

Fall Is Calling

Even though we may not be ready to answer the call, Fall is calling! I hope everyone was able to better manage the watering and fertilizing of their summer annuals. I believe watering is the number one determining factor of success in growing any type of plant. Just think of the calming experience that comes over us when we are tending to our plants! It truly brings us into the present moment. Isn't that where the experts keep telling us to live for a happy life? So, now to keep us all present, I'm going to go over mum care! Amazingly enough, it's not the same as summer annuals!

Mums are perennials, that may or may not over winter in our zone. That's an entire article by itself for another time. Similar to all perennials, they have a bloom season. They bloom beginning in the fall with shortening daylengths. Can they possibly get any smarter? They form buds and flower once and do not rebloom like annuals. As a long-time grower of mums, the entire job of fertilization has already been completed for you when you purchase them. Your job is to keep them well watered throughout their 6-8 week long bloom period and enjoy their display of fall color!

Mums will start to wilt as soon as they need water. If this happens too often in your care, the blossom size will diminish and you won't get that beautiful rounded ball of color you were hoping for. Mums want to stay evenly moist. I recommend watering daily, until the time you begin to wear a coat. When the weather every other day watering will suffice. They are "ready to



To get the most enjoyment out of your mums, you should always buy them with "swelled" buds or just beginning to "crack" color to enjoy their entire lifespan. The only reason you would buy mums with a lot of color would be if you needed the color right away to decorate for a special event. Buying mums in full color usually disappoints most consumers, because they tell me their mums never last. That disappointment comes from them not realizing they have purchased mums at their peak bloom and they are now headed downhill to the end of their bloom cycle. Mums love as much sun as you can give them and will tolerate shade once the plant is about 25% bloomed.

Fall is calling and bringing a smile to my face, I hope you're smiling too!

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





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Stanley Theatre Series



Malio Cardarelli Over the next several months, we would like to share some of Malio Cardarelli's descriptions of artists who have appeared at the Stanley Theater.

Gene Autry (1907-1998) Singer, Actor, Cowboy

Texas born on September 29, 1907, Orvon Grover 'Gene' Autry, widely known as the singing cowboy, appeared on the Stanley Theater Stage in February 1963. Discovered by Humorist Will Rogers, his career was multifaceted - known as a country singer and songwriter, musician, actor in motion pictures, radio, and television, rodeo performer, and successful businessman. Appearing in more than 90 films, he also hosted the mid 1900's TV weekly, *The Gene Autry Show*. Perhaps his most famous tunes were *Back in the Saddle Again* and *You Are My Sunshine*, his memorable holiday tunes are *Rudolph the Red-nosed Reindeer*, *Frosty the Snowman*, and *Here Comes Santa Claus*. Sales of his recorded songs exceeded 100 million. It is said that *Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer* alone sold more than 30 million copies. Autry was a member of the Country Music Hall of Fame and the Nashville Hall of Fame and he appears on the Hollywood Walk of Fame. The beloved entertainer died in California on October 2, 1998.



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Resistance Training and Cardio 101 **Resistance Training**

The Rep: moving a resistance (weight) from a joint's extension, through a full range of motion, to a fully flexed position, then returning it to the joint's extension. A general rule of thumb is to take two seconds from extension to flexion, pause one second to reduce momentum, and take four seconds to return the weight to its starting position.

The Set: is a series of repetitions done consecutively. A set of 2-5 repetitions generally encourages gains in muscular strength. A set of 6-12 repetitions will produce muscle hypertrophy (increased muscular girth) while a set of 12 or more repetitions improves muscular endurance.

What is the ideal number of sets: I've had a great deal of success performing one set to momentary muscular failure, where performing another repetition, in good form, is impossible. Many feel multiple sets, performed shy of momentary muscular failure is better. They have the time to perform multiple sets.

Barbells & Dumbbells: for over a century, barbells and dumbbells have been the chosen modes of resistance training. I used primarily barbells and dumbbells for over 10 years. Gravity compromises the effectiveness of both barbells and dumbbells. Gravity is a vertical force, while the joints tend to be more rotational. Our anatomical advantage and disadvantage changes throughout the range of motion. A simple

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example is the biceps curl. At the beginning of the movement, while our arms are fully extended, we are at an anatomical disadvantage. As we move the weight through the range of motion, we gain an anatomical advantage. Variable resistance, that accommodates anatomical advantages and disadvantages is absent when using barbells and dumbbells, but there is a mild addiction to moving weights.

Variable Resistance Machines: I was first introduced to variable resistance in high school. Our school purchased a Multi Station Universal Machine. It attempted to vary resistance using a long lever. Although it was not terribly accurate, you could actually feel the varying resistance while performing an exercise. What made the machine special was it allowed several students to exercise at the same time.

While recovering from mononucleosis, while in graduate school, I researched high intensity, variable resistance exercise. Nautilus came on the scene in the early 70's. The Miami Dolphins promoted Nautilus as their chosen equipment to ready them for the 1972 season and also promoted its use during the season. In 1972, the Miami Dolphins went undefeated, the last team to do so. Nautilus became popular for athletes and non-athletes. I used Nautilus, exclusively to prepare for the 1979 Mr. Kentucky and placed 2nd, followed by a win in the Mr. Southeast USA. A cam, shaped like a Nautilus shell is used to vary the resistance, much like 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th gear in our car's transmission. To date, in my professional opinion, Nautilus is the most accurate tool for varying resistance.

Cardiovascular Exercise

There is no magic mode of cardiovascular exercise. Your best choice is the one you moderately enjoy and find somewhat comfortable. There are only two primary factors that contribute to effective cardiovascular exercise: Heart Rate and Time. Heart Rate: cardio is effective when your heart rate ranges from 60-85% of your age appropriate maximum (220-your age) multiplied by .60-.85.

20-60 minutes. It's important to remember, you can go hard for shorter periods of time or easier for a longer stretches.

Mode: as mentioned, there is no magic cardio. Heart Rate and Time are the components that matter most, regardless if you run, walk, bike, swim or row.

Sticking with regular exercise is truly a "cause and



The History of the South Bend Watch Company

The South Bend Watch Company, an iconic name in American horology, epitomizes the rich heritage of watchmaking in the United States. Founded in South Bend, Indiana, in 1903, the company made significant contributions to the American watch industry, blending precision engineering with innovative design. Its history is a testament to the evolution of American manufacturing and the enduring appeal of classic timepieces.

The company's origins trace back to a group of local businessmen and watch enthusiasts who saw a potential market for American-made watches. South Bend, a city already known for its manufacturing prowess, was chosen as the site for the new enterprise. 

This year we will invite the following departments to join us, The Willowvale Fire Company, Clayville Fire Department, Sauquoit Fire Department, New York Mills fire Department, Westmoreland Fire Department, Yorkville Fire Department, Whitesboro Fire Department and Clinton Fire Department, along with the Hew Hartford Police Department and Edwards Ambulance in honor of the nearly 3,000 people lost on September 11, 2001.

The route for the 9/11 memorial walk is as follows:

- Paris Road to Overbrook Cres
- Overbrook Cres to Sanger Ave
- Sanger Ave to Pearl St.
- Pearl St. to Park St.
- Park St. to Oxford Rd.
- Oxford Rd. to Graham Ave
- Graham Ave to Bonnie Ln.
- Bonnie Ln. to Bohling Rd.
- Bohling Rd. to Oxford Rd.
- Oxford Rd. to Hoffman Rd.
- Hoffman Rd. to Hartford Terr.
- Hartford Terr. To Sherman St.
- Sherman St. to Oxford Rd.
- Oxford Rd. to Station

This will total 3.43 miles, which will honor the 343 FDNY members whose lives were lost on 9-11-2001.

We will sound the station horn and start our walk at 8:46 a.m., the same time that American Airlines Flight 11 crashed into the North Tower.

We will also sound the station horn again at the following times:

9:03 a.m. - United Airlines Flight 175 crashed into the South Tower.

9:37 a.m. - American Airlines Flight 77 crashed into the Pentagon.

10:03 a.m. - United Airlines Flight 93 crashed near Shanksville, Pennsylvania after passengers and crew stormed the cockpit. Forty people on board lost their lives.

Each of the members walking will carry the name of a New York City Firefighter (FDNY) with them during the walk and read their name, as they ring a bell, in remembrance of them on that day in front of our station. All the Volunteers walking in remembrance of 9/11

appreciate the support of our community.

It has been a busy summer and our brush piles have been overwhelming at times causing our schedule to be off. The LAST brush pickup will be the week in Ward 1 September 3rd -September 6th, Ward 2 pickup will be the week of September 9th - September 13th, Ward 3 will be the week of September 16th- September 20th and Ward 4th pick up will be the week of September 23rd - September 27th. So please plan to get your brush to the curb for the set dates. We need to be finished on these dates for the 2024 season. We will not pick up any brush after these dates unless we have storm damage that brings tree limbs etc. down. The brush crew will be working on other projects this fall. Curbside trash pickup starts Ward 1 Sept 30th-Oct 4th, Ward 2 Oct 7th-11th, Ward 3 Oct 14th-18th, Ward 4 Oct 21st-25th.

Leaf removal will begin as warranted in the month of September if needed and October. So please get your leaves to the curb early, don't wait. Please do not place leaves in plastic bags or container such as plastic garbage cans. Our 4 leaf trucks will be out working to pick up the leaves. There will be 1 truck in each ward picking the leaves.

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

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
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

Invest More Confidently in Volatile Markets

When financial markets fluctuate, perhaps in reaction to world events, inflation, or a change in interest rates, even the calmest investors can start to question their financial strategies.

But volatile markets can present opportunities to review and reaffirm investment strategies, says Tracie McMillion, head of global asset allocation strategy for Wells Fargo Investment Institute.

"Financial markets are frequently volatile — that's their nature," she says. "Even so, during periods of uncertainty, investors may start to question their investment decisions. Having a plan in place can provide the guard rails to help steer through and beyond the volatility."

In addition to reaffirming and focusing on your plan, here are some strategies you can use to help weather economically turbulent times.

Match your investments to your time horizon

The simplest way to feel more comfortable about your investments is to align them with your financial calendar, no matter what happens in the financial world this month or year.

For example, do you need some of your money fairly soon or want it close at hand in case of an emergency? If so, McMillion says you should consider investments such as cash holdings and short-term bonds that shouldn't lose much, if any, value over the short term.

On the other hand, if you won't need some of your investment money until you retire multiple years in the future, equities or longer-term bonds are worth a closer look. Those investments carry more risks but also offer potentially better returns.

Know what to expect from your investments

Some investors lose confidence because they don't fully understand how their investments work. In that case, McMillion says, some knowledge of typical asset behavior is a good thing.

Consider reading up on different types of investments

and asking questions of your financial advisor. Once you know how your investments are more likely to perform in certain financial markets, you can help ensure that your investment strategy is in line with your tolerance for risk.

Tune out the noise

By "noise," McMillion means the constant barrage of financial reports and other news events from the 24/7 news media. "Investors usually don't need to react to the everyday financial news, no matter how topsyturvy things may seem," she says. Keep your long-term goal in mind.

Regularly revisit your plan

There's no such thing as a completely set-it-and-forgetit investment strategy, McMillion says. It's always smart to check in regularly with your investment advisor.

"Your life circumstances may change, or your financial goals could shift," she says. "You can feel much more confident that your investments are doing their job if you review them regularly with your advisor."
