

Annual Holocaust Program, May 9

Please join us for the Annual Helen and Leon Sperling Holocaust Program on Thursday, May 9, 7:30, at the Jewish Community Center, Utica. Our speaker is Michael Gyory, the son of Hungarian survivors. He will talk about his life as the child of survivors, and also growing up as the nephew of his Dad's 6 first cousins, all of whom survived the horrors of war and the concentration camps. One of these cousins, Aunt Agi, is alive at 103 and still holds an athletic world record. He will share her amazing story with us.

Prior to 1944 most Jews in Hungary were protected from deportation to German extermination camps. However they were subject to a prolonged period of terrible oppression by anti-Jewish laws that imposed limits on their participation in public and economic life. From the start of the German occupation of Hungary in 1944, Jews and Roma (gypsies) were deported to the Auschwitz concentration camp.

Michael Gyori has a master's degree from the Annenberg School of the University of Pennsylvania. He is a member of Generations Forward, a group of second and third generation people sponsored by the Holocaust and Human Rights Education Center of White Plains. He is also the Chairman of the Board of that organization.

We are fortunate to have Mr. Gyory with us. His talk will appeal to teens and adults, and we encourage you

Stanley Theatre Series



Over the next several months, we would like to share some of Malio Cardarelli's descriptions of artists who have appeared at the Stanley Theater.

Stanley Theatre Series

Over the next several months, we will present a brief look at only a fraction of those hundreds, perhaps thousands of artists who over the years have appeared on the Stanley Theater stage since its auspicious opening on September 10, 1928--ninety years ago. Hopefully, we have selected an acceptable array of different musical talents who have so enriched this historic stage.

Not included are those countless artists who have appeared with the Broadway Theater League, The Great Artists Series, the Utica Symphony Orchestra and other organizational groups. Here, however, we deal mostly with those who came on their own. Certainly, some readers will be disappointed that we did not include a favorite performer they might have personally viewed here. To them our sincere apologies with our hopes that they will understand how difficult the selection task has been. Our first and foremost concern was to include local artists who appeared on the Stanley stage and who have distinguished themselves beyond the confines of our community. This then is our brief look, hopefully to your enjoyment and edification, at just a bit of what the Stanley Theater stage has offered to Utica and surrounding communities. Chuck Mangione 1944 Trumpeter, Flugelhorn Player, Composer



Chuck Mangione, jazz composer, flugelhorn player, and trumpeter was born in Rochester, New York on November 29, 1940. Always with an interest in music, he studied piano at age 8, but shortly thereafter changed to the trumpet. Through his father, he became associated with some of the great names in Jazz, especially Dizzy Gillespie who, much impressed with the quality of Chuck's playing, gave him one of his own horns when Chuck was age 15. In high school, Chuck and his brother, Gap, formed what became a very successful jazz quintet, while at the same time attending the Eastman School of Music. When in 1965 while living in New York City, Mangione successfully set out to see if he could make it on his own. The Rochester native has some 30 albums to his credit, earning International fame with his jazz-pop single, Feels so Good. His long list of engagements on stage and TV includes a 1973 appearance on the Merv Griffith show that provided him with 12 uninterrupted minutes of music. Mangione appeared at the Stanley Theater three times between 1981 and 1994--always to enthusiastic audiences demanding encores.



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
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

We've all heard the phrase "It's the little things in life". If you stop to reflect back on simple moments of joy in your previous day, was it the moment the sun rose above the horizon? Was it the sound of the male cardinal calling to his mate? Was it going to the grocery store and having a stranger say hello? Was it sitting down to a meal with family? I could go on and on. I'm sure if you stopped to think about it, there are so many moments of joy throughout your day that go unnoticed while you're busy rushing to


accomplish what you believe has to be done for the day. I'm as guilty as anyone of that!

Gardening certainly helps us slow down and be more present. It helps "ground" us and gets us back to nature. Gardening gets us outdoors and working with our hands which always adds to our wellbeing. Planting, dead-heading, watering and fertilizing helps to keep our focus on the task of keeping our well-chosen plants alive.

It's finally here, time to dig out the containers from the shed or garage and head to our local grower and choose combinations of annuals for our summer flowers. Some of us have found the perfect plants that we know do well in our sunny or shady location and might simply switch using different colors each year. Many of us like to peruse the multiple options, always ready to try something new and different.

Monoculture pots, those planted using all one plant type, are always stunning and very showy from a distance. I recommend planting large pots with one type of plant for the front of the house. These are best when they are bold and colorful. Save the combination pots with the mix of interesting plants for the back porch or deck where they are viewed up close. Think of these pots as floral designs with roots! This is where the thriller, filler and spiller concept comes into play. Various heights create such interest and allows you to try out different flowers and textures of plant material. There are endless combinations and I'm often stunned at the beautiful creations that my customers pick out and place in their boxes when they check out.

Time to head out to your local grower to see what new and exciting plants they've grown for you. Don't forget...smile...it's the little things!

Muscle

We should all, at any age, be concerned about developing or maintaining muscle. Teenagers use resistance training to improve their aesthetic presence, improve their athletic performance and perhaps unknowingly, to improve their self esteem. Muscle building, for young adults energizes their career, marriage and family life. Older adults, simply want to be illness-free and potentially live to a ripe old age.

In the 1960's-1980's, Kennith Cooper, in his book 'Aerobics' encouraged Americans to prioritize cardiovascular exercise to help prevent heart disease. Initially, his suggestion for cardio exercise was 12 or more minutes of exercise involving large muscle groups, done in a rhythmic fashion, at 60-85% of our heart rate maximum, on most days of the week. That short duration of exercise evolved into 5K, 10k road races and even marathons. Unfortunately, fast foods were popularized in our culture at about the same time and even enormous amounts of exercise could not cancel the I'll effects of our poor diet. Before beginning an exercise program, it's essential that you consult with your doctor

Why address your body's musculature:

*Without a muscle's attachment to bones we would not enjoy the ability to move.

*Muscles cross every joint in our body, providing protection from joint damage.

*Our musculoskeletal system allows us to perform work.

*A balanced musculoskeletal system improves our posture.

*Muscles require fuel, in the form of stored calories, allowing us to maintain an ideal body weight.

The most important component to build or maintain muscle is NOT protein intake, or any of the media hyped popular supplements, but resistance training, in



the form of weights, machines or rubber tubing. Studies show that subjects even gained muscle on highly restrictive diet (under 500 calories per day). Protein does play a role in gaining muscle. Those who are active in sports and are regularly engaged in resistance training should ingest 1.2-2.2 grams of protein per kilogram body weight (divide your weight in pounds by 2.2) per day. drinks don't count. Although resistance training turns the muscle building switch on, it is recovery that builds muscle. After an intense resistance workout, muscle cells and subsequent muscle fibers must be allowed to grow microscopically thicker and stronger (muscle hypertrophy). Overtraining thwarts reaching the goal of building bigger and stronger muscles. In fact, it has the exact opposite effect and overtrained muscles actually stop growing or get smaller. Overtraining also over taxes our immune system and makes us more susceptible to illness. More is NOT better, as it relates to muscle building. Intensity trumps volume every time.

What's most overlooked when attempting to build muscle is the role of water. Each cell in our body consists of about 70% water. In fact, without water, protein cannot be metabolized effectively and will slow the muscle building process. Eight glasses of water used to be the recommendation of experts. In order to build muscle, I'd suggest drinking significantly more than 96 ounces a day. Coffee, tea and popular sports

After age 40, muscle loss can be 8% per decade. Up to 50% of our strength can be lost between the ages of 25-80. To combat this loss, strength training is a must. Three, non-consecutive resistance workouts a week will reduce muscle and overall strength decreases. Non-consecutive workouts, allowing 48 hours to recover, is a critical component. It's important to emphasize, exercise turns the muscle building or muscle maintenance switch on, recovery is the real key. As we age, 1-2 sets per exercise, done to momentary muscular failure at (8-12 repetitions) is a recipe for success.

Regardless, if you are a seasoned resistance training veteran or a beginner, you can reap the benefits of resistance training. Beginners need to start with light weights and progress slowly. Each repetition should be performed in a slow and controlled manner. Fast repetitions are counterproductive and dangerous. For years, athletes assumed fast resistance movements would produce increased speed and power. A plethora of studies strongly dispute this theory. Last, but very important, you will be engaged in resistance training to build strength, not demonstrate it. There's no need to do single repetition maximum attempts. Young athletes may get away with one rep maximums once a month and young adults maybe every 6-8 weeks. Older adults should not attempt maximum lifts. Muscle building/ maintaining should be a priority in any serious fitness program.

Discussion on Irish Poet - Patrick Condon





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ALWAYS KEEP GROWING! GARDENING TIPS FROM A PHYSICAL THERAPIST

Common gardening activities, such as digging, planting, weeding, mulching, and raking can cause stress and strain on muscles and joints. Different body areas such as the shoulders, neck, back and knees can be vulnerable to injury during gardening. The following tips can help minimize or prevent injuries:

- · Warm up before you garden. A 10-minute brisk walk and stretching for the spine and limbs are good ways to warm up.
- Change positions frequently to avoid stiffness or cramping.
- Be aware of how your body feels as you work in your garden. If a part of your body starts to ache, take a stretch break or switch to a different gardening activity.
- Make use of a garden cart or wheelbarrow to move heavy planting materials or tools.
- If kneeling on both knees causes discomfort in your back, try knee pads or a gardening pad when kneeling.
- If kneeling or leaning down to the ground causes significant pain in your back or knees, consider using elevated planters to do your gardening.
- · Use good body mechanics when you pick something up or pull on something. Bend your knees, tighten your abdominals, and keep your back straight as you lift or pull things.
- Avoid twisting your spine or knees when moving things to the side; instead, move your . feet or pivot on your toes to turn your full body as one unit.
- End your gardening session with some gentle backward bending of your low back, a . short walk and light stretching.







Our crews are out sweeping roadways, sweeping town sidewalks, and picking up green waste and brush. When putting out the brush and leftover leaves from last fall, please separate the piles. Don't mix them. If your pile is unusually large, please don't hesitate to call for a special pick-up. The road crew will be cleaning ditches on roads that may be paved this summer.

I want to thank all the homeowners for their patience as your highway employees work diligently to collect branches and brush from the town's 82 miles of streets. Recently you should have received in the mail, your town's annual Trash & Brush Collection Schedule for 2024, outlining curbside brush and garbage schedule and drop off at the Highway Garage. The schedule is also on the town's website at townofnewhartfordny. gov. Go to Highway Department, click on curbside and the schedule will pop up. You can also stop by the Town Hall and pick up a schedule, if you didn't receive one.

Again, this year we will be offering our tag service from April through September, for items that are

unable to be brought to the Highway Garage, and need to be picked up at a residence. The tag this year is again \$5.00 per item and can be purchased at the Town Clerk's Office, 8635 Clinton Street, New Hartford. Please pick up tags no later than the Friday before the first Monday of every month. This service will be suspended in the month of October for the annual curbside garbage pickup in front of the residences. On May 11th there will be a garbage drop off at the Highway Garage from 7:00 a.m. until noon. We will also be offering the CONFIDATA DESTRUCTION SERVICE for shredding of private papers, on-site from 8:00 a.m. until noon for our constituents. Each person is limited to ten boxes of papers to shred.

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
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






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
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


Utica Rotary's Service Above Self Gala **Returns to Stanley Theatre on June 7**

Your New Hartford Volunteer Fire Department responded to129 alarms during the month of March 2024 as indicated by the monthly alarm report listed below by category:

Fires = 4 EMS = 60 Hazardous = 5 Service Type = 24 Good Intent = 7 Special Incident = 1 Other Alarms = 28 Weather Related = 0 Other = 0



Total Calls for the Month of March 2023 = 129. Of the 129 alarms, 102 were in the town, 24 were in the village, and 3 mutual aid calls.

This brings the total alarms for 2024 to 334.

Some of the calls listed above - such as Fires, EMS, and Hazardous - are self explanatory. Others such as Service, Good Intent and Other Alarms are not. Service Calls include water or animal problems, public assistance or standbys. Good Intent refers to responding but did not find anything or canceled in route. Other alarms include explosions, carbon monoxide, smoke, or sprinkler detector activations.

The figures above do not include other activities by members of the department such as Fire Prevention details, training, parades, Open House and other various department committee meetings that take place throughout the year.

New Hartford Fire Department Schedules Annual Memorial Day Parade and Open House Stephen Moran Named **Grand Marshall**

The New Hartford Volunteer Fire Department, in conjunction with the Village of New Hartford, the New Hartford Chamber of Commerce and Richard Sherman, Town Highway Superintendent, will hold its Annual Seven-Division Memorial Day Parade and Open House on Monday evening, May 27, 2024.

Stephen J Moran, a US Army Veteran who has served not only his country but his community, has been named this year's Grand Marshall.

Born in 1946 to Robert and Rosemary (Magee) lifelong Village of New Hartford residents he attended and graduated from St John the Evangelist Catholic grade school. Upon graduating he attended the original Notre Dame High School on Genesee Street and graduated from New Hartford High School class

of 1964.

November of 1964. He trained as a recruit at Ft Dix, New Jersey after which he attended the US Army Aviation school in Ft Eustis and graduated as an aircraft mechanic specializing in fixed wing aircraft. He was then assigned to duty in Germany in 1965 for 11 months at the US Army Aviation Maintenance Center (USAMAC) in Mannheim Germany as an aircraft crew chief and attained the ranks of PFC and Specialist 4th class.

In 1966 he was transferred to the Republic of South Vietnam south of Saigon that today is known as Ho Chi Minh City. There he was assigned to the 54th Aviation Company, 255th Transportation Detachment where responsibilities included maintaining the flight availability of 12 fixed wing aircraft. On this tour he was promoted to Specialist 5th Class.

He is the recipient of the United States Army Commendation Medal for meritorious service in a hostile combat environment by maintaining a 98.9% aircraft availability and readiness along with the Good Conduct Medal and Republic of Vietnam service Medal. He was honorably discharged in October 1967.

Moran, a resident of the Village of New Hartford, is a 38 year member of the New Hartford Volunteer Fire Department and a 15 year past member of the Poland Fire Department, where he obtained the rank and served as Fire Chief. He is also a 53 year member and Past Commander of Adirondack American Legion Post in Coldbrook and a past member of the VFW Post 1554 in Poland, NY.

He has two children Gary in Australia and Chris in the Town of New Hartford and grandchildren in both countries.



Civil War Program Decimated: The 146th NY at The Battle of the Wilderness with Michael Fisher

May 2024 marks the 160th anniversary of the Battle of the Wilderness. The casualties were high with almost half of the enlisted men and officers becoming casualties. The 146th New York Volunteers from Oneida County had several soldiers among the injured and captured. This program by Michael Fisher will share the personal stories of these men and emphasize the terrible consequences of this deadly Civil War battle.

The 146th New York State Volunteers was a unit raised in Oneida County. In the fall of 1862 the troops crossed the Rapidan River in Virginia with the Army of the Potomac. Over the next two days, the 146th would engage with the Confederates in horrific field conditions and suffer the highest number of casualties the 146th saw in the entire war.

Michael Fischer is a historian based in Jewell, New York. His family history includes ancestors who lived in Utica, including a great-granduncle who was captured at The Battle of Wilderness.
