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
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Signs of Fall

Fall is approaching. I see the signs of it daily. The first brisk morning in the 50's, actually quite a relief from the stress of the heat of the summer and lack of rain in July. My annual plantings are almost at peak and I can tell I should start doing some pinching to make them tidier. Watering my pots is becoming a chore because the roots have filled the pots and sometimes once a day watering is not even enough. The days are getting shorter, signaling the mum buds to start swelling!

Here comes mum season. Time to replant those pots with fall annuals and mums to give

everything a fresh new autumn feel. The popularity of mums has exploded over the years. When The Mum Farm started growing mums, 56 years ago, they were not all that popular. Now they are synonymous with fall!

I'll remind you that it is important to not buy your mums too early in the season, or with a lot of color. Mums only bloom once and it's the cool autumn temperatures that make them last and last! I know how hard it is to pick out a mum with only a blossom or two open, but that's the correct way to enjoy the full length of their bloom season. No need to dead-head them. They rarely need fertilizer... simply keep them evenly moist and stand back and enjoy their beauty. The transformation from just buds to a full blossoming plant still fascinates me. They are about as easy a plant as you can get, with such a WOW factor as the fall season progresses.

Customers often ask me how often to water them. First off, we don't want them to wilt. If that happens repeatedly you will end up with much smaller flowers than the plant should have. You have stressed them out! Keeping them evenly moist without having them sit in water is the key. Here's what I often tell them. If you are wearing summer clothes, water your mums daily. If you start putting on a coat, you might be able to get away with every other day watering. If it rains, remember that we have to have a good soaker in order to get through all that foliage to water the soil, so I suggest testing the soil, or just continue to water as regular. Mums all have drainage holes, so rarely can you over water them!

The fun of fall decorating begins soon. Remember to smile, mums help brighten our autumn days!



The Insolent Willies are an upstate New York roots-rock band known for their hip-shaking mix of quirky, clever original music and unpredictable covers. Their sound blends acoustic rock, vintage country and blues, seasoned with punk, reggae and soul. Performers are multi-instrumentalists, so a typical show features acoustic and electric guitars, upright bass, accordion, fiddle, banjo, fiddle and harmonica. Kevin Elam is a multi-instrumentalist and 2019 All-Ireland Champion in Men's Singing, only the second American ever to win the coveted "Dalaigh Shield" in its 65-year history. In 2020, Kevin was awarded a grant from George Mason University's Young Artist Commissioning Project, and consequently recorded his debut album of traditional ballads, If I Were A Small Bird, released in September 2021. Most recently Kevin was honored to be selected as one of six Artists in Residence at Strathmore Music Hall in Bethesda, MD for the 2023 season.

Kevin enjoys a busy performance schedule in the U.S. and abroad, appearing at many of the top Irish and Scottish festivals, venues and concert series as a soloist, alongside Scottish National Fiddle Champion Sean Heely, and with many other groups.

Tim Ball is an accomplished American fiddler, singer, and guitarist whose playing is deeply rooted in the rich traditions of Ireland, New England, Canada, and Appalachia, tied together by the distinct musical heritage of his native upstate New York. With over two decades of experience performing in Celtic and contra dance ensembles, Tim has built a reputation for his expressive style and deep musical knowledge. His latest album, Upstate Crossroads, marked a major milestone in his career, earning the No. 1 spot on the January 2023 Folk Alliance International music chart.

Tim is well-known to upstate New York audiences as the guitarist for the acclaimed Celtic trio Arise & Go, appears frequently with Pennsylvania-based Irish band Poor Man's Gambit, and has performed with popular Renaissance festival acts Empty Hats and Cantiga. When he is not on stage, Tim directs the Finger Lakes Fiddle Orchestra, leads Irish sessions, serves as a visiting lecturer in violin at Cornell University, and maintains a private violin and fiddle studio in Ithaca, NY.

To say Geordy was passionate about all things Irish and especially Irish unification would be an understatement of massive proportions. Born in Belfast, Northern Ireland,


Geordy left school at the age of 14 to help support his family of 13. As a union dock worker in Northern Ireland, Geordy saw first hand the struggles imposed by the British majority against the Catholic minority Irish longing for a peaceful united Ireland. He had a passion for Ireland's culture especially its language which was derided and often suppressed by British authorities.

Geordy emigrated to the states in 1981 and settled in Syracuse in 2000. Sadly he passed away September 21, 2024. Family and friends of Geordy will be on hand to tell us how they knew this man and his impact on Central New York's Irish community.

Eyewitness to the "Troubles" in Derry, Northern Ireland – 1970-1972

Please join us at the H.A.R.P. Museum as it continues its popular "Lunch and Learn" series on Wednesday, September 10 at 11 AM , where Steven Smits recounts witnessing the events of Ireland's "Bloody Sunday" while serving in the United States Navy in Derry, Ireland.

The onset of conflict in Northern Ireland began in Derry in 1969 with the "Battle of the Bogside". The bloody war between nationalists and unionists continued until the "Good Friday" agreement in 1998. As the events transitioned from a civil rights protest to sectarian violence across the province, 3,720 civilians, police, and soldiers lost their lives, and 47,500 people were injured in the tens of thousands of shootings and bombings.

Steve Smits will discuss the experiences and observations of he and his wife in Derry during the early years of the conflict. As an American service man stationed at the U.S. Naval Communication Station in Derry, he had the opportunity to hear from Catholics and Protestants and to visit their enclaves in the segregated neighborhoods of the city. He will recall the daily riots, the bombings, and the perspectives of the people of Derry.

Steve will recount the evening when a bomb detonated outside their flat on the Strand Road near the city center. He will describe the shock of "Bloody Sunday", on January 30, 1972, when 14 civilians on a protest march were shot by soldiers of the First Parachute Regiment. The "whitewash" report on the event of the Widgery Commission in 1972 and the revised report of the Saville Commission will be covered.

After his departure from Derry in 1972, by 1977, the violence increased to the point where the U.S. Navy, on orders from the White House, vacated the Naval Station, a presence in the community since 1942.

Steve Smits is a retired director of Central New York Developmental Disabilities Services Offices and is active in the Town of Western Historical Society.

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Jim Messa Announces Candidacy for New Hartford Town Supervisor

Longtime First Ward Councilman and community leader Jim Messa has officially announced his candidacy for New Hartford Town Supervisor in the November 2025 election.

Messa, who has proudly served the residents of New Hartford for more than a decade, says his decision to run comes from a deep commitment to restoring public trust and ensuring town government works for all residents.

"For too long, New Hartford voters have had no real choice in leadership," Messa said. "Our current Supervisor has run unopposed for years, and that's not healthy for democracy. Competitive elections keep leaders accountable, and they give residents a voice in shaping our future. This year, I'm stepping forward so our community finally has that choice."

A resident of New Hartford for 22 years, Messa lives with his wife, Kristin, and their son, Gavin. His professional background includes over two decades

in management, fundraising, and public service, and his track record as Councilman is defined by responsiveness, fiscal responsibility, and a willingness to ask tough questions when it matters most.

In addition to serving 11 years as First Ward Councilman and five years as Police Commissioner, Messa is deeply involved in local service work, volunteering at St. John's the Evangelist Food Pantry and supporting community programs across the town.

"This isn't about party politics — it's about what's right for New Hartford," Messa added. "Our town deserves leadership free from conflicts of interest, backroom deals, and personal agendas. I believe in open, accountable government where residents can be confident decisions are made in their best interest."

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Stanley Theatre Series

Jimmy Durante

Comedian, Singer, Actor, Pianist 1893-1980

Born James Francis Durante, the son of a barber, in Manhattan on February 10, 1893. He left school in the 7th grade. But because he loved the piano, James did continue his lessons on that instrument, a move that helped him begin a musical career at the age 17 at a saloon in Coney Island. He later played ragtime piano for a living, taking jobs wherever he could, including bars, cabarets, etc.. He became known for a time as "Ragtime Jimmy". In 1916, still in his early 20s, he organized a five-piece band. Durante, known chiefly as a Vaudeville entertainer with a gravelly voice and a very large nose earning him the nickname The Schnoz, developed a musical career that included movies, radio, and later TV, the latter the media for which he was best and most widely known. His closing of every show, both radio and TV, "Goodnight Mrs. Calabash" kept audience wondering who she was and why he never failed to elsewhere mention her, a mystery still perplexing this writer. Durante's role in the movie "It's a Mad, Mad, Mad, Mad World, is one for which he might be much remembered along with a cast consisting of Milton Berle, Ethel Merman, Sid Caesar, Mickey Rooney, and other notables. Musically, Durante's list of prominent songs includes "Make Someone Happy, I'll See You In My Dreams, Inka Dinka Doo, I'll Be Seeing You, As Time Goes By, Frosty the Snowman," and many others. His piano playing and singing appearance at the Stanley Theater happened in March of 1942, certainly a memorable happening for Stanley audiences. Durante died of pneumonia in Santa Monica California on January 29, 1980 at age of 86.



One drawback, Weight Training does not vary the resistance to match a joints anatomical advantages and disadvantages. For example, initiating a biceps curl begins with elbow extension, placing the biceps in an anatomical disadvantage. Completing the move with the elbow contracted and the joint at an anatomical advantage, yet the weight remains the same as when the movement started, compromising the effectiveness of the exercise.

Variable Resistance Machines vary resistance through the joints full range of motion. Most machines address the joints anatomical advantages and disadvantages. This intensifies muscular contraction and the results associated with variable resistance exercise. Most variable resistance equipment addresses this issue using a cam or a angled movement arm.

Machine training has a difficult time adjusting for a trainee's body type, i.e., height, arm and leg length etc. Machine training lacks the glamour of weights. Watching a stack of weights traveling along a guide rod is not as rewarding as moving a weight attached to a barbell or dumbbell. A major goal of lifting weights is to increase the amount of weight lifted for a number of repetitions. Seldom does a trainee brag about the weight they move on a machine.

Tubing a few years ago was used primarily in injury rehabilitation. It's "joint friendly," convenient and can be done anywhere. When I travel, tubing is my chosen mode of training. It's light and fits neatly in any suitcase.

Although somewhat primitive, tubing varies resistance according to any anatomical advantage or disadvantage. Resistance is minimal at the beginning of the movement and increases when you push or pull to full extension or flexion. I would suggest using a system that offers separate chords, in lieu of one single chord feathered through one strap. A single chord would require resetting before each movement.

To answer the question as to what's better, weights, machines or tubing? Understanding the pluses and minuses for each mode is a prudent guide to making training choices. I do my best to incorporate some of each mode in each workout. Using one mode exclusively, is probably not a good idea, as it may lead to boredom and dropout. Using a variety of modes in each workout tends to keep things fresh and boredom at bay. The **ideal** mode is the one you enjoy and can maintain for 6-8 weeks. After that period of time, referred to as a "mesocycle," a change is definitely in order. All the best

Weights, Machines, Tubing, What's Best?

I have had the good fortune of training outstanding Little Leaguers, Pop Warner Football players, High School, Collegiate and Professional athletes. In our initial meeting I listen intensely to their expectations. Almost always, their primary goal is to use resistance training and cardio to become better in their sport. My response goes like this, "I cannot make you better in your specific sport, but I can "give you a bigger engine," enabling you to practice and play at a higher level. Nothing will replace hard work devoted your specific

Next question: what's best, weights, machines or tubing?

Resistance work, using barbells and dumbbells has been around for centuries. Resistance Training, as legend has it, was founded by six time Olympic Champion Wrestler Milo of Groton, Greece, between 540-511 B.C. His legend goes like this-He lifted a baby cow daily in preparation for his Olympic Wrestling Competition. Each day, the cow grew heavier and Milo participated in what is now called "Progressive Resistance Training" for several weeks.

Weight Training is still the choice of many serious bodybuilders and athletes. It's convenient and in my opinion, there's something rewarding about watching a weight move through a range of motion. It's also popular because it's a measured outcome, i.e., What's



Carol Crooms Roots & Wings Summer Program Delivers Real-World STEM and Life Skills to Utica Youth

The Carol Crooms Roots & Wings Summer Youth Program, held at the Carol L. Crooms BECA Center in Utica, provided more than 25 students with an enriching experience grounded in real-world learning, STEM exploration, vocational training, and community engagement. Entirely free of charge, the program operated solely on in-kind donations and volunteer support, a testament to the strength and generosity of the local community.

Founded by Teoka Muhammad in memory of her late mother-in-law and long-time community activist Carol Crooms, the program aimed to equip the next generation with practical knowledge and life skills. "I wanted to honor her legacy by providing real-world experiences centered in STEM and vocational training for future generations," said Muhammad. Judging by the enthusiastic response from both students and parents, the program was a powerful match for the needs of the community.

Throughout the summer, students participated in a comprehensive financial literacy curriculum. Students also received grooming instruction and vocational exposure from a local barber, learning both hair braiding and barbering techniques. These lessons emphasized not only skill development but also self-confidence, hygiene, and potential career paths in the personal care industry.

The program featured an engaging media and communications component led by Cassandra Harris-Lockwood, CEO of Phoenix Radio. She offered students a behind-the-scenes look at running a radio station and producing a community newspaper, sparking interest in broadcasting, journalism, and storytelling.

Students also had the opportunity to engage with Dr. Shyqual Lewis, an emergency physician at Mohawk Valley Health System (MVHS). Dr. Lewis introduced them to the basics of emergency medical care and shared insights into the critical and rewarding role of medical professionals, inspiring curiosity about healthcare careers.

Another key component of the program was agricultural education. Students planted leafy vegetables in the Cornhill neighborhood, designated as a food desert, learning about sustainability, food justice, and the importance of healthy eating habits. This handson experience connected them with the land and their local environment in a meaningful way.

A special highlight of the program was a visit from Hunter Willis, a national yo-yo champion, who spoke to students about the power of discipline, focus, and perseverance. His story inspired the children to pursue their goals with dedication and passion.

The program concluded with a joyful graduation ceremony, where each student was awarded a certificate of participation. Parents and community members cheered as the students celebrated their accomplishments, many of them squealing with delight as they accepted their recognition.

The Carol Crooms Roots & Wings Summer Youth Program proved to be a transformative experience—one that blended education with empowerment, and structure with creativity. With no matching funds and no tuition, the program succeeded in delivering impactful, life-changing lessons to the youth of Utica, planting seeds for a stronger, more self-sufficient future generation.

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















The Hot Dog Chronicles

Service Calls includes water or animal problems, public assistance or standbys. Good Intent refers to responding but did not find anything or canceled in route. Other alarms include explosions, carbon monoxide, smoke or sprinkler detector activations.

The figures above do not include other activities by members of the department such as Fire Prevention details, training, parades, Open House and other various department committee meetings that take place throughout the year.

As summer draws to a conclusion, I want to thank the many residents who helped us with their brush pick-up by placing it at the curb. It has been a busy summer and our brush piles have been overwhelming at times, causing our schedule to be off. The LAST brush pickup for 2025 season will be:

Ward 1 - Sept 15th, Ward 2 - Sept 17th, Ward 3 - Sept 22nd, Ward 4 - Sept 24th

Please plan to get your brush to the curb for the set dates. We will not pick up any brush after these dates, unless we have storm damage that brings tree limbs etc. down. The brush crew will be working on other projects this fall.

Any tag items - please purchase your tags by Aug 29th for a September 2nd pickup. The last drop off at the Highway garage will be Monday, Sept 22th.

Curbside trash pickup will be the following dates:

Ward 1 Oct 6th - Oct 10th - Place at curb no earlier than Oct 4th and no later than 6:30 a.m. on Oct 6th

Ward 2 Oct 13th - Oct 17th - Place at curb no earlier than Oct 11th and no later than 6:30 a.m. on Oct 13th

Ward 3 Oct 20th - Oct 24th - Place at curb no earlier than Oct 18th and no later than 6:30 a.m. on Oct 20th

Ward 4 Oct 27th - Oct 31st - Place at curb no earlier than Oct 25th and no later than 6:30 a.m. on Oct 27th

Leaf removal will begin as warranted in the month of September if needed and October. So, please get your leaves to the curb early, don't wait. Please do not place leaves in plastic bags or containers such as plastic garbage cans. Our 4 leaf trucks will be out working to pick up the leaves. There will be 1 truck in each ward. PLEASE DO NOT MIX LEAVES WITH ANY OTHER ARTICLE'S. NO STICKS, STONES, PUMPKINS OR GREEN WASTE. JUST LEAVES. MIX DEBRIS WILL CAUSE DAMAGE TO THE MACHINE'S IMPELLER FAN, CAUSING DOWN TIME DURING OUR BUSIEST SEASON. MIXED LOADS WILL NOT BE PICKED UP.

Our paving is near completion for the year and I want to thank everyone for their patience as our crews had roads closed or lanes closed during our paving operations.

We are still placing storm water pipe and catch basins this fall to catch up with our storm water work in various sections of the town. We are continuing to do our yearly maintenance, cleaning all our detention ponds on Will's Drive, Woodberry Rd. Whitetail, and Grange Hill for the upcoming winter season.

Consider These Three Suggestions if you Inherit a Trust

David "Chico" Esparza, senior fiduciary strategist with Wells Fargo Wealth & Investment Management, remembers meeting two clients, a brother and sister whose parents had passed away. "Unfortunately, their parents had not discussed their estate plans with the adult children. When the siblings learned they were the beneficiaries of a sizable trust," Esparza recalls, "they had no idea what to do next."

The brother and sister had many questions. Who handles the estate? What are the terms of the trust? And what should their next steps be? "The bank was appointed as successor trustee, so we explained the timeline and process for settling the trust estate," Esparza says. "It helped to ease their minds to know that professionals would be handling the numerous tasks required for an orderly estate settlement."

As Esparza's clients found, stepping into the role of beneficiary can feel a bit like stepping into the unknown. Here, Esparza offers three suggestions for those in similar situations.

1. Build an advisory team.

A good first step for the beneficiary is to meet with the trustee who is tasked with executing the terms of the trust. It may be an individual, such as a CPA or lawyer, family member, or potentially a corporate trustee such as Wells Fargo Bank.

"There will be a lot of questions, so it's important to establish a communication plan and outline tasks that need to be accomplished along with a general timeline for how long it will take to settle the estate," Esparza says.

In some instances, once the estate is settled, a new trust is funded with the beneficiary's share of the estate; in other cases, assets will be distributed outright to the beneficiary. If the assets will be retained in trust, the trustee collaborates with an investment advisor to help manage the assets according to the terms of the trust.



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"The trustee and investment advisor will create a plan that is based on the terms of the trust and considers the needs of the beneficiary," Esparza says. "A best practice is for beneficiaries to seek the guidance of a tax advisor regarding tax implications related to trust distribution."

2. Understand the terms of the trust.

One of the first questions a beneficiary might have is, "What benefits do I have under the trust?" Beneficiaries are well served to seek independent counsel for questions regarding interpretation of their interest under the trust.

Esparza explains that a trust can be a useful tool for holding, managing, and distributing property as outlined by the trustor(s) — the creator(s) of the trust — in the trust agreement, but each trust is unique in how assets can be distributed to beneficiaries. Some common areas of discussion include:

Beneficiary or beneficiaries: Is there a sole beneficiary or several beneficiaries of the trust? How do the terms address the rights different beneficiaries have to distributions from the trust?

Age restrictions: Does the beneficiary have to reach a certain age before accessing some or all of the trust?

Distribution restrictions: Can beneficiaries access the principal or just the income from the trust? Does the beneficiary need to provide the trustee with proof of the beneficiary's own income and expenses to receive distributions? What categories of expenses can the trust cover for the beneficiary? (Typically, trusts with discretionary provisions have ascertainable standards that can cover health, education, maintenance, and support.) Can distributions be adjusted for inflation?

Lifetime of the trust: Does the trust terminate once the beneficiary reaches a certain age, or is it meant to last the beneficiary's lifetime? Is any portion of the trust designated for future generations?

"Trusts present an opportunity to preserve, accumulate, and transition generational wealth," Esparza says. "For that reason, the trustee should be prudent and equitable in administrating the trust, giving consideration to the current needs of the beneficiary as well as the long-term goals and objectives of the trust."

3. Ask questions before taking distributions.

"Before taking a trust distribution, some beneficiaries find it useful to inquire about the potential tax consequences. That's where a tax advisor should provide guidance," Esparza says. "Beneficiaries also may consider consulting with the trustee and the rest of their advisory team about additional considerations or impacts a trust distribution may have on the investment plan." In addition, beneficiaries should consult with their own legal counsel if they have specific questions regarding their rights with respect to a trust.

Esparza shares the story of a young beneficiary who wanted to use her trust fund to purchase a luxury car when she turned 16. "I posed this question: 'Would a less-expensive car meet your transportation goals and help preserve trust assets for the long term?" he says. "It is important for beneficiaries to stay connected with the trustee and to ask clarifying questions so they understand the goals and objectives established by the grantor."






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
