nonsalary compensation. The vesting schedule is key because you may want to delay your departure if a valuable number of options will vest in the near future. If you're already vested, find out if you're still subject to the same trading windows and how much time you have to exercise your vested options once you resign. In many cases, options expire if they aren't exercised within a certain time frame typically 90 days after your departure.

Tony Trischka's EarlJam: A Tribute to Earl Scruggs Banjo Great

Unity Hall is thrilled to present the great Tony Trischka in its intimate 120-seat theater on Friday, March 22 at 8PM. This is a rare opportunity for music fans to see Trischka in a small venue close to home. He is considered the consummate banjo artist and perhaps the most influential banjo player in the roots music world.

According to the NY Times "Tony Trischka is known as the father of modern blue grass." For more than 50 vears, his stylings have inspired a whole generation of bluegrass and acoustic musicians with the many voices he has brought to the instrument.

In this performance, Tony will be honoring the music of Earl Scruggs, pioneer of the three-finger banjo style and one of the most important musicians in bluegrass, or, in Tony's opinion, in any genre.

Trischka recently came into possession of extremely rare recordings of jam sessions with Scruggs and John

Hartford, and he's transcribed and recorded Scruggs's note-for-note solos from a number of these. Many songs that Earl had never recorded.

An album of this music is in production with a new label formed by some of the founders of Rounder Records and includes a number of bluegrass luminaries.

Together with his ace band—Michael Daves on vocals and guitar, fiddler Nate Lee, and bassist Jared Engelthey will trace the story of Scruggs from his childhood to his final years. This show debuted at Joe's Pub in New York City which drew lots of interest including an appearance on the Grand Ole Opry, a rarity for a banjo player these days.

"Earl is my North Star, a lifetime pathway. And I'm not alone," says Trischka, a banjo innovator and educator who has influenced everyone from Béla Fleck to Steve Martin. "Through his music, this shy kid from Flint Hill, North Carolina went on to enrich countless thousands of lives. At the age of 13, when I first heard 16 notes of Scruggs style banjo playing, I put down my folk guitar and mercilessly pestered my parents to buy me a banjo. Once in my hands, that 5-string became my obsession and has been for 60 years."

He adds, "the depth of his genius becomes ever more apparent when I transcribe his solos, which I've been doing my entire musical life and with renewed vigor. Discovering new twists and turns in his playing is pure joy and in fact the inspiration for this tribute show and


