

Mobile service will still be available by appointment and for emergencies.



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

NH Grad Marykate Edmunds Returns to St. John Fisher as **Lacrosse Coach**

New Hartford's Marykate Edmunds is returning to her college alma mater as head coach of the women's

Edmunds is a 2010 New Hartford graduate. She also coached New Hartford in 2015 and began her college coaching career at Utica's SUNY Poly in 2016.

Edmunds returns back to Pittsford after four successful seasons (2022 to 2025) as SUNY Geneseo's head coach.

She played and coached at St. John Fisher under Linda Michele, who retired in May as the winningest head most successful in NCAA history.

Fisher history.

"I am truly humbled to be the next head women's lacrosse coach at St. John Fisher," Edmunds said in a news release. "This program has not only achieved extraordinary success but has also cultivated a spirit of excellence that resonates throughout our community. As a former Fisher player and assistant coach, I am committed to honoring that legacy while striving to build on the incredible foundation laid by Linda, the athletes, alumni and all those who support this

Edmunds compiled a 56-20 (.737) record at SUNY Irvine in Irvine, California.

Geneseo, leading the Knights to at least 12 wins in each of her four seasons in charge of the program.

Under Edmunds, Geneseo had 24 All-SUNYAC selections (10 first team), 13 Intercollegiate Women's Lacrosse Coaches Association (IWLCA) All-Region selections (7 first team) and one IWLCA All-American (Hanna Marafioti, 2022 second team). The Knights had the 2022 SUNYAC Rookie of the Year (Maddie Brown), the 2022 SUNYAC Offensive Player of the Year (Marafioti) and the 2023 and 2024 SUNYAC Defensive Player of the Year (Tricia Curran).

In their inaugural season in the Empire 8, the Knights had nine all-conference selections, including three first-team honorees, the second most in the conference behind St. John Fisher, which had 10 All-E8 players.

"I am thrilled that Marykate, a Fisher alumnus, will lead the women's lacrosse program after coach Michele's retirement," Granger said. "She brings a unique blend of passion, familiarity and a deep understanding of the program's history and values. Her ability to inspire and motivate players creates a special connection for our athletes, knowing they are being guided by someone who has walked in their shoes. I am excited for the future of the program."

Before her stop at Geneseo, Edmunds spent three seasons (2019-21) as SUNY Fredonia's head coach and two seasons (2017-18) as an assistant at St. John Fisher. The Cardinals went 32-8, won two Empire 8 championships, appeared in the NCAA Tournament twice and had 12 All-E8 selections (five first team) with Edmunds on staff.

Edmunds began her collegiate coaching career as an coach in Empire 8 Conference history and one of the assistant at SUNY Poly in 2016, where she helped guide the Wildcats to their first-ever SUNYAC championship Edmunds is the fifth head women's lacrosse coach in and NCAA Tournament berth. She served as the head coach of the New Hartford High School (NY) girls lacrosse team in 2015.

> As a Fisher player from 2011-14, Edmunds caused 73 turnovers over 74 games and earned second-team All-Empire 8 honors as a defender in 2012, 2013 and 2014. The Cardinals won the Empire 8 in each of those three seasons, beginning a streak of conference titles that reached 13 in 2025.

> Edmunds earned her Bachelor of Arts in sport management at St. John Fisher and her Master of Arts in athletic administration at Concordia University-



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Notice from the Town of New Hartford **Assessors Office**

Changes to the STAR program and STAR forms for 2026

The 2025-2026 Enacted State Budget included several provisions to simplify the STAR program for NYS homeowners, including no longer requiring homeowners to apply to their assessor for the Enhanced STAR exemption. (65 and older and 2024 adjusted gross income less than \$110,750 - ex: Form 1040 line 11 minus 4B)

Because of this, the following forms have been removed from the state website and will no longer be accepted in the assessor office.

- · Form RP-425-B, Application for Basic STAR Exemption
- · Form RP-425-E, Application for Enhanced STAR Exemption
- · Form RP-425-IVP, Supplement to Form RP-425-E

You can let the homeowner know the state will notify them, and the assessors' office, if they qualify for an Enhanced STAR exemption. If we need more information to determine eligibility, such as in cases of someone who does not file an income tax return, then the state will send a letter to them requesting information.

There is an additional Senior Citizens Exemption for lower incomes. To qualify, your 2024 complete household income minus 2024 out of pocket medical would need to be less than \$37,900. You would apply for this exemption with the Assessors office with your 2024 tax return and any proof of 2024 medical out of pocket expenses. Exemptions are due by March 1st. (This exemption will need to be applied for every year)

- ** If you already have the Senior Citizens exemption, renewals will be mailed to you by the Assessors' office.
- ** If you are a new owner you need to contact the state to file for Star Credit 518-457-2036 or www.tax.ny.gov/star

revitalization project has taken a major step forward with Oneida County awarding the Town of New Hartford a \$500,000 grant for critical infrastructure improvements. This investment will allow us to strengthen the backbone of our downtown updating water, sewer, and utility systems while laying the foundation for future growth.

I want to extend my sincere thanks to the Oneida County Planning Department for the incredible work they did in preparing this proposal. Their professionalism and vision have helped position Chadwicks for success, and this grant is proof of the positive impact that comes when local governments work hand-in-hand with county partners.

Our vision is to create a walkable, familyfriendly community by connecting downtown Chadwicks with the Chapman Road sidewalks, ensuring safe and convenient access for residents and visitors alike.

These projects will not only strengthen our infrastructure, but also enhance the beauty and character of downtown Chadwicks. Improved sidewalks, lighting, and streetscapes will make the area safer for pedestrians, especially families with children, while creating a more vibrant and welcoming destination.

New Hartford Highway News submitted by Highway Superintendent,

October is here and as a reminder, the Town Highway Department will start picking up leaves shortly. Please don't put leaves in plastic bags or containers. Place the leaves at the curb, so that our leaf vac trucks can pick them up. There is a leaf truck in each town ward, so that they can be picked up in a timely manner. Once the leaves start falling, the trucks will be out every single day. Please don't mix the leaf piles with other debris like sticks, dirt, rocks, brush, and pumpkins.

The Brush Collection is finished for the 2025 season. We will not be picking up any trees or brush until next season. The compactor trucks will still be out to pick up the green waste of flowers and grass clippings.

The town is still working diligently on Roman Rd detention ponds to finish pond number 1, then work will begin on the second pond. The town highway crew has worked on storm water detention ponds in the last two decades. Ten detention ponds have been built with one huge concrete dam. The dam along with the ponds hold back storm water going to the Sauquoit Creek, helping Whitestown, and the village of Whitesboro. The new concrete dam has stopped the flooding at the JK Lumber/Rt 5 intersection which goes to Sauquoit Creek.

The salt brine that the Town of New Hartford uses along with many other Municipalities like New York DOT and New York State Thruway Authority, is less corrosive than pure salt as the brine is mixed with water and works immediately. The brine is sprayed with tankers prior to a snow storm and works up in the hills to burn off the hard pack snow that may adhere to the road. New Hartford has 10 plow routes and each truck has its own brine saddle tank that sprays the material being spread.

The Highway trucks are being checked and plows, wings and hoppers will be installed for the 2025-2026 winter season. The salt hoppers needed some repairs with grates and frames as they are about 20 years old.

The Highway department is still working with FEMA for reimbursement on our projects. The Town's Engineer is still working on the Rayhill Trail repair with DEC, Army Corp, FEMA and the State and is going out to bid within the next few weeks.

The Town Highway Department has several full-time openings. You can apply on the Oneida County website under Town of New Hartford. The openings are MEO positions and must have either a Class A or B CDL license.

VILLAGE OF NEW HARTFORD 2025 CURBSIDE JUNK COLLECTION GUIDELINES

The following pertains to **VILLAGE OF NEW HARFORD** residents only and **does not** include the Town of New Hartford.

For more detailed information, refer to your Village Garbage Collection flyer or call the Village DPW at 315-724-0379 or the Village office at 315-732-1147.

The Village of New Hartford will have a curbside junk pick up on Monday, October 13, 2025. Materials must be at the curb by 5:00 am on October 13th.

Materials must be sorted into separate piles as listed below:

- 1) <u>Household Junk</u>: lumber bundled, piled parallel with the roadway, roofing and plaster in containers weighing 60 pounds or less, furniture without fabric, porcelain sinks, toilets, and storm windows
- 2) Sanitary Waste: clothes, bedding, stuffed furniture, hardcover books, empty paint cans with lids removed, and toys
- 3) <u>Metal</u>: major appliances and metal products
- 4) Tires: Tires must be off rims and no larger than 16". No large truck or tractor tires
- **§** Only one pickup of each category listed per street.
- **§** Nothing longer than 8 feet long will be collected.
- **§** Collection limits for categories #1 (Household Junk) and #2 (Sanitary Waste) are each limited to a pile not to exceed 4' wide, 8' long, and 3' high.

The DPW will not accept:

- 1) Recyclable materials, lumber exceeding the limit stated above, and shingles not contained. For construction and demolition projects, please contact the Village DPW or a private waste hauler to make arrangements for a dumpster.
- 2) Propane cylinders and liquids such as paints, thinners, waste oil, herbicides, and pesticides. These items may be disposed of at the Oneida-Herkimer County Waste Authority drop site per their collection schedule. For more information, call 315-733-1224.
- 3) Automotive batteries. Due to employee and environmental hazards, batteries may be returned to a redemption or recycling facility.

Thank you for your cooperation with sorting materials and observing these guidelines. It helps reduce costs and insures the continuation of this program.

GREEN WASTE AND LEAF COLLECTION INFORMATION

Leaves, grass clippings, and brush will be collected every Wednesday through the end of September. Brush must be bundled and leaves, grass, and trimmings must be contained in reusable cans. Limbs must be less than 12" in diameter and less than 6' long for collection.

From October 1st through November 15th, leaves will be collected loose at the curb once weekly. Please keep leaves separate from brush pile. <u>Plastic bags used for leaves and green waste are not permitted and will not be collected. Please do not pile leaves in the roadway.</u>

Additionally, unused and/or unwanted cellphones will also be collected for donation to Cell Phones for Soldiers to help military members and veterans connect with their families and loved ones.

"This is an important opportunity to safely and properly dispose of unwanted electronics, medications and paper," Sen. Griffo said. "I thank the Oneida-Former Pittsburgh Steelers General Manager Kevin Herkimer Solid Waste Authority, Confidata and DEC for again partnering with me for this upcoming event."

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
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Collecting Ephemera

Ephemera, by definition, refers to printed or written material that was intended to be temporary in nature, yet has survived as a record of everyday life. Items such as postcards, trade cards, tickets, theater programs, posters, and advertising brochures fall under this category. Originally created for practical or promotional use, ephemera was never meant to be preserved for posterity. However, it is precisely this fleeting quality that makes such items so appealing to collectors today.

The study and collecting of ephemera provide valuable insight into cultural, social, and economic history. A 19th-century trade card, for example, can reveal much about consumer habits, graphic design trends, and business practices of the time. Likewise, vintage postcards and brochures often capture views of towns, landscapes, and buildings long since altered or demolished. Political flyers, ration books, and war bond posters preserve the emotions and messaging of historic eras.


Collectors are drawn to ephemera not only for its beauty or rarity, but also for the stories it tells about ordinary people and everyday experiences. Unlike fine art or expensive antiques, ephemera often offers an intimate and accessible glimpse into the past. Though fragile and easily lost, these small pieces of paper help us connect with history in a very personal way, ensuring that what was once considered disposable continues to inform and inspire future generations.



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Physical Fitness


I don't usually need a great deal of research for this column, but I decided to find out the latest description of "Physical Fitness." I stumbled into an AI description that closely resembles one I found 20 years ago. I'd like to present it, with some added dialogue, hoping to expound on it and help you understand it more deeply.

Physical Fitness is the ability of your bodily systems to work together efficiently to allow you to be healthy and perform daily physical activities without undue fatigue. It's a state of well-being and a capacity to perform aspects of sports, occupations, and daily activities.

The biggest challenge associated with Physical Fitness is maintaining a balance between Cardiovascular, Muscular Strength, Muscular Endurance, Flexibility, Body Composition and Neuromuscular Fitness. The biggest gap seems to be between Cardiovascular and Muscular Strength. Distance athletes dabble at Strength Training and Weight Trainers minimize time spent on Cardiovascular Exercise.

Cardiovascular Endurance is the ability of the heart and lungs to efficiently deliver oxygen to working

Dr. Kennith Cooper's revolutionary book, "Aerobics" made a tremendous impact on the fitness industry. "Aerobics," simply put means "in the presence of oxygen." I had a graduate school professor who adamantly opposed the term "Aerobics," rather chose to use the term "Cardiovascular." He even went so far as to ask a trick question on one of our exams that went like this, "Sitting here taking this exam are you aerobic or anaerobic?" I, fortunately answered, "Aerobic." Although I answered correctly, he grilled me anyway. He clapped his hands repeatedly when I stated "we are always aerobic, because we are breathing 21% oxygen all of the time." I don't think he had anything against Dr. Cooper but was a stickler for the accurate definition.



Muscular Strength is the ability of a muscle to exert muscular systems.

of barbells, dumbbells and machines. Maximal Strength is referred to as one's 1RM or one repetition maximum. Beginners can "max-out" once a week, intermediates, once a month and advance trainees every 2-3 months. Beginners exhaust far fewer muscle fibers than those who are advanced.

Muscular Endurance is the ability of a muscle to sustain repeated contractions or to hold a contraction for a period of time.

Push ups and sit-ups are the most recognized and associated with Muscular Endurance. Any movement performed for 15 or more repetitions may be considered a Muscular Endurance activity. The NFL Combine confuses me. Professional Football is hardly a Muscular Endurance activity and athletes are asked to perform a 225 pound Bench Press for 20, 30, 40 or more repetitions.

Flexibility is a range of motion around a joint.

In the 70's, athletes would reach their maximal extension or flexion and bounce several times. In the 1980's until recently, bouncing was considered dangerous and frowned upon. Currently, athletes are instructed to, again, bounce, claiming it activates more of a stretch reflex.

Body Composition is the proportion of fat, muscle and bone and other tissues of the body.

Experts suggest Men should be 10-20% body fat and Women 20-30% body fat. These are fairly liberal estimations, not considering age, fitness level and a variety of additional factors.

Neuromuscular Fitness includes components like balance, coordination, agility and reaction time, reflecting the interplay between the nervous and

Trained athletes exhibit very efficient levels of Usually associated with Resistance Training in the form Neuromuscular Fitness. Repeated, highly specific (to their sport) drills repeated over extended periods of months and years produces highly skilled, sport specific athletes. In other words, tennis players would do well to practice tennis specific drills for several repetitions, over a long period of time. A common training mistake occurs when athletes mistakenly believe that lifting weights is enough. Resistance Training will definitely make you stronger and allow you to practice and play at a higher level. Hopefully, this gives you a better understanding of every component of physical fitness.

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

It was another busy month for your New Hartford Volunteer Fire Department as they responded to 84 alarms during this month.

hues of the fall with the apex of the season of Mother Nature's color pallet of orange, yellow, gold, and red. Halloween season is time for family, fun, tasty candy, scary movies, and misty moons. Everyone has their favorite folkways when dealing with the 31st of October, whether its spooky decorations of witches, zombies, and ghosts to trick-or-treating, or walking haunted houses. We all have memories of childhood Halloween, and the debate will be endless on the best candies, costumes, scary movies, and spooky television shows. The decade of the 1970's was a magical time for me as being in my youth with the excitement and fun of Halloween where we'd don our costumes, remove our pillows from their cases so we could use them to hold the trick or treat items we received from our neighbors as we went doorto-door in the quest for sugar-loaded delights. Ben Cooper was a costume designer on Broadway in the 1930's and parlayed his talents into the best-selling Halloween masks we all wore from the 1950's through the 1980's. My favorite Halloween television show was "It's the Great Pumpkin Charlie Brown" where I was enthralled by the possibility of the Great Pumpkin and sad for Charlie as he got nothing but rocks in his trick or treat bag. I was especially enthralled with all the monsters in it that included Dracula, Wolfman, and a cameo by the Invisible Man. This is still, to this day, one of the funniest, best movies ever made and has been a hit since its debut in 1948. Keep in mind that Frankenstein was the creator and the creature was "Frankenstein's monster." The subtitle was, "The Modern Prometheus," with Mary Shelley having written it in 1818 with it being deemed the first ever science fiction novel. As a child, my favorite treats when out on Halloween were candy corn and Snickers with my least favorite being pennies and apples. The Binghamton Mansions celebrate "Home for the Holidays" and will be spectacularly decorated in the spirit of the season! The Robeson Mansion Museum features over 150 Christmas trees - -a not-to-be-missed experience! The Phelps Mansion Museum features some of the most spectacular woodworking imaginable. The Kilmer Mansion is among the most beloved in the entire Binghamton area. Dinner is included at the Old Union Hotel annex.



Phelps Mansion Museum

Originally owned by Sherman David Phelps, entrepreneur and one-time mayor of Binghamton, the Phelps Mansion was constructed in 1871. Its location on Court Street was once known as "Mansion Row," but today the museum is the only such structure left.

The mansion was designed by one of New York State's most famous 19th century architects, Isaac G. Perry, who also designed the Binghamton Inebriate Asylum (1858) and helped complete the New York State Capitol Building (1899). The Second Empire Style home is decorated with Italian marble floors, black walnut staircases, and period lighting fixtures, all housed within its grand 14ft ceilings.

After 1905 the mansion was owned by the Monday Afternoon Club, a private women's club whose focus was on education, philanthropy, and social causes of the day. The Monday Afternoon Club owned the house for over 100 years.



Robeson Mansion and Museum

The three story, gilded age Mansion was a gift from Alonzo and Margaret Roberson to the community, with hopes of it becoming a nationally renowned center for the arts, history, and science.

Featuring a beautifully restored third-floor ballroom, a stunning grand staircase with an iconic stained-glass window, 26 rooms, 11 fireplaces, and a working, wrought iron elevator – stepping into Roberson Mansion is like stepping into Binghamton's storied past.

Roberson Mansion is available to rent for weddings and other gatherings. Rental costs support the ongoing historic preservation of the Mansion and general operations.

In 1904 Alonzo and Margaret Roberson decided to move from their Main Street home to the prestigious Front Street/Riverside Drive area of Binghamton. They hired C. Edward Vosbury, a prominent Binghamton architect, to design the house. Vosbury designed an Italian Renaissance Revival style house with all of the modern conveniences. The plan included an elevator, central heat, combination gas and electric lighting fixtures, a dumb waiter, an intercom system, and a private bath for each bedroom. As in most large homes in the area, there was a billiard room and a ballroom on the third floor. The design also incorporated a three-story servants' wing in the back of the house.

Alonzo died May 16, 1934. At the time of his death, he was President of the Roberson & Son Lumber Co. and Chairman of the Board of Marine Midland Bank. His will provided for the establishment of "an education center" in the Front St home after its use by his widow. Margaret died in 1953 and as willed, The Roberson Memorial Center opened to the public in 1954.



Kilmer Mansion

Built in 1898, Kilmer Mansion is part home and part castle. It features turrets and towers, ballrooms and balconies. Visitors will find fine stonework and masterful woodwork. The Mansion is never uninhabited. Lions roar on the exterior. A gargoyle peeks out from beneath the eaves. A dragon guards the entrance, and painted angels dance across the ceiling.

Dr. S. Andral Kilmer was a medical doctor who believed in his heart and soul that his remedies would cure people's ills. He invited his businessman brother, Jonas, to help build his company. Jonas' son, Willis, put his marketing degree from Cornell University to work turning swamp root into a household name and making millions.

When the local paper questioned whether the Kilmer remedies really worked, Willis started his own. When the Press building was under construction, he made sure it would tower over all of the others in downtown Binghamton.

The Kilmers were owners and breeders of worldclass racehorses. Their stable included Exterminator, the surprise winner of the 1918 Kentucky Derby. This much-beloved horse inspired an entire city with his indomitable spirit. They even sold their private yacht Remlik (read it backwards) to the Navy to serve as an armored patrol vessel during World War I.

Jonas M. Kilmer and his wife, Julia, had one child, Willis Sharpe Kilmer. They built exquisite mansions, side-by-side, at the east end of Riverside Drive. The Willis Sharpe Kilmer Mansion was torn down decades ago, as was its next-door neighbor, the Edward Rose Mansion. The Robert Rose Mansion was demolished in 1980 despite protests.

The Jonas M. Kilmer Mansion is the sole survivor of the four original mansions. It is home to one of the last grand parlors of the Parlor City.

Since 1950, Temple Concord has been the steward to this mansion, saving it from the fate of its three sister mansions. However, the Temple no longer has the financial resources to care for the Mansion the way it requires and deserves. It will take a village to save this local treasure. And leading the way is Friends of Kilmer Mansion. This nonprofit organization is dedicated to sharing the Mansion with the community and raising the money needed to restore and preserve this historic gem.



Community Wellness Partners and Utica University Launch Pilot Cycling Program for People with Parkinson's

Community Wellness Partners Cycling with Parkinson's

Community Wellness Partners (CWP) is proud to announce a new partnership with Utica University to launch a pilot program titled Community Wellness Partners Cycling with Parkinson's. This innovative program is designed to provide therapeutic cycling sessions for individuals living with Parkinson's disease, and will engage students from Utica University in delivering first-hand experience.

The pilot program will run weekly from Wednesday, October 22, 2025, through Wednesday, November 26, 2025, at the Community Wellness Partners Wellness Center, located on the Presbyterian Campus, 4300 Middle Settlement Road, New Hartford, NY. Each session begins at 10:30 AM and will last one hour.

Twenty-six students enrolled in Utica University's Fall 2025 course Level 1 Adult Field Work for Psycho-Social Factors will participate in the program. Students will have the opportunity to lead the class and assist participants with balance, gait support, and safe use of stationery spin-style bicycles.

"Two of our current Rock Steady Boxing participants approached us with the idea of launching a cycling program for individuals with Parkinson's," said Alison J. Swartz, Parkinson's Program Director. "Our Rehab Therapy team is highly engaged and enthusiastic about expanding the use of our bicycles. They also maintain strong connections with students and faculty at Utica University, and are confident in the students' motivation and capability to help bring this initiative to life."

The program, which has been funded by the generosity of many local donors, will feature structured sessions including a 5-10 minute warm-up, 30-40 minutes of sustained cycling with increased RPMs, followed by a 5-10 minute cool down. Forced exercise, such as cycling, has been shown to help reduce the symptoms of Parkinson's disease.

CWP is currently seeking nine individuals from the community who are living with Parkinson's disease to participate in this free program. Depending on demand and interest, the program can be expanded to include a spouse, significant other, or caregiver.

Parkinson's disease affects approximately 10 people worldwide, with nearly 1 million cases in the U.S. – a number projected to rise to 1.2 million by 2030. In New York state alone, around 65,000 individuals live with Parkinson's, with a notably high prevalence in the Mohawk Valley region.







Yom Kippur October 1-2

Yom Kippur 2025 is from the evening of Wednesday, October 1 to nightfall on Thursday, October 2, and it is the holiest day in the Jewish year, known as the Day of Atonement. It is a solemn, 25-hour period of fasting, intense prayer, and self-reflection, marking the culmination of the 10 Days of Awe that begin with Rosh Hashanah. The meaning is to seek forgiveness for sins committed against both God and other people, culminating the period when one's fate for the coming year is sealed in the Book of Life.

Key Aspects of Yom Kippur

Day of Atonement: Yom Kippur means "Day of Atonement" and is the holiest day in Judaism.

Fasting and Prayer: It is observed with a 25-hour fast from food and drink, along with extensive prayer, often spent in the synagogue.

Repentance and Forgiveness: It is a time for spiritual return and transformation, or teshuvah. Jews seek forgiveness from God for sins committed against God and also ask for forgiveness from people they have wronged.

Sealed in the Book of Life: The day concludes the High Holy Days, a period that began with Rosh Hashanah, when Jewish tradition holds that individuals' fates for the coming year are inscribed and then sealed on Yom Kippur.

How It's Observed

Self-Reflection: It involves deep introspection to examine one's actions and commitments for the year ahead.

Reconciliation: The focus is on making peace with God, oneself, and others.

Synagogue Services: Many Jews spend the day in synagogue, participating in special prayers and services.

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WATER DAMAGE FROZEN AND BURST PIPES, ICE DAMMING, **TOILET OVERFLOW, SUMP PUMP** FAILURE, FLOODED BASEMENTS

That time of the year is quickly approaching. 

The Andrews Sisters

America's Wartime Sweethearts

Anyone who remembers the terrible World War II years likely recalls the Andrews Sisters, a trio of singing sisters who were both enormously successful during that time and enormously patriotic, always advocating the sale of war bonds in support of the war effort. Born and raised in Minneapolis, Minnesota, the sisters, Laverne (1911-1967), Maxine (1917-1995), and Patty (1918-2013) formed a singing group sort of imitating the Boswell singers of the time and performing initially in the Midwest. After a radio appearance, the sisters were signed by Decca records which in 1937 resulted in the first million record sales by a female singing group. Known as America's Wartime Sweethearts, the group performed frequently on behalf of military doings. They also appeared in several movies with beloved performers such as Abbot and Costello. Some of their major hits were Boogie Woogie Bugle Boy, Rum and Coca Cola, I'll Be With You in Apple Blossom Time, Don't Sit Under the Apple, The Beer Barrel Polka, Pistol Packing Mamma, and many, many more, resulting in an estimated sale of 80 million records, then the most ever by a female singing group. Stricken with cancer, Laverne retired from the group in 1966 and eventually the group itself disbanded. But it was during their prime, in August of 1942, that the then sensational Andrews Sisters appeared at the Stanley Theater, certainly a night to remember for those in attendance.

Selling your Business to a Private Equity Group vs. a Strategic Buyer

If you own a business, it can be overwhelming to think about selling it. One way to gain some control is to learn about your alternatives to help you better understand what is best for you, your family, and your company. While buyers come in all shapes and sizes, two of the most common are private equity groups (PEGs) and strategic buyers.

Private equity group

A PEG is made up of financial professionals who have raised money to buy — and eventually sell — companies.

Key considerations: It is important to consider your financial and timing goals to determine if a PEG sale is a fit. Your continued involvement will be based on your current role in the company. Are you comfortable running the company with another majority owner? Traditionally, PEGs target a three-to-five year holding period, after which they attempt a second sale of the company.

What happens: As a simple example, assume you sell your company for \$1,000. Assume also that the PEG funds the transaction with \$500 debt and \$500 equity and asks you to roll over (or re-invest) \$100 so that you own a 20% equity interest. Your existing management — and perhaps you — will be tasked with growing the business while paying down the debt.

Now, let's say you double the profits while completely paying off the debt during the PEG hold period. Assuming the same valuation multiple of profit/cash flow, the business would be valued at \$2,000 and you would get 20%, or \$400, for your \$100 investment assuming all debt was paid off.

Risks: Of course, there's no guarantee the business will grow while paying down the debt or that it will sell on favorable terms. In the meantime, you will have a majority owner that is looking to exit in a few years, so its goals and culture may not align with yours. When considering a PEG, you want to be comfortable with them and their level of involvement in the running of the company and understand how decisions will be made.

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Strategic buyer

A strategic buyer is usually a company in the same or related industry that has some overlap or synergy that would result in incremental savings or revenue if it bought your company.

Key considerations: Your company may be absorbed, which is important to consider if you value legacy. There may be a heightened risk for job loss, especially among senior leaders, as your team may overlap with that of the buyer. Each strategic buyer is unique as will be their transition of your company. The flip side is you may find it easier to walk from a strategic sale.

What happens: Unlike a PEG, you will usually not be asked to reinvest in the company, and depending on your current role, you may be involved in a transition period of only a few months. What happens to your management team and the rest of your workforce depends on the overlap with the buyer and its strategic direction

Risks: If you are paid in the acquiring company's stock, you need to consider the risk of owning that much of one security. If the buyer is a public company, you may be able to sell that stock and diversify over time, but that can be delayed if the stock is restricted. In that case, you can be prohibited from selling until after a vesting period or certain conditions are met.

If the buyer pays with private company stock, you need to know your path to liquidity. Until you do so, you will own shares in a larger company you no longer control, and it likely will represent a large percentage of your personal assets so you need to understand your ownership rights and remedies.

Transitioning your ownership of a company is more complex than a typical retirement, but it can be less daunting if you understand your options.





Two Short Irish Films "An Chathair Mhór" and "Sit Down and Shut Up"

Please join us at the H.A.R.P. Museum on Wednesday, October 8 at 11 AM , for a different twist on its popular Lunch & Learn Series when we will be featuring two short films from an up and coming young Irish filmmaker.

Our first film is "An Chathair Mhór". "An Chathair Mhór" (The Big City), New York's first Irish language film tells the story of Éanna O Connor, a lost twenty-something, who moves away from home in search of a new life in the big city. In need of money he takes a job minding his distant relative Brida. The two, distant at first, find themselves more alike than they realize. But how can they express this? An Chathair Mhór is a film about connection, the power of language and the city of New York. Yes, there are English subtitles.

Our second film is "Sit Down and Shut Up". It's 1980, Ireland is in the midst of recession, the world is locked in the Cold War and football royalty Real Madrid travel to play local football club Limerick City FC in world football's premier competition, the European Cup. This is the David vs Goliath tale about the opera of football, the city of Limerick, and a game that no one remembers that three men will never forget. This is "Sit Down and Shut Up".

Filmmaker Cian Frank ÓConnor will be on-hand to present his works. Cian is a writer/director from the West of Ireland based in New York City. The Kerryman newspaper has described Cian's work as "stories from the West of Ireland, with echoes of the past and lessons for the present.". He has won awards from the Irish Arts Council, Garden State Film Festival, Indie Cork Festival, Kerry Film Festival and many more. Cian's work has also screened at the Galway Film Fleadh, Cambridge Film Festival, Newport Beach Film Festival and DOC NYC. His work has been covered by major news outlets such as The Irish Examiner, Irish Central and The Daily Star. Cian strives to tell unique stories and rural tales, with a distinctive visual flair.


The Irish and the Erie Canal -Wednesday October 22, 2025

An engineering marvel of its day, the Erie Canal was opened on October 26, 1825. New Hartford Rotary News

Many of you who may have either driven by or walked through the Town of New Hartford Veterans Memorial Park have probably noticed a section of the park that looks a bit neglected. This area is actually the initial stage of the New Hartford Rotary Club's microforest. What is a microforest? "A microforest is a very dense planting of native species on an area as small as 2/10 of an acre to as large as an acre or more." The microforest method "...follows the inspiration and guidance of Akira Miyawaki, a distinguished Japanese botanist who developed a strategy to convert otherwise unproductive, largely urban land into forest that grow exceptionally fast and provide many environmental benefits." The plants in a microforest are small at first but the canopy trees grow quickly to create a dense thicket that is inviting to wildlife and - if a trail is introduced (which is the case with our microforest)- affords passersthrough with shade and privacy. Because of the rapid growth rate, high performance microforests "intercept, filter, and transpire an enormous quantity of stormwater" whose nutrients would otherwise end up in storm sewers or creeks, rivers, lakes, etc. If properly placed, they can help control flash floods and also "sequester an enormous amount of carbon against climate change", which is one of our important objectives to help protect the environment. Microforest are best used if they are planted onto small sites that are protected from future development because of their location, shape or undesirability for any other use. "The bottom line is that microforests take small scraps of land that are not providing much ecological benefits and 'supercharges' them into an extremely productive contributor of ecological services- benefits such as stormwater diversion, carbon sequestration, wildlife habitat, shading and coolingto our suburban and urban environment."

And if anyone is concerned about the weed growth, this is part of the first stages of a microforest. Fast-growing weeds can stabilize soil and reduce erosion, especially in early stages of microforest establishment. Dense weed cover can offer shade and moisture retention, which may benefit some seedlings in hot or dry climates. Some weeds signal soil conditions (e.g., compaction, nutrient imbalance), helping guide restoration strategies. Flowering weeds can attract beneficial insects, including pollinators and predators of pests. And when the weeds die off during the winter months, they can act as more nutrients for the soil and the development of the variety of plants, bushes and trees.

During the 2nd stage of this project, the club hopes to add signage that will fully explain the microforest concept as well as the addition of some benches along the trail and Rotary Peace Poles, a monument that displays the message May Peace Prevail On Earth in the language of the country where it is placed and up to 3 to 7 additional languages meaningful to the host site.

The message is referred to as an affirmation of peace and its placement furthers Rotary's goal of building a culture of peace throughout the world.

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
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
