Upstate University Hospital's Mammography Van

Will return to the New Hartford Public Library on November 13th

Upstate University Hospital's Mammography Van will return to the New Hartford Public Library at 2 Library Lane in New Hartford, on Thursday, November 13, 2025. The screenings will be available between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. Appointments are recommended for women who want to get a mammogram, to ensure they will be seen that day.

To schedule an appointment for a mammogram with the van, women should call 315-464-2588.

Appointments can also be requested online at: www. upstate.edu/noexcuses.

To be eligible for a mammogram on the van, women should be 40 years and older; not have had a mammogram in the past 12 months; and not be experiencing breast problems.

The mobile mammography program was started through New York State's "Get Screened, No Excuses" Breast Cancer Initiative, and continues with the support of Upstate University Hospital.

The program's aim is to get rid of obstacles to breast cancer screening for women in New York.

The average rate for screening mammography in New York is 81 percent.

The mammography van is equipped with a state-ofthe art 3D digital mammogram system, private exam room, dressing rooms and a waiting room.

Breast cancer is one of the most common cancers in women, affecting one in 8 women. It's also one of the most treatable cancers when detected early. Mammograms—x-rays of the breasts—are the most effective screening procedure for the early signs of breast cancer. For information, contact: Wendy Hunt at 315-492-3353.





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
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NHFD News



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



Although they had to wait for a litter to be born and then get to the right age for training, it was well worth the wait!

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
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Casey Viator, at the age of 19, won the 1971 AAU Mr. America and claimed he used Nautilus Equipment exclusively, performing one set per exercise, to "momentary muscular failure." In 1972, the Miami Dolphins announced they would be using Nautilus Equipment exclusively, in preparation for their upcoming season. I began researching Nautilus and it's revolutionary "variable resistance" cams. Although the Dolphins finished the season undefeated and Super Bowl Champions, I was still not sold on their "variable resistance" philosophy.

I could not believe only one set would produce results. During my time studying Exercise Science in undergraduate and graduate school, I discovered there may be better, more effective methods to achieve muscular size and strength. I still, however, continued to perform multiple sets per exercise. Every few weeks, I was forced to take a week off to overcome "over training" and total exhaustion. I contracted Mononucleosis and spent several days in bed and could not workout for a month. During my convalescence, I researched scientific studies comparing multiple sets per exercise versus one set to momentary muscular failure. I decided to scrap my six days a week, multiset program and give one set, to momentary muscular failure a try.

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Recovery was an alien concept to me. My training consisted of three, non-consecutive days a week for about 45-minutes each. Each set terminated only because I could not perform another repetition in good form (momentary muscular failure). Gains in muscular size and strength were beyond my wildest expectations. Before one of my workouts, a guy approached me with an unusual offer. He owned and operated a local Nautilus Fitness Center and would give me a free membership. One stipulation: I had to complete in the Mr. Kentucky Contest, in three months. My counter offer was that my current training partner had to be included in the deal.

Our workouts were not pleasant. I discovered the role of Lactic Acid in muscular development.

Lactic Acid is the body's protective mechanism to avoid muscular injury, but also a goal while reaching momentary muscular failure. My workouts were no longer 45-minutes, but reduced to 30-minutes! I could not imagine undergoing any more discomfort, much less subjecting myself to any more than three, nonconsecutive days a week. The biggest surprise was, I placed 2nd in the 1979 Mr. Kentucky Contest! When asked about my training program by local media, they didn't believe I worked out so little. In fact, one television reporter brought a camera crew out to film one of my workouts.

Many still use the Delorme method of training, achieving minimal results. Endless sets of numerous repetitions may serve to feed one's ego, but noticeable results are achieved when muscles are brought to momentary muscular failure and given 48-hours to recover. At 71 years of age, I combat "age related" muscular weakness and atrophy with one set per exercise, taken to momentary muscular failure. One major benefit of this type of training, it's brief and not gobbling up a major part of my day. I reason, temporary discomfort, although not pleasant is the most effective method for gaining muscular mass. As an older adult, I know from first hand experience, it's also the best way to squelch the loss of aging muscles.

Thanksgiving Case Study of Cranberry Sauce

Is there anything else that marks the day of Thanksgiving more than cranberry sauce? I especially adore the gelatinous jelly variety that has not a whole cranberry within but is instead a blob of dark maroon delight that comes in a tin can and retains the shape of its host can, including the side ridges. And at a very cheap price I might add. My favorite part is after you open the top of the tin can, you turn it over, slap the bottom of the can to give birth to the tasty jelly blob onto your serving plate as it plops out wiggling ever so slightly. Cranberries (vaccinium macrocarpon) in their raw state are sour but are most popular when squeezed into a juice. They are rich in vitamins, healthy carbs, and fiber. When the European settlers arrived in North America in Port Royal, Novia Scotia, the cranberries were given the name "pommes de pre's) or "meadow apples." It was in the year of 1606 when the French settlers were introduced to cranberry sauce by the Mi' Kmaq indigenous Native Americans who would boil the cranberries and add in maple syrup for sweetness. This was served on meat, and an iconic treat was introduced and grown in popularity amongst the settlers. The first recipe of cranberry sauce on paper was written by Amelia Simmons in 1796 as included in her cookbook, "American Cookery" where she suggested you pair cranberry sauce with roast turkey. So, when did it become a staple and tradition of Thanksgiving dinner? Well, it wasn't at the first Thanksgiving with the pilgrims but much later on in the late 19th century during the Civil War. The Thanksgiving Association credits General Ulysses S. Grant with making cranberry sauce a Thanksgiving tradition as he ordered it to be served to all the Union troops at the 1864 Thanksgiving. This, of course, was still your traditional

hand-made sweet serving as the canned gelatinous version was not invented until 1912. Canned cranberry sauce and cranberry jelly was invented by Marcus Urann, a lawyer who became a cranberry farmer. He named his brand "Ocean Spray" and it is still the most famous brand of canned cranberry sauce till this day. To this day it is my favorite item at Thanksgiving along with my mother's recipe for cabbage salad. True story, dear readers, that my wife is from Colombia and when she came to the United States, and had her first Thanksgiving, I proudly gave her a serving of my favorite cranberry canned jelly delight, and she absolutely despised it. I nodded. I smiled, for now I know that the entire can of cranberry sauce now may plop on my Thanksgiving Day plate. It's all mine to consume and enjoy. And for that I give the gods of the cranberry my gratitude and satisfied stomach thanks.

New Hartford Highway News

As I write this article today October 15, 2025, the leaves have been falling for a few weeks now. It seems like every year the leaves are falling later in the season. All this tells me that the leaves are going to fall late again this year. This gives us a very small window if snow arrives early. So please, once the leaves start to fall don't wait, get them to the street. This year the four vac style leaf pickers will be out in full force. With four trucks out in all wards every day, there will be no night shifts picking up leaves. Please do not place leaves in plastic bags or containers. PLEASE DO NOT PLACE ARTICLES SUCH AS BRUSH, PUMKINS, AND ROCKS IN WITH THE LEAVES. These articles damage the machines impeller fan, causing down time during our busiest season. I have noticed in my drives around the town that people are placing brush, branches with the leaf piles. Picking up brush piles is over. I am utilizing the employees on the leaf trucks. The rainy season is also upon us, which brings the leaves down and plugs our catch basins, which cause flooding.

Please remove all basketball hoops from the town right of ways so that the plows will not hit them and damage the hoops during the winter season. Also remember no all-night parking on Town of New Hartford Highways starting October 1st.

The Highway department winter shifts will start November 30, 2025 this year. The town will continue to have two shifts: 4:00 am - 4:00 pm and 4:00 pm - 4:00 am for plowing and sanding. The mechanics are working very hard to get the trucks, hoppers and plows ready for these winter months. The salt shed is full with this year's salt and the Bs are being delivered. The salt brine is being made and the tanks are full for the start of this winter season.

The detention pond work continues on the upper side of Roman Rd.

Work continues on the new street sign installations as they come in for placement on the new sign posts this fall.

The highway crew will be removing the Veterans banners right after Veterans Day. The 3-year banners have expired and will be ready for pickup by a family member after this date.

Several major accomplishments this month that reflect the Town's continued financial stability, teamwork, and commitment to residents.

"I'm proud to share that we successfully negotiated and settled two new union contracts with our Highway and Parks Departments, These agreements were reached through open communication and respect, ensuring fairness for our employees while protecting our taxpayers. 



November 2 – Rev. Lori Staubitz ,"A 200 Year Journey Well Worth the Telling"





That time of the year is quickly approaching. Of all the disasters that can happen in your home, there is none worse and more difficult to deal with than a pipe that has burst in your home or business. The extreme cold of winter often brings extreme problems to North East homeowners and businesses. The worst of these is a frozen pipe that bursts and the water damage clean up that follows. When the cold temperatures don't rise above freezing for weeks on end, broken or frozen pipes lead to severe water damage from flooding. A frozen pipe generally occurs to plumbing that is not in a heated space or in an area that is not supplied with proper heat when winter temperatures fall below freezing. A malfunctioning furnace, while the homeowner is away, is another likely cause of a frozen pipe. When exposed to below freezing temperatures the water turns into ice and the pipe expands until it breaks a small slit into the copper or separates the soldered joint. Pipes that freeze first are usually located near outside walls that are exposed to the colder temperatures rather than pipes located throughout the middle of the structure. Some examples include outdoor hose bibs, pool lines, outdoor and indoor sprinkler systems, and other supply lines located in attics, basements, crawl spaces, garages, etc. Pipes in attics, crawl spaces & unheated rooms are particularly susceptible to freezing. Usually, a frozen pipe is not often obvious because the break can be behind walls, in ceilings or in a crawl space leading into the home. The flooding usually is caught much later after damage has been done. An uncontrolled water leak from a broken pipe creates extensive flooding and water damage of carpeting, drywall, baseboards, and furniture and depending on the location of the break can also damage the heating and electrical systems in your home. 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

Q. I have a covered butter dish that I remember gracing my grandmother's dinner table on holidays and special occasions. It was passed down to my mother who in turn gave it to me a few years ago. Can you tell me anything about it and its approximate value? I would never part with it but it would be nice to know.

A. Your Depression glass butter dish is very recognizable as being in the Cherry Blossom pattern that was produced by the Jeannette Glass Company of Jeannette, Ohio. It is considered the most collected pattern in Depression glass. For that reason it has been widely reproduced. You are fortunate that you have the provenance of knowing it has been in your family for many years, thus authenticating it as a genuine piece of Jeannette Glass. I would value it at \$75 in today's market.

Q. I have a wood and metal washboard that I purchased at an auction several years ago. I am curious if it has any value?

A. Your antique washboard is an artifact of a time gone by. It is hard to think that these were a very effective way to wash clothes, but as they say, necessity is the mother of invention. So many were produced and many are still around today. I would value it at \$25.

Q. This antique brass lock belonged to my mother's great uncle. He prized it and gave it me when I was in my 20's, which was a long time ago. It is a cherished keepsake but would like to know what it is worth?

A. Your very nice brass padlock dates back to the Victorian era. These locks are highly collectible and the fact that you have the keys and its pristine condition

enhance its value. I would estimate its value at \$100, however it could command an even higher price from a collector.

Genesis Group to Celebrate Education

American Education Week is celebrated during the third full week of November each year. In 2025, it will take place from November 18th to November 22nd, providing a dedicated time for schools, families, and communities to come together and support education.

The National Education Association was one of the creators and original sponsors of American Education Week. Distressed that 25 percent of the country's World War I draftees were illiterate and 9 percent were physically unfit, representatives of the NEA and the American Legion met in 1919 to seek ways to generate public support for education. The conventions of both organizations subsequently adopted resolutions of support for a national effort to raise public awareness of the importance of education. In 1921, the NEA Representative Assembly in Des Moines, Iowa, called for designation of one week each year to spotlight education. In its resolution, the NEA called for: "An educational week ... observed in all communities annually for the purpose of informing the public of the accomplishments and needs of the public schools and to secure the cooperation and support of the public in meeting those needs." The first observance of American Education Week occurred December 4-10, 1921, with the NEA and American Legion as the cosponsors.

Locally, The Genesis Group has sponsored a celebration of education for the past 19 years. We believe recognition isn't just about feeling good. 

Ed Roman Discharge Papers November 1945

The end of World War 1, hostilities officially ceased at 11am on November 11, 1918. In 1919, President Woodrow Wilson formally declared November 11th Armistice Day. (In 1954 it was renamed Veteran's Day). Since Veteran's Day falls in November, we felt it was appropriate to honor a New Hartford veteran in this month's article. Every community, throughout each state, across the nation has dozens of dedicated men and women who have served honorably in our armed services. Picking just one is never easy, but our spotlight shines this month on a veteran who, after serving in WWII, continued to serve his community for decades after returning home. Edward Roman Jr. was born in New Hartford February 16, 1924, to Edward and Myrtie (Manning) Roman. He attended New Hartford Schools. In April of 1942, just two months after his 18th birthday, he would join the New Hartford Volunteer Fire Department. However, his time with NHFD would be put on pause as Ed would join the U.S. Army Air Corps. After enlisting, Ed was sent to England where he served with the 503rd Fighter Squadron stationed at Safron-Walden. While serving, he would be promoted to corporal. He would also meet a girl from Cambridge while attending a dance. Several months later, on June 23, 1945, they exchanged wedding vows in her hometown. Just two months later, Ed received his orders to return to the states. After arriving back at Fort Dix in New Jersey, his Honorable Discharge was processed and he was discharged on November 16, 1945. After returning home, Ed would go to work in anticipation of supporting his new bride. She would arrive by ocean liner a few short months after. They would settle in New Hartford where they would raise four children. Ed would return to the fire department where he would serve faithfully for forty-one years rising to the rank of Chief. He held that rank for twenty-two years. He would also serve as a County Legislator and Town Highway Superintendent. He would also serve as a Deputy Fire Coordinator for Oneida County. Sadly, Ed would pass suddenly in March of 1983 at just 59 years of age.




Lunch and Learn: Nicholas **Devereux: An Enduring Legacy**





What is Behavioral Finance ... and Why Should you Care?

Investors may like to think they're completely rational in their decision-making, but that's highly unlikely. We don't stop being human beings when it comes to investing, so psychology and emotions are apt to play roles — sometimes large ones — in the choices we

Behavioral finance studies investors' real-life behavior and common biases. It considers the roles emotions and psychology play in making financial decisions and aims to identify factors that cause investors to sometimes act irrationally.

A key concept in behavioral finance is "prospect theory," which describes how investors make decisions involving risk and gain. Studies have shown people frequently consider losses far more undesirable than they find comparable gains desirable. For example, take the following scenarios:



Given the first scenario, most people will avoid the risk and take option one (the sure \$3,000 gain). On the other hand, when presented the second scenario, most favor option two (the 75% chance of losing \$4,000) because it offers the possibility of avoiding the pain of a loss.

choices are mathematically equivalent. This means individuals' responses were based primarily on their emotional reactions to fear of loss vs. enjoyment of gain, not rational decision-making.

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The psychology of risk and reward

If you ever wonder why markets sometimes act in ways that defy logic, behavioral finance helps explain it. For example, bubbles can form when prices rise based on investors' emotional reactions rather than the fundamentals. Once their sentiment eventually changes, a precipitous sell-off can follow.

Take what's come to be known as the dot-com bubble of the late 1990s. Soon after the internet's introduction, investors realized its potential to transform our everyday lives. What they were over-optimistic about were internet-based companies' abilities to quickly create profitable businesses.

In response to investors' enthusiasm, the NASDAQ Index, where many of these companies' stocks were listed, rose 189% during the two years leading up to its peak in March 2000. Perhaps more significantly, the price/earnings (P/E) ratio — a measure commonly used to determine how expensive stocks are (the higher the ratio, the more expensive stocks are considered to be) — was 175.1 By comparison, it was only 25 as of October 25, 2024.2

That suggests many investors were caught up in the furor over the New Economy and ignored the fundamentals. When investors realized it would be a long time before many of these companies became profitable, the bubble burst and stock prices plummeted.

The lesson for investors is the importance of being diversified and investing primarily based on fundamentals — not on emotion and the fear of missing out on the next "big thing." Of course, diversification strategies do not guarantee investment returns or eliminate the risk of loss.

With over 500 registrants once again this year, the crowd of hundreds enjoyed an opening ceremony with a presentation of the colors, the national anthem being sung by Connor's sister Meghan, a procession to the start line led by bagpiper Dr. Daniel Murphy, and a Color Guard consisting of members of the New Hartford American Legion, Chapter 490 Order of the Purple Heart and the Vietnam Veterans Chapter 944. Music was provided by The Crazy Fools live band.

The weather could not have been better for the first Connor's Way Kids' Fun Run, sponsored by Bruce F. Daniels, P.C. Each of the 41 participants received a free shirt, ran the ½ mile fun run with crowds cheering them on and were then rewarded with a finisher's ribbon and goodie bag. The first place finisher was Bryce Kapfer of Deerfield.

Guests Assemblywoman Marianne Buttonschon, Oneida County Sheriff Rob Maciol and New York State Police Captain Josh Stanton assisted Race Director Don Lynskey with presenting plaques to the top sponsors that were present at this year's event.

He planned to become a rural doctor once he completed his studies. The "Connor Arthur Lynskey Upstate College of Medicine" annual memorial scholarship is awarded to a medical students at Upstate with plan to serve as a doctors in rural areas.
