It's The Little Things

We've all heard the phrase "It's the little things in life". If you stop to reflect back on simple moments of joy in your previous day, was it the moment the sun rose above the horizon? Was it the sound of the male cardinal calling to his mate? Was it getting outside and doing some yard work? Was it sitting down to a meal with family? I could go on and on. I'm sure if you stopped to think about it, there are so many moments of joy throughout your day that go unnoticed while you're busy rushing to accomplish what you believe has to be done for the day. I'm as guilty as anyone of that!

Gardening certainly helps us slow down and be more present. It helps "ground" us and gets us back to nature. Gardening gets us outdoors and working with our hands which always adds to our wellbeing. Planting, dead-heading, watering and fertilizing helps to keep our focus on the task of keeping our well-chosen plants





alive. We can benefit with growing a few of our own vegetables, now more than ever before.

It's finally here, time to dig out the containers from the shed or garage and head to our local grower and choose combinations of annuals for our summer flowers. Some of us have found the perfect plants that we know do well in our sunny or shady location and might simply switch using different colors each year. Many of us like to peruse the multiple options, always ready to try something new and different.

Monoculture pots, those planted using all one plant type, are always stunning and very showy from a distance. I recommend planting large pots with one type of plant for the front of the house. These are best when they are bold and colorful. Save the combination pots with the mix of interesting plants for the back porch or deck where they are viewed up close. Think of these pots as floral designs with roots! This is where the thriller, filler and spiller concept comes into play. Various heights create such interest and allows you to try out different flowers and textures of plant material. There are endless combinations and I'm often stunned at the beautiful creations that my customers pick out and place in their boxes when they check out.

Time to head out to your local grower to see what new and exciting plants they've grown for you. Don't forget...smile...it's the little things!

Jerry Seinfeld

Comedian, TV Producer, Actor

Appearing at the Stanley Theater several times between 2001 and 2018 was one of the most successful stage and television entertainers of all times. Jerome Allen Seinfeld was born in Brooklyn, New York April 29, 1964, and attended college nearby at SUNY Oswego, but his eye was always on entertaining and always as a comedian. Surely his most successful jump start was on Johnny Carson's "The Tonight Show" in 1981, catapulting him to a highly successful national career as a stand-up comedian. Subsequently, his TV sitcom "Seinfeld" which premiered in 1988, and in which he played himself, supported by three oddball every-episode performers-Michael Richards (Kramer), Jason Alexander (George), and Julia Louis-Dreyfus (Elaine)-endured for nine years and ended at Seinfeld's own initiative reportedly turning down more than \$100 million for a 10th year of 22 episodes. And even today Seinfeld is rerun on a daily basis. In the 1990s he returned to stand-up comedy and the Stanley Theater, as above noted, was on his list of entertainment venues. Hopefully, this enormously successful entertainer will one day return to the Stanley stage.

What the History (WTH)!

The Creeping Death

Someone hands you a pint of a homemade whiskey produced in a tin clapt trap, backyard still. Would you drink it? No? The answer was yes to many people who did drink it back during post- prohibition across the Mohawk Valley. They unknowingly delivered the Creeping Death to their alcohol-joyed body. Once they poured the illegal whiskey down their gullets, the clock was ticking on their life libation to a sacrifice to the god of hedonism. There was no cure and only the slow and painful demise would end the suffering. The poisoned alcohol was deemed, "The Creeping Death," by local law officials, and would kill 33 people in January of 1935 from Gloversville through to Utica. Although prohibition had ended in 1933, many illegal operations still existed throughout the United States as the manufacture of alcohol in a backyard still was lucrative and profitable outside the legalities of manufacturing of spirits. Upon the deaths, Gloversville Detective Harry Hart would go to the hospital bed of Mrs. Lena Snyder, who only had moments to live, yet was lucid enough to speak to the lawman. Lena told the detective where she purchased the deadly alcohol for \$1 for a bottle from a Mary Derrico. Mrs. Derrico had purchased 5 gallons of the Creeping Death from John DiPedro and Salvatore DiDominick of Little Falls. The United States Treasury Department of Alcohol Tax Unit came to Utica, NY, and assisted in the investigation. They were led to Salvatore DiBenedetto of Utica and when they raided his home found alcohol-making accoutrements to include stills, vats, and bottling items. The investigation found bottles of the death alcohol in 28 local stores. It was discovered that the deadly recipe was a chemical creative mistake as Salvatore DiBenedetto had purchased a large drum of antifreeze compound from a local garage and used it as the alcoholic base for his recipe. Unbeknownst, the Creeping Death had been bottled and distributed waiting for victims to purchase the cheap grim reaper pints. Most of the involved would get fines for selling and distributing illegal alcohol; however, DiBenedetto would be charged with 1st degree murder. He'd plead guilty to 1st degree manslaughter and ended up doing 10 years hard labor in a NYS prison. Even though he had innocently made the wrong batch of alcohol, DiBenedetto paid with a decade of his life behind bars and 33 people died from drinking the Creeping Death. The coroner at that time referred to the result of drinking the poison as "wet brain" because the victims would be conscious, aware of their impending demise, suffer terrible pain, and their brains would emit leaking fluids. The law enforcement team at the time put forth a warning as not all the bottles of the Creeping Death had been found and destroyed. So, dear reader, be careful, for your dusty root cellar may have nestled on a cobwebbed musty shelf, a pint of liquid that if consumed, will lead you to a quick meeting with our maker.

Forgotten Components of **Physical Fitness**

submitted by Jim LaFountain, All American Fitness Center Flashy exercise equipment, fad diets and other "quick fix" con jobs dominate the world of physical fitness. Even the most dedicated fitness buffs lose touch or are not aware of the basic physiology necessary for success.

Lactic Acid: muscle soreness, hours after exercise is not due to a Lactic Acid buildup, because that essential substance clears in about three hours or less. Microfiber muscle damage is the cause of soreness that lasts 36-48 hours after exercise. In order to minimize or eliminate continued soreness, perform the exercise that caused it, at a lower intensity a couple days later. Allowing oxygenated blood to be delivered into the damaged area is an outstanding healer.

DOMS: DOMS is an acronym for Delayed Onset Muscle Soreness and is the soreness following "novel" exercise. Novel may be defined as "a mode of exercise you have not done recently or ever before." My favorite example is someone who wants to begin distance running. The day or two after a short distance run, they report, "I will never run again, due to the shin splints it caused me the next day." They made the mistake of not knowing the discomfort as DOMS, mistakenly identifying it as shin splints.

Recovery is the Most Critical Component: the term "Super Compensation" is used to describe how muscle fibers, when allowed to heal between workouts, becomes microscopically thicker and stronger. Exercise does nothing to "produce" muscular strength or endurance,





switch" on.

ATP: Adenosine triphosphate is the source of energy, at the cellular level, during exercise. ATP is the primary energy substrate for muscular contraction and requires about three minutes to replenish between sets of an individual exercise. Beginners tend to hurry through sets, never allowing for the replenishment of ATP. During my personal training sessions, I do NOT allow clients to sit idle in order to replenish ATP. A typical sequence looks like this, Bench Press-Lat Pulldownfollowed by an Abdominal Crunch. ATP is allowed to be replenished to the Chest, Shoulders and Triceps, (Bench Press) while performing the Lat Pulldown, that stimulates the upper back and biceps, followed by abdominal work. There is, however, a minor compromise, but the workout's efficiency overrides this minor compromise. Simply sitting idle for three minutes is a waste of time.

Intensity versus Volume: several years ago I had the opportunity to meet Arthur Jones, the inventor of Nautilus Equipment. I asked him, what's more important, intensity or volume?

Intensity was his enthusiastic response. A couple years later, while training three hours a day, six days a week, I contracted mononucleosis. It prompted me to adopt Mr. Jones' high intensity workouts. Two months later I placed 2nd in the Mr. Kentucky and won the Mr. Southeast USA. I was sold!

Maintaining Motivation: a sports psychology term that explains motivation is "Locus of Control." Most high level, successful, athletes' locus of control is "internal." They have a fire within to succeed. Loud music, screaming coaches and teammates (external locus of control) are not needed. External Locus of Control as a motivator is short lived. These athletes, eventually learn to be internally motivated or simply dropout.

Over Eating: Americans are blessed with an abundance of food. We can consume 3,000 calories within a city block, in just a few minutes, ingesting fast foods alone. Portion control has lost the attention of most people in our country. I gave a talk a few months ago and posed the question, "how many of you know what a portion is?" Out of 75 attendees, only 6 could prove they knew. That's a primary reason why we are faced with the nation wide obesity epidemic.

I advise my over weight clients that "awareness" is the key. After a few bites, ask yourself "have I had enough food?" If the honest answer is yes, it's time to put your

only recovery does. Exercise turns the "development fork down, pack up the leftovers and stop eating. Companies have made millions of dollars promoting "fad," non-sustainable diet plans. No one engages in this nonsense with long term, lifelong aspirations.

Simply ask yourself the key question, "can I do this for the rest of my life?" We, as a member of the billions of people living on this planet, should learn to eat responsibly for a lifetime.

Awareness of this information should position you for long term fitness success.

The New Hartford Volunteer Fire Department, in conjunction with the Village of New Hartford, the New Hartford Chamber of Commerce and Richard Sherman, Town Highway Superintendent, will hold its Annual Seven-Division Memorial Day Parade and Open House on Monday evening, May 26, 2025.

This year's parade is honored to have two Grand Marshalls. Mr. Stephen Moran (US Army) and Mr. Fred Darling, (World War II-US Marine Corps).

Stephen J Moran, a US Army Veteran who has served
not only his country but his community, is this year's
Grand Marshall.Pearl Street, Sanger Ave and Oxford Road.

Born in 1946 to Robert and Rosemary (Magee) lifelong Village of New Hartford residents he attended and graduated from St John the Evangelist Catholic grade school. Upon graduating he attended the original Notre Dame High School on Genesee Street and graduated from New Hartford High School class of 1964.

Following graduation, he enlisted in the US Army in November of 1964. He trained as a recruit at Ft Dix, New Jersey after which he attended the US Army Aviation school in Ft Eustis and graduated as an aircraft mechanic specializing in fixed wing aircraft. He was then assigned to duty in Germany in 1965 for 11 months at the US Army Aviation Maintenance Center (USAMAC) in Mannheim, Germany as an aircraft crew chief and attained the ranks of PFC and Specialist 4th class.

In 1966 he was transferred to the Republic of South Vietnam south of Saigon that today is known as Ho Chi Minh City. There he was assigned to the 54th Aviation Company, 255th Transportation Detachment where responsibilities included maintaining the flight availability of 12 fixed wing aircraft. On this tour he was promoted to Specialist 5th Class.

He is the recipient of the United States Army Commendation Medal for meritorious service in a hostile combat environment by maintaining a 98.9% aircraft availability and readiness along with the Good Conduct Medal and Republic of Vietnam service Medal. He was honorably discharged in October 1967.

Moran, a resident of the Village of New Hartford, is a 38- year member of the New Hartford Volunteer Fire Department and a 15 year past member of the Poland Fire Department. Where he obtained the rank and served as Fire Chief. He is also a 53 year member and Past Commander of Adirondack American Legion Post in Coldbrook and a past member of the VFW Post 1554 in Poland, NY.

He has two children, Gary in Australia and Chris in the Town of New Hartford and grandchildren in both countries.

Mr. Frederick Darling was a PFC in the United States Marine Corps, First Marine Division, and served in WWII from 1943-1945. The 99 year old veteran went ashore as a 19 year old on April 1, 1945, on the Island of

Okinawa, and was a machine gunner, during the battle against the Japanese. After the war, Mr. Darling was sent to Beijing, China to guard Japanese prisoners, to be sent back to Japan in boxcars. Fred has been married to his wife Jackie for 77 years. He has three children, and one grandchild. He was employed by Niagara Mohawk for 40 years. Fred will be 100 on July 8, 2025. This year's seven division parade begins promptly at 7pm from the New Hartford Shopping Center. Again, this year, the 10th Mountain Division Band from Fort Drum has been invited. However, as of press time, there may be a scheduling conflict. The parade will proceed North on Genesee Street, turning right onto Pearl Street, left onto Sanger Ave, and left onto Oxford Road, ending at the Fire Station. There will be no parking permitted along the parade route. This includes Genesee Street,

'From The Mailbag'

Q. I have a 2-piece punch bowl that was handed down to me from a great aunt. It is amethyst in color. There is a mark on the bottom of an underlined N in a circle. Unfortunately there were not any cups given to me. Can you tell me anything about it and what it might be worth?

A. Your beautiful punch bowl was made by the Northwood Glass Company, the inventors of carnival glass of which your punch bowl is a fine example. Northwood ceased operations in 1925. While it is unfortunate that you don't have cups to go with it, the base and bowl still have significant value. I think your item would be worth \$300-400 in today's market.

Q. I have a wooden mold with a swan design carved in the bottom. It was in a box of items I purchased at an auction several years ago. Do you know anything about it and if it has any value?

A. Your item is a butter mold that was used to make an impression on a slab of butter, a rather nice Victorian tradition. These were very popular in the late 1800's. They are a very collectible item. I would value your butter mold at \$50.

Gardening Provides Healing to Sitrin Military Veterans

With the advent of warm weather, many of us are looking forward to sunshine, picnics and... playing in the dirt. Yes, gardening has become a top warm-weather pastime – one with many therapeutic aspects as well.

Veterans of Sitrin's Military Program use gardening as a therapeutic tool to help decrease symptoms of post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), anxiety, depression, and more. As one component of Sitrin's program, our 30'x30' garden is home to a dozen different plants; after harvest, all produce is given back to veterans and the community.

"Sitrin's garden is perfect and peaceful," says former Sergeant Shawn Guernsey. "It provides a sense of commitment and learning in a nurturing environment. The biggest benefit is receiving the produce we've put effort into growing – not many local gardens have that benefit."

Gardening offers healing through movement and exercise, social engagement, and achievement. The benefits of being outdoors – sometimes called nature therapy or ecotherapy – are widely recognized, and extensive research has been done on the positive effects gardening can have on overall mental health.

Jackie Warmuth, vice president of Clinical Development and director of the Military Program, says that while PTSD is unique to each person, the experience and wounds of combat remain with those who come home to family life and attempt to 'fit in' with society.

"When symptoms of PTSD arise for the individual, deconstructing the experience, followed by reconstructive self-talk that establishes new responses, can be effective in the ongoing treatment," Warmuth says.

Veterans of the program plan to start the garden after Memorial Day. This year's crops include garlic, cucumbers, tomatoes, zucchini, rhubarb, potatoes, and flowers.

The Highway Department has a busy schedule in the month of May. Our crews are out sweeping roadways, sweeping town sidewalks, and picking up green waste and brush. When putting out the brush and leftover leaves from last fall, please separate the piles. Don't mix them. If your pile is unusually large, please don't hesitate to call for a special pick-up. The road crew will be cleaning ditches on roads that may be paved this summer.

I want to thank all the homeowners for their patience as your highway employees work diligently to collect branches and brush from the town's 82 miles of streets. Recently you should have received in the mail, your town's annual Trash & Brush Collection Schedule for 2025, outlining curbside brush and garbage schedule and drop-off at the Highway Garage. The schedule is also on the town's website at townofnewhartfordny.gov. Go to Highway Department, click on curbside, and the schedule will pop up. You can also stop by the Town Hall and pick up a schedule, if you didn't receive one.

Again, this year, we will be offering our tag service from April through September, for items that are unable to be brought to the Highway Garage, and need to be picked up at a residence. The tag this year is again \$5.00 per item and can be purchased at the Town Clerk's Office, 8635 Clinton Street, New Hartford. Please pick up tags no later than the Friday before the first Monday of every month. This service will be suspended in the month of October for the annual curbside garbage pickup in front of the residences. On May 10th, there will be a garbage drop off at the Highway Garage from 7:00 a.m. until noon. We will also be offering the CONFIDATA DESTRUCTION SERVICE for shredding of private papers, on-site from 8:00 a.m. until noon for our constituents. Each person is limited to ten boxes of papers to shred.

The picture below is a group picture of the highway team that took care of our roads this past winter. This winter was an old fashion winter with the accumulation of snow that we received was very heavy at times. The crew names are listed underneath the picture.

The milling crew will be in New Hartford to start milling our roads on May 5th weather permitting. The paving crew will follow the milling shortly after. The paving this year is broken down into 6 phases. They will be starting in the Oakwood Dr and Pippen wood Dr. area.

The Highway Department will be displaying our heavy equipment again this year at the New Hartford Public Library on Saturday, June 7th from 10:00 a.m. until noon, for the annual "Touch the Truck" event. Touch the Truck is a huge success every year, which brings children and parents together to see what the Town uses for plowing and sweeping roads, loaders, and the equipment kids see go by their houses every day. Our new equipment will be on display as well. Our Deputy, Chris Moran, and I will be available to answer any questions. We will also be handing out yellow hard hats to the children.

According to many pioneers on the InterSpiritual path, the planet requires a new consciousness where we can overcome centuries of suspicion toward others within our cultures and religions. Let us explore this essential path of the mystic heart, particularly focusing on Thomas Merton (prolific writer who saw how much Christian monks and contemplatives and Buddhist monks and contemplatives had in common), Thomas Keating (popular teacher of Centering Prayer and Lectio Divina), Wayne Teasdale (student of Keating who wrote 3 books introducing the tenets of the InterSpiritual Path), and Edward Bastian (founder of the Spiritual Paths Institute and creator of a seven-step InterSpiritual Meditation). Teasdale coined the term "InterSpiritual" in The Mystic Heart published in 1999. Here is a quote from that book: "Humanity stands at a crossroads between horror and hope. In choosing hope, we must seed a new consciousness, a radically fresh approach to life drawing its inspiration from perennial spiritual and moral insights, intuition and experience. We call this new awareness interspiritual, implying not the homogenization of religion, but the recovering of the shared mystic heart beating in the center of the world's deepest spiritual traditions."

Rev. Dr. John Wilde has assembled a team of local InterSpiritual teachers who will offer wisdom and practices associated with the InterSpiritual path: Venerable Myohye Do'an, the guiding teacher of Lotus Heart Zen; Rev. Dr. Naomi Kelly, Presbyterian Pastor, Spiritual Director and the Guiding Teacher of Weaving Home; Rev. Mark Caruana, retired American Baptist pastor; Larry Beasley, Presbytery Leader of Utica Presbytery.
