An exhibit by La Banda Rossa, also known as the Red Band, will be featured during the month of April at the New Hartford Public Library. The band originated in 1905 and has continued to entertain audiences with a combination of unique and traditional Italian music, along with other popular songs and marches. The band came into existence at the turn of the 20th Century, when many Italians came to the United States and brought many parts of their culture with them. A group of musicians would regularly meet at the Sons of Italy in Utica. When a band was needed to perform at religious feasts and processions to honor their patron saints La Banda Rossa was formed.

As a concert band they perform at church festivals and feasts, special events, and traditional summer concerts in the park, with an emphasis on Italian compositions. As a marching band they perform in Italian street processions, community parades and patriotic events. The group has performed at numerous Italian festivals

across New York state, at the New York State Fair, in Boston's North End and in Toronto. The band has recorded two CDs. Arlene Iagnocco has conducted the band for more than 30 years and is the first woman to have that honor.



#### "Raise Our Roof" for St. John's **Nursery School**

Special things happen in New Hartford for our youngest students at the corner of Oxford Road and Sherman Street.

Adjacent to St. John the Evangelist Catholic Church and just up Sherman Street, you might remember this smaller building on the church campus was once a Catholic Elementary School that taught New Hartford students in grades K-8 from 1954-1986.

Today this building is home to St. John the Evangelist Nursery School, a preschool education center designed to meet the changing education and care needs of New Hartford and surrounding area families and youngest students.

St. John's Nursery School started soon after the school closed, initially offering limited half-day classes for 3 and 4 year olds. Today's education program has evolved, continues to grow and is New York State licensed.

Ninety preschoolers joined the fun and learning on campus for the 2024-25 school year, while an additional 15 older Bradley Elementary school students participate in before and after school care programs, designed to help parents better balance work and home life. A brand new Mommy and Me group was formed just this year, to gently introduce the youngest students to a classroom setting, along with their favorite caregiver. In recent years, the Nursery School has expanded its community offerings, by extending the hours classes are offered

during the school week and adding to the summer safe, and warm. school break programming to better meet the current needs of students and families.

The preschool education for three and four-yearolds teaches through music, arts, creative and physical activities, as well as other organized student experiences, with a full-time teacher and teacher assistant in each classroom. The atmosphere is comfortable, creative, and non-sexist. Children have the opportunity to increase their physical, intellectual, social, emotional, and spiritual well-being. While the school incorporates a Christian environment, classes are open to families of all races and creeds and the staff is focused on keeping tuition affordable.

"We are a big family!" explains Cristin Heselton, the now full-time Director of St. John the Evangelist Nursery School. "It is a vibrant community that prides itself on providing a loving and enriching learning environment for all of our students."

Heselton adds, "Our school holds a very special place in my heart. Two of my own children attended years ago, I have taught here for many years, and I've had the honor of serving as Director for the past 5 years." Administrative Assistant Traci Collea taught for 17 years before moving into her current position for the last 5 years. Her two children also graduated from the school, and her daughter returned to St. John's as a teacher, after earning her degree in Child and Family Studies. Many of the Nursery School teachers have been on staff for many years and can count their own kids among the school's special alumni.

It's a happy, busy place. In addition to all that the Nursery School offers the community, the same building is used by the church for its Faith Formation classes, summer camp programs, and the Girl Scouts use the school classrooms as a regular meeting place.

Like many buildings built over 70 years ago, the Nursery School building is starting to show its age. In order to continue to provide the high-quality preschool education and the other family resources our students deserve, the school staff and faculty are finding themselves dealing with more frequent and more costly maintenance issues.

Of utmost concern at all times is the safety and comfort of our young students and their families. In the last few years, the age of the building has brought challenges to the staff as they try to keep the structure functioning,

Major projects in the past three years include installing new sinks and toilets in all the school bathrooms. This fall the original 71 year-old boiler had to be replaced with a new efficient heating system. The exterior was upgraded in 2023 with new playground equipment and fenced-in play space funded through a NYS grant.

The biggest need for the school is a new roof. The original roof has been patched more times than it should, and now the roof needs to be replaced. With the Nursery School helping to fund so many recent capital maintenance projects, the expense of the new roof is a huge undertaking.

We have had over thirty years of wonderful families and alumni come to our preschool and religious education classes. Beyond that, so many alumni from the K-8 Catholic elementary school can recall happy school years spent in our building. Many parents and grandparents from the community enter our building and recall fond memories of the time spent here. We would like to be able to continue to welcome new families to do the same.

St. John's has begun looking for ways to reach a big goal - estimates for our new roof range from

\$300,000-\$400,000, and the need is immediate.

The school is asking parents, their extended families, nursery school alumni and St John's Elementary alumni, and the greater New Hartford community, to consider a gift to support efforts to "raise our roof." The "Raise Our Roof Campaign" at St. John the Evangelist Nursery School hopes to have the new roof installed by the Spring or Summer of 2025.




# Stanley Theatre Series

Charles Albert Schneider, Orchestral Conductor 1938 - 2020

As music director of the Utica Symphony Orchestra for more than three decades, along with conducting several operas and even performing at the piano a few times, perhaps none has stepped onto the Stanley Theater stage more often than Maestro Charles A. Schneider. Born in Albert Lea, Minnesota on September 16, 1938, he went to public school there and putting aside his interest and achievements in sports, he began what has become a lifetime devotion to music, studying primarily with renowned conductors, but with no less emphasis on his concert-quality expertise at the piano enhanced at the Julliard School of Music. Schneider studied music extensively and frequently appeared in all sorts of musical presentations-opera, ballet, classical concerts, and Broadway, not the least of which-approved by Leonard Bernstein himself--was to conduct a six-month tour of "West Side Story" starring Anna Maria Alberghetti, Christopher Walken, and Leland Palmer. And it was Bernstein who selected Maestro Schneider to conduct Bernstein's 50th Birthday Production at Lincoln Center. The conductor's list of concert podium stints with an array of all levels of Broadway and classical stars is indeed well beyond inclusion in the limited space herein provided. One of his last podium performances was the everlastingly popular Beethoven's "9th Symphony," a performance of the Clinton Symphony Orchestra, happily in attendance by this writer who proudly developed a personal friendship with the conductor. Maestro Schneider's death on October 9, 2020, is a significant loss to the local community where he made his home with his wife, Rayna, for the past several years.







#### **April NHFD News**

Your New Hartford Volunteer Fire Department responded to 103 alarms during the month of February 2025. The monthly call report is listed below by category.

Fires = 1 EMS = 46 Hazardous = 4 Service Type = 11

Good Intent = 14 False Alarms = 27

Weather Related = 0

Other = 0

Total Calls for the Month of February 2025 = 103.

Of the 103 alarms, 84 were in the town and 15 were in the village with 4 mutual aid alarms. This brings the total number of alarms for 2025 year to date to 201.

Some of the calls listed above - such as Fires, EMS, and Hazardous - are self-explanatory. Others such as Service, Good Intent and Other Alarms are not. Service Calls include water or animal problems, public assistance or standbys. Good Intent refers to responding but did not find anything or canceled in route. Other alarms include explosions, carbon monoxide, smoke or sprinkler detector activations.

The figures above do not include other activities by members of the department such as Fire Prevention details, training, parades, Open House and other various department committee meetings that take place throughout the year.

#### Fire Police Serve a Valuable Function

To the Department and Our Community

Since the 1950's, The New Hartford Volunteer Fire Department is proud to have a contingent of Fire Police members who answer the call of duty when the need arises. These individuals must attend and pass a specialized 21-hour training course. Upon completion, they must meet all the requirements under the New York State General Municipal Law, Section 209 (C) and Article 41 of the New York State CPL, Section 2.1.0 after which they take an oath of office and become sworn officers of the law – known as Peace Officers. As a Peace Officer, they are empowered with full police powers, including that of arrest, if need be, but just as important, these individuals are responsible to protect fellow firefighters and their equipment while protecting the public from the dangers in and around a fire emergency incident scene. These individuals are listed with the Central Registry of Police and Peace Officers at the New York State, Division of Criminal Justice Services, Office of Public Safety, in Albany.

Currently, ten individuals serve as active Fire Police members although additional department members have completed the course but remain as active firefighters. The public will recognize these individuals by their bright "safety" lime yellow outerwear which maybe a jacket, vest, or raincoat, depending upon the time of year and weather conditions. They are issued strobe hand lights and other traffic safety equipment, such as barricades to assist them in carrying out their responsibilities.

Their duties are as follows:

To regulate traffic at emergency scenes - The Fire Police detachment manages traffic at emergency scenes to protect firefighters from external dangers.

To protect the general public at the scene of a fire - Residents, owners, occupants, relatives, transients, spectators, and even the news media might inadvertently hamper firefighting operations; therefore, Fire Police use tact and courtesy to prevent them from being harmed or obstructing those operations.

To keep fire areas clear for firefighting purpose - Fire Police provide room for apparatus, emergency vehicles, service vehicles, and firefighters' personal vehicles, among other things, park, operate, turn around, perform tanker operations, and lay hose lines.

To protect the equipment of a fire company - Fire Police keep all non-firefighters away from- and especially off- department vehicles and equipment in order to prevent damage and possible injury.

To enforce the laws of New York State relating to firematic activities and firefighting techniques - The reckless disregard for safe driving within an emergency area, driving over fire hoses, disrespect for fire lines, and non-emergency vehicles

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intrusions, comprise just the tip of the iceberg of undesirable situations that Fire Police must prevent.

To cooperate with the NHPD - Owing to their common causes of protection, safety, and order, the Fire Police cooperate regularly with the New Hartford Police Department.

To protect the property - at the scene of a fire until the Chief releases the fire police from duty and turns the responsibility over to other police agencies or to the owner.

To carry out the orders of the Chief – The Chief is in command at all fires and emergencies.

Although, Fire Police prevent unauthorized entry into the scene, they remain alert to the fact that bystanders may possess critical information. In addition, they protect the scene's evidence and report unusual events or happenings.

When the public approaches a scene, Fire Police members may ask you to slow down and, in some cases, – move over. This is to protect the emergency personnel and yourself against potential, and sometimes unfortunate, situations.

For the safety of 1st responders, police officers, tow truck operators and all emergency personnel, New York State enacted the New York State- "Move Over" Traffic Law – VTL 1144-a(a). The law requires motorists to move over and change lanes -when it is safe to do so- to give safe clearance to law enforcement officers, firefighters, ambulance operators, utility works, tow truck operators, and sanitation workers to operate during and including an emergency. In some cases, disabled vehicles are included when their flashers are on. Under VTL 1144 a (a), fines can range up to \$150 for the first offense and up to \$300 for the second offense within 18 months with 2 points on your license.

Fire Police units exist in fourteen states including Connecticut, Delaware, Florida, Maryland, New Jersey, New York, North Carolina, Maine, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and West Virginia. In fact, some texts dating back to the 1850's, list Burlington County, New Jersey, as forming the first Fire Police unit.

#### What the History (WTH)!

#### A Return of the Chicken **Roost Gang?**

With the recent spike in the cost of eggs, and the scarcity of the delectable trays of chicken-deposited, white glistening beauties, one must ask, "could there be a return of the notorious family crime team the Chicken Roost Gang?" Back in the midst of the Great Depression, the availability of food for everyday families was difficult with many staples being far too expensive. It was not far from New Hartford, and in the midst of Otsego and Schoharie

Counties that 1936 was known as the "Year of the Stolen Chicken" as farmers were having their flocks taken in the middle of the night with the only clue the sound of a motorized car and left behind faint tire tracks. In 1936 the cost of gasoline was an expensive ten cents per gallon so that tells you that chickens were indeed expensive, especially live ones that could hatch eggs to be gently plucked from nests at the break of dawn. The thefts of chicken flocks in these two counties piled up with the local constable awarding the thieves the moniker, "The Chicken Roost Gang." For the entire year chicken flocks were stolen and all hens clucked with fear as their henhouses were no longer safe havens of hatchability. The Chicken Roost Gang pushed their luck as their success had emboldened them to steal from a farmer that was on ready alert. The thieves were finally apprehended when an eagle-eyed farmer held a stakeout with his hens stolen. The police were dispatched and just up the street from the farm, pulled over a getaway car with feathers flying out the

windows. The officers observed a car full of chickens clucking and bounding around the back seat. Apprehended were the family crime team of the father, Marvin Banks, the mother Anna Banks, and their two sons, Charles and Chancy. The farmer was able to identify his stolen chickens from a lineup and made the statement to the press, "I know my hens like I know my wife and children." Indeed, a farmer knows all intimate details of all animals within the bounds of their livestock territory. The Chicken Roost Gang would appear on trial in the two counties and were found guilty as charged. The poultry crime spree had been caught and cooked as all chickens were deemed safe from the rolling bandits. History has a way of repeating itself so the call must go out to all who keep, raise, and love their hens. Eggs must be under night surveillance by guards on-the-ready and by the most advanced electronic alarm systems as the price of eggs has reached the level per ounce of gold and silver. All chickens must, and shall be, under lawful protection. After all, criminals motivated by the Chicken Roost Gang may use their "eggspiration" to steal all available nest drops. All must be involved to stop this potential surge, otherwise we will see the decimation of available cookies, cakes, and breads, made with eggs.

#### A Fitness "Must"

I remember weight training in high school as a very competitive affair. Although none of us really had any formal instruction, we were competitive athletes, who were most concerned about the weights we lifted and the number of repetitions we could perform with a particular weight. No one informed us that there was a difference between 'building' strength and "demonstrating" strength. We fell prey to far too frequent workouts that found us "demonstrating" strength with maximum attempts in nearly every workout. Sloppy form in my teenage years has contributed to five back, three shoulder and several knee surgeries.

Let's talk about building strength versus demonstrating strength:

**Building Strength** is a several week, month and year process, where 3-5 and 6-12 repetitions are performed, 2-3 times a week. Although it's important to take sets to momentary muscular failure, a general rule is to perform three sets per exercise. Any more and you risk

overtraining and an actual loss of muscularity and strength.

**Demonstrating Strength** is when a one repetition maximum (1RM) is performed to gauge one's level of strength. One surprising note: the stronger one becomes, the less frequent should they attempt 1RM's. Several years ago, there was a national deadlift contest. The top three finishers, when asked, "how often do you max out during the year?" Their answer was 2-3 times in the entire year. An example would be a teenager whose 1RM on the Bench Press is 200 pounds and another whose 1RM is 400 pounds. A 200 1RM athlete may get away with maxing out every 2-3 weeks, while the 400 pound athlete can get away with maxing out every couple months. Hypothetically, the 400 pounder exhausts twice as many muscle fibers as the 200 pounder. Competitive high school athletes make the mistake of maxing out too frequently and the difficult lesson of sustaining an overuse injury.

Let's discuss another essential component in resistance training, Proper Form.

Throwing a weight through a range of motion is not only a waste of time, but incredibly dangerous. Even a light dumbbell "thrown" through a range of motion creates dangerous momentum. That light dumbbell becomes a heavy weapon that can create torn ligaments, tendons and possible stress fractures. Throwing a weight, reduces the muscle contraction required to build muscle.

A general rule is to move a weight from starting position (arms extended) to contraction (arms flexed) in two seconds, followed by a one second pause to reduce momentum, returning the weight to its starting position in four seconds (2:1:4). Where nearly

everyone errors is in the completion of a prescribed number of repetitions, with little attention paid to correct form. Completing one set of 8-12 repetitions until momentary muscular failure, in good form is far superior to multiple sets of repetitions done with poor form.

Momentary Muscular Failure is a term that describes a set of repetitions where one more repetition is impossible to perform, using good form. A professor of mine said "the initial several repetitions serve as a warmup for the final repetition done to momentary muscular failure, where growth is actually stimulated." Most trainees want no part of the discomfort associated with this type of training. Although lactic acid is uncomfortable, it is essential for the stimulation of muscular growth. Lactic Acid actually clears in a couple hours. The discomfort that persists after that is due to micro damage to muscle fibers and will heal and grow thicker and stronger in a couple days.

**Recovery** is the key ingredient in all modes of exercise. I raise a lot of eyebrows when I say "exercise does nothing to produce growth, only adequate recovery produces growth."

#### **New Hartford Highway News**

The 2025 Dumpster Season, Drop-Off Collection Schedule is complete. This year's schedule will be mailed to every constituent and home address. It will not be in the April Town Crier, like in the past. Remember our programs this spring are expected to begin April 7th and end September 24th. For pickup items for the Highway Garage, you need to purchase tags for the Highway Crew to pick up those items at your home. Remember if you want items picked up, you must see the Town Clerk and purchase a tag by the last Friday of the month. The cost will remain the same as last year, \$5.00 per item. The Town Clerk's Office is open Mon-Fri 8:00 am - 4:00 pm. Additionally, we will have the dumpster drop off along with the tag pick up for the months of April, May, June, July, August, and September. The regular drop off is still every Monday 6:30 - 2:00. We will have a Saturday drop off On May 10th, as well as PAPER SHREDDING from 8:00 am - noon. This year's curbside trash pickup will be the month of October, the same as last year.

The Highway Department is asking every residence to PLEASE use containers (garbage cans) for the brush (branches) etc. and green waste so that the container can be dumped in the compactor. The larger tree limbs can be 6" in diameter and 6-8' in length. Place the limbs in a neat pile at the edge of the roadway. If you have a tree come down that is larger, call the Highway Department to schedule an appointment and we will stop by with the chipper and chip the larger limbs. The brush trucks have a boom with a grabble on the end of the boom for picking up brush. Please do not put out any rocks, metal, or any kind of objects in the brush and green waste piles or they will not be picked up.

The Storm water projects are moving forward and as soon as the weather permits, the Highway Department will be continuing the two detention ponds behind Roman Rd and Hughes Lane, that we started last year. The town highway department is looking for possibly two more detention ponds on the Mallory Rd. area down to Oneida Street.

Our winter shifts will end on March 28th and the crew will start the day shift on March 31st. The spring cleaning will begin on April 7th with street sweeping and cleaning of the sidewalks. The brush trucks will start along with the green waste trucks on that same date. The highway department will be in full swing of spring-cleaning, weather permitting.

Last month I talked about how the National Water Main Company has the contract and will be working in the Town of New Hartford this spring and summer. This company is checking the infrastructure by using a robot camera to tv and check the sewer mains and manholes. This crew may be on your property following our right of way of the sewer mains and manholes. Some homeowners are denying this crew on their property. Again, we have a right of way for our sewers, making sure they are in the best working order. Some of the manholes are on front lawns and buried under sod. We need to make these manholes visible in case of an emergency. A residence may have issues with the sewer laterals or mains being plugged and we need to get to these as soon as possible, as the cellar may be flooding.

The highway crews are working on the dog park in the Sherrill Brook Town Park to finish improvements this spring.

The following information pertains to <u>VILLAGE OF NEW HARTFORD</u> residents only and <u>does not</u> include the Town of New Hartford.

For more detailed information refer to your Village Municipal Collection Flyer or call the DPW at 315-724-0379 or the Village Office at 315-732-1147.

The **VILLAGE** of New Hartford will have a curbside junk pick-up on **May 12, 2025**. Materials must be at the curb by **5:00 a.m.** on **May 12<sup>th</sup>** and **sorted into separate piles as listed below**:

- 1) Household Junk: Lumber bundled, piled parallel with the roadway, roofing and plaster in containers weighing 60 lbs. or less, furniture without fabric, porcelain sinks and toilets, and storm windows;
- 2) <u>Sanitary Waste:</u> clothes, bedding, stuffed furniture, hardcover books, empty paint cans with lids removed, and toys;
- 3) Metal: major appliances and metal products;
- 4) **Tires:** tires must be off rims and no larger than 16". No large truck or tractor tires.

Please note anything longer than 8' feet will NOT be collected.

Collection limits for categories #1) Household Junk and #2) Sanitary Waste are each limited to a pile not to exceed 4' wide 8' long and 3' high.

#### The DPW will NOT accept:

- 1) Recyclable materials, lumber exceeding the limit stated above, and shingles not contained. For construction and demolition projects, please contact the Village DPW or a private waste hauler to make arrangements for a dumpster.
- 2) Propane cylinders, liquids, such as paints, thinners, waste oil, herbicides, and pesticides may be disposed of at the Oneida Herkimer County drop site per their collection schedule. For more information, call 315-733-1224.
- 3) Automotive Batteries due to employee and environmental hazards, batteries may be returned to a redemption or recycling facility.

Your cooperation with sorting materials and observing these guidelines helps reduce costs and insures the continuation of this program.


Things changed abruptly 4 years ago when a series of medical events occurred out of thin air, Giovanna was at work, over worked and under slept, doing a second 12-hour shift in the peak of COVID. Giovanna walked out of a hospital room, and security cam footage showed that she just randomly collapsed. Her head smashed on the hard tile floor, and she immediately began to seize. Her coworkers found her blue and twitching. If this happened anywhere other than inside a hospital, we may have lost her then. A myriad of symptoms have come and gone over the 4 years. At times, Gia was healthy enough to get back to work even though she had lost her permission to drive at 23 years old. The symptoms were confounding and did not necessarily seem entirely related, or logical to any medical professional. She began to experience random paralysis and excruciating debilitating pain. She was forced to step away from work to focus on her own health. When Gia began losing feeling in her hands, feet and face accompanied by extreme nausea, we knew we had no choice but to take action. A top local specialist who was based out of Syracuse/Crouse, recommended she, "Get out of the northeast and leave as soon as possible. There is no expert in the Northeast that can solve this. Gia went through the arduous process of obtaining every single medical record, note, and scan that had ever been done. She sent them with a detailed application, video included, to the Mayo Clinic

in Rochester, Minnesota. The Mayo Clinic decided to interview Gia and as a result invited her to come to Minnesota for testing. They performed a full neurological evaluation in October 2024. The Mayo Clinic, our countries' top medical institute, was unable to diagnose her. After years of searching for anwers, Gia was diagnosed with a rare autoimmune disease called Primary Bitiary Cholangitis.

Gia needs a Hepatologist, the only specialists that have any knowledge about this disease, but there are no local options. Next month, Gia is returning to Rochester, Minnesota and the Mayo Clinic for further treatment. We know Gia's liver has 2 tumors and 1 cyst. She will be put on the transplant list immediately.

The proceeds from the Gala will be used to help with the costs of treatment and transportation to and from Minnesota.

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#### FROZEN AND BURST PIPES, TOILET **OVERFLOW, SUMP PUMP FAILURE!** WATER DAMAGE...

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

#### The Risks of Trying to Time The Markets

Timing is everything - whether it's navigating traffic to get to work on time or getting a table at a popular restaurant. If you miss the window, you might end up stuck in traffic or waiting in line longer than you'd like for dinner. Timing can be tricky for everyday activities, and it's even more challenging when it comes to the markets. If your timing is off with the markets, research shows it could cost you. It's a significant risk.

#### Making the Right Call

For some investors, timing the market is like calling the right play in football: if you do it right, the risk could be worth the reward. However, if your timing is off, you could end up getting sacked. Missing even a handful of the market's best days can dramatically cut your investment returns. Conversely, missing several of the worst days in the markets can potentially offer higher returns, but the strategy behind trying to miss the bottom of trading can be challenging.

Historically, missing just 10 of the best days in the markets, a very small amount over a 30-year period, would have dropped your annual average rate of return from 8% to 5.26%. Missing 30 days and the drop would have been even more steep to near 1.8%. If you missed 40 days, the drop would have been even more to .44%. Change that to a 50 day miss and your annual return would have hit a negative, -.86% annually. 1

#### In The News

Markets fluctuate greatly and interest rates rise and fall, but outside factors like politics and international trade can also affect investment returns monthly, weekly, even daily. Predicting change is really just guessing. Diversification in investments can be a better overall strategy, limiting exposure and risk by building your portfolio to address your short-term and longterm goals. #### The Bottom Line

I believe the best strategy to help manage your risk is to avoid trying to time the markets and remain fully invested throughout a complete market cycle, rather than attempting to time the market by buying and

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selling to avoid volatility or capture significant gains. 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#### History of April Fools' Day

April Fools' Day spread throughout Britain during the 18th century. In Scotland, the tradition became a two-day event, starting with "hunting the gowk," in which people were sent on phony errands (gowk is a word for cuckoo bird, a symbol for fool) and followed by Tailie Day, which involved pranks played on people's derrieres, such as pinning fake tails or "kick me" signs on them

#### Origins of April Fools' Day

Some historians speculate that April Fools' Day dates back to 1582, when France switched from the Julian calendar to the Gregorian calendar, as called for by the Council of Trent in 1563. In the Julian Calendar, as in the Hindu calendar, the new year began with the spring equinox around April 1.

People who were slow to get the news or failed to recognize that the start of the new year had moved to January 1 and continued to celebrate it during the last week of March through April 1 became the butt of jokes and hoaxes and were called "April fools." These pranks included having paper fish placed on their backs and being referred to as "poisson d'avril" (April fish), said to symbolize a young, easily caught fish and a gullible person.

#### **April Fools' Day Pranks**

In modern times, people have gone to great lengths to create elaborate April Fools' Day hoaxes. Newspapers, radio and TV stations and websites have participated in the April 1 tradition of reporting outrageous fictional claims that have fooled their audiences.

In 1957, the BBC reported that Swiss farmers were experiencing a record spaghetti crop and showed footage of people harvesting noodles from trees. In 1985, Sports Illustrated writer George Plimpton tricked many readers when he ran a made-up article about a rookie pitcher named Sidd Finch who could throw a fastball over 168 miles per hour.

In 1992, National Public Radio ran a spot with former President Richard Nixon saying he was running for president again... only it was an actor, not Nixon, and the segment was all an April Fools' Day prank that caught the country by surprise.

In 1996, Taco Bell, the fast-food restaurant chain, duped people when it announced it had agreed to purchase Philadelphia's Liberty Bell and intended to rename it the Taco Liberty Bell. In 1998, after Burger King advertised a "Left-Handed Whopper," scores of clueless customers requested the fake sandwich. Google notoriously hosts an annual April Fools' Day prank that has included everything from "telepathic search" to the ability to play Pac Man on Google Maps.

For the average trickster, there is always the classic April Fools' Day prank of covering the toilet with plastic wrap or swapping the contents of sugar and salt containers.


