Awaken your imagination this spring with a Community Arts class at Munson. Classes begin in January, and registration is now available at munson.art/community-arts.

A variety of classes are available for all ages and levels, including drawing, painting, jewelry-making, screen printing, and sewing, and there are plenty of new classes to expand your creativity, including Nuno Felted Shawls, The Art of Creating Useful Woodwork, and Sit 'N Knit. Classes also vary from one-day workshops to minicourses to semester-long courses. All classes take place in state-of-the-art studios on the Munson and Pratt Munson College of Art and Design campus.

New class offering this spring: Join master craftsman Joe Koronowski and fellow makers in The Art of Useful Woodworking, where creativity and craftsmanship come together. Learn basic woodworking skills as you design and build a functional piece for your home such as a beginner's project of a serving tray, or an intermediate's project of a small bench or keepsake box. With guidance from a skilled woodcraft artisan, you'll transform simple materials into a piece that reflects your personal style. No experience is needed, just a willingness to create, connect, and leave with a handmade piece that's truly designed and made by you.

Scholarships for one class each semester are available to anyone who demonstrates significant financial need. Awards are limited and the amounts vary based on the number of qualified applications received. To apply, complete and submit a scholarship form, available at munson.art/community-arts. Applications are reviewed every few weeks and in the order they are received.





Barry Manilow Song Writer, Singer, Pianist

Born Barry Alan Pincus on June 17, 1943, in Brooklyn, New York, he was raised Jewish. At the time of his Bar Mitzvah, he changed his surname to Manilow, his mother's maiden name. With an early fascination for music, Barry attended the New York School of Music and the esteemed Julliard School of Music. Destined to have a lifetime of music, while still in his 20s, he directed a CBS network musical TV show in 1967. Barry worked on musicals with Ed Sullivan Productions, also writing commercial jingles for Dr. Pepper and Band Aid, State Farm Insurance (Like a good neighbor, State Farm is There). His voice in the 70s complemented the McDonald's jingle, "You Deserve a Break Today". As an early song writer and performer, Barry was modestly successful. However, when he teamed with Bette Midler for a nightclub act, he as her pianist, and later as her musical director, his



musical career blossomed. Barry subsequently worked with an array of performers including Mel Torme, Sarah Vaughn, and others. Some of his hits include Copacabana, I Write the Songs, Can't Smile Without You, Mandy, Looks Like We Made It, to name a few. Generally, his whole life has been and remains at this writing devoted to music, both as a writer and performer. His musical achievements were distinctly recognized by his induction in the Songwriters Hall of Fame in June 2002. Barry Manilow's memorable appearance at the Stanley Theater happened in November 1993. At this writing with Barry now in his 80s and living in Palm Springs, he continues to make musical appearances but at much lessened frequencies.

Interval Resistance Training

submitted by Jim LaFountain, All American Fitness Center

I'd like to share a life saving event that happened to me in 1986. One of our graduate school tasks was performing stress tests on fellow classmates. My results were troubling to me and my advisor, Dr. David Bacharach. My maternal and paternal grandfathers died of a heart attack and stroke in their mid 50's. My QRS Complex showed an irregularity in that very section of my heart that took both grandfathers. The QRS Complex is a part of an electrocardiogram (ECG) that represents the rapid electrical depolarization of the ventricles, leading to their contraction. Until then, I was struggling to select a topic for my senior project. Dr. Bacharach told me my cardiac irregularity needed to be addressed and hopefully corrected. He suggested I visit a Sports Medicine Center in Toronto, Canada.

I called the center and spoke with its director, who was very interested in my plight. I was treated like a dignitary when I arrived. Everyone seemed interested in this life saving project and did everything they could to accommodate me. My daily research began at 8:00 a.m. and concluded at 9:00 p.m. on both Friday and Saturday. After returning home, I met with my advisor, who critiqued my findings, asked a lot of questions, but overall, he thought I was on to something. The meeting was very productive. I began my eight week program immediately.

FITNESSCENTER

We named this new program Interval Resistance Training (IRT). After a warm-up, I performed two resistance exercises, focusing on opposing muscle groups, i.e., Chest Press and Lat Pulldowns, done to momentary muscular failure. A 2:30 minute bout of intense cardio (80-85 % of my heart rate maximum), followed by a :30 recovery, to allow for venous return. This sequence was followed for approximately 30 minutes, addressing all major muscle groups. My research suggested that noticeable results would take at least eight weeks.

I had never trained so hard. Combining intense cardio with resistance training was a major challenge for me. I was used to coasting through three hour workouts, six days a week, performing multiple sets, with sloppy form. I found I needed 48 hours to recover from each one of my intense IRT workouts. An interesting side note: my strength increased, even though my heart rate was high while doing resistance movements. Recent research is touting the value of weights, machines and even rubber tubing. In fact, they claim it's equally as essential as cardiovascular exercise.

Although the intensity was high and uncomfortable, I began to enjoy the brevity of the workout, 30 minutes in lieu of three hours. After eight weeks on the program, I scheduled my stress test with some trepidation. What if it didn't rid me of the heart irregularity? Although somewhat surprised, Dr. Bacharach was thrilled to show me my results. The troubling bleep on my QRS Complex was gone, never to return. It's been 39 years since my bleep-less stress test, but I still have concerns that it will return.

It's important to understand, high intensity IRT requires adequate (at least 48 hours) recovery following each workout. As I've aged, I can tolerate only two IRT's a week. When asked what a weekly schedule would look like, I stress the importance of having a "specific purpose" for each session. A workable schedule might look like this:

Sunday & Thursday medium intensity, longer cardio session (purpose: addressing the peripheries smaller vessels)

Tuesday & Saturday- high intensity IRT (purpose: addressing the heart, particularly the left ventricle)

Monday & Wednesday- resistance workout (purpose: muscular development)

Friday- rest (purpose: recovery)Although you may not share my genetic predisposition, including a couple IRT workouts a week will dramatically improve your level of fitness.





I want to begin by thanking everyone for your patience during our blacktop season. We apologize for the delays in paving some of the roads. The scheduling depended on the availability of the paving company, and we appreciate your understanding as we worked within their time frame.

Thank to everyone for getting your leaves out for pickup. The one-man leaf trucks are working extremely well again this season! They've been busy in every neighborhood, picking up leaves a couple of times each week. After the holidays, please remember to dispose of your live Christmas trees as soon as possible, so we can get them cleaned up and out of the way of the plows.

Our winter season started early this year, but our plow trucks, sanders, and brine anti/de-icing trucks were ready to go. These brine trucks are used before storms to help prevent snow and ice from bonding to the road surface, and after storms to speed up the melting process. Using liquid brine is much more cost-effective than traditional road salt. Whenever possible, we rely on brine anti/de-icing methods to help keep our roads safe while saving money.

Each winter, after snowstorms, we see piles of snow left in roadways when driveways are plowed out. Please

remember that New York State law prohibits moving or leaving snow or ice on any public roadway:

· NYS Vehicle & Traffic Law §1219 - It is unlawful to place or permit snow or ice to remain on a highway in a manner that endangers travel.

· NYS Highway Law §214 - It is unlawful to deposit snow or other materials onto the roadway of any public

These laws exist to prevent serious accidents caused by snow and ice left in the road. Snow piles can freeze into solid blocks, obstruct visibility, and create dangerous conditions for drivers, cyclists, and pedestrians.

Please remember that there is no parking on Town roads between 2:00 AM and 7:00 AM from October 1st through April 30th. This restriction allows our highway crews to effectively clear snow and ice from the roads during winter months. We also ask residents to keep the Town right-of-way clear of any objects, such as portable basketball hoops and other obstacles. Items left in the right-of-way can interfere with snow removal operations and may be damaged by plowing equipment. Thank you for your cooperation in helping to keep our roads safe and accessible for everyone this winter!

October was another busy month for your New Hartford Volunteer Fire Department as the members answered 98 alarms as indicated by the monthly call report listed below by category:

Fires = 4

EMS = 43

Hazardous = 8

Service Type = 12

Good Intent = 12

False Alarms = 19

Weather Related = 0

Other = 0



Total alarms for the Month of October 2025 = 98 bringing the total number of alarms year-to-date through October 31, 2025, to 990.

Of the 98 alarms, 80 were in the Town, 17 in the Village and one mutual aid.

Some of the alarms listed above - such as Fires, EMS, and Hazardous - are self -explanatory. Others such as Service, Good Intent and Other Alarms are not. Service Calls includes water or animal problems, public assistance or standbys. Good Intent refers to responding but did not find anything or canceled in route. Other alarms include explosions, carbon monoxide, smoke or sprinkler detector activations.

The figures above do not include other activities by members of the department such as Fire Prevention details, training, parades, Open House and other various department committee meetings that take place throughout the year.

From The Chief's Desk...

The Chief, officers, and members of The New Hartford Volunteer Fire Department, would like to remind everyone on a few fire prevention tips for a safe and festive holiday season.

For most of us, the holiday season represents a time for family and friends to gather together to enjoy the holiest time of the year. However, many of us consider that the holiday season is a time when there is an increased risk of home fires. Many households engage in holiday activities that serve as some of the leading causes of U.S. home fires, including cooking, Christmas trees, candles and holiday decorations also significantly contribute to the seasonal causes of home fires. Add to that the hectic nature of the holidays, when people are trying to accomplish multiple tasks at one time, and the chance for home fires grows even further.

Fortunately, with a little added awareness and some minor adjustments to holiday cooking and decorating, the season can remain festive and safe for everybody. With unattended cooking as the leading cause of U.S. home fires and home fire injuries, we recommend someone stays in the kitchen while you're frying, grilling or broiling food. Most cooking fires involve the stovetop, so keep anything that can catch fire away from it, and turn off the stove when you leave the kitchen, even if it's for a short period of time. If you're simmering, boiling, baking or roasting food, check it regularly and use a timer to remind you that you're cooking. The department also suggests creating a "kid-free zone" of at least three feet around the stove and areas where hot food and drinks are prepared or carried.

Candles are widely used in homes throughout the holidays, and December is the peak month for home candle fires. The nonprofit National Fire Protection Association's (NFPA) statistics show that more than half of all candle fires start because the candles had been too close to things that could catch fire. In fact during the month of December, 11% of home candle fires began with decorations compared to 4% the rest of the year. We encourage all New Hartford residents to consider using flameless candles, which look and smell like real candles. However, if you do use traditional candles, keep them at least 12" away from anything that can

burn, and remember to blow them out when you leave the room or go to bed. Use candle holders that are sturdy, won't tip over and are placed on uncluttered surfaces. Avoid using candles in the bedroom where two of five U.S. candle fires begin or other areas where people may fall asleep. Lastly, never leave a child alone in a room with a burning candle.

According to NFPA, U.S. fire departments annually respond to an average of 250 structure fires caused by Christmas trees. Nearly half of them are caused by electrical problems, and one in four resulted from a heat source that's too close to the tree. Things to consider for picking, placing and lighting the tree:

- \cdot If you have an artificial tree, be sure it's labeled, certified or identified by the manufacturer as fire-retardant.
- \cdot If you choose a fresh tree, make sure the green needles don't fall off when touched; before placing it in the stand, cut 1-2" from the base of the trunk. Add water to the tree stand, and be sure to water it daily.
- · Make sure the tree is not blocking an exit, and is at least three feet away from any heat source, like fireplaces, space heaters, radiators, candles and heat vents or lights.
- · Use lights that have the label of an independent testing laboratory, and make sure you know whether they are designed for indoor or outdoor use.
- · Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords, or loose bulb connections. Connect no more than three strands of mini-string sets and a maximum of 50 bulbs for screw-in bulbs.
- · Never use lit candles to decorate the tree.
- · Always turn off Christmas tree lights before leaving the home or going to bed.
- · Check on your community's Christmas tree recycling program.
- \cdot After Christmas, get rid of the tree. Dried-out trees are a fire hazard and should not be left in the home or garage, or placed outside the home.
- \cdot Bring outdoor electrical lights inside after the holidays to prevent hazards and make them last longer.

By following these fire prevention tips and measure, your New Hartford Volunteer Fire Department says you can greatly reduce the risk of fire in your home, and enjoy a safe holiday season.

Here are a few more Safety Tips from our Fire Prevention Committee:

- · Space Heaters: Keep anything that can burn, such as bedding, clothing and curtains away at least 3 feet away from the heater. Make sure the heater has an automatic shut off, so if it tips over it shuts off. Turn the heater off when you leave the room or go to bed. Plug portable heaters directly into outlets and never into an extension cord or power strip. Only use portable heaters from a recognized testing laboratory.
- \cdot Fireplace: Keep a glass or metal screen in front of the fireplace to prevent embers or sparks from jumping out. Do not burn papers in your fireplace. Make sure the fire is out before you go to bed or leave your house. Put ashes in a metal container with a lid outside at least 10 feet from your home.
- · Wood Stove: Make sure the wood stove is at least 3 feet from anything that can burn. Do not burn paper in your wood stove. Put the fire out before you go to sleep or leave your home. Have your chimney inspected and cleaned each year by a professional.
- · Furnace: Have your furnace inspected each year. Keep anything that can burn away from your furnace.
- · Kerosene Heaters: Only use kerosene heaters from a recognized testing laboratory. Make sure the heater has an automatic shut off, so if it tips over, it shuts off. Refuel your cooled heater outside never in your home. For additional information please visit www.nhfd.com

horse drawn sleigh. As humans gathered in greater collection in cities or towns like New Hartford, they required snow manipulation or removal, so different ways were created to ease our travels. Snow rollers were large, weighted wheels that were pulled by horse or oxen that would flatten the snow. Other ways included horse drawn plows. The accumulated snowbanks would cause a deployment of man muscle who would hand shovel the banks into horse drawn wagons for relocation to outer areas or dumped into rivers to melt. The first snowplow was invented and used in Milwaukee in 1862 and was pulled behind a horse drawn cart. The invention of motorized vehicles vastly improved ways of manipulating snow and removing it for an increased and advanced urban population. Why our grandparents could more easily walk five miles to school every day in a little less sized snow piles; however, they still walked in the blizzards uphill both to and from their school. I would suggest, dear reader, that you think of, and perform fun activities in the snow from our childhood. Drop to the ground and flap your arms and legs to make a snow angel, pack a wad of snow between your mitten-adorned hands to make a snowball to throw at your favorite person, roll large balls of snow in three different sizes and stack them on top of each other to make a snowman. 





That time of the year is quickly approaching. 

The Mohawk Valley Frontiers hosted the 40th Annual Senior Holiday Dinner on Saturday, November 1, 2025, from 10:00 AM to 1:00 PM at the Carol Croomes BECA Community Center, serving more than 200 fresh, home-cooked meals to seniors across the community.

Volunteers shared that "it's not just about having enough food; it's about the effort you put in to make it happen — that's the real story." Retired social worker Rich Davis lovingly roasted three turkeys for the event, proudly texting photos throughout the day. He said that preparing them took dedication — "about three hours each, though one took four because I adjusted the temperature to cook it faster." Volunteers noted that Rich finds joy in roasting the birds every year, and his commitment "perfectly describes the essence of volunteering."

Meals were served at the community center and delivered to homebound seniors. U'nice Elliott Jefferson personally drove meals to shut-in and disabled elders, ensuring everyone was included.

The Jr. Frontiers assisted throughout the event — helping prepare and distribute meals, then heading into their Saturday SAT prep, demonstrating leadership, discipline, and service to community.

There are efforts to keep this lost art alive with schools and training programs that are trying to entice new entrants to the field. So far the numbers of individuals interested in pursuing this field is not overwhelming. We can only hope that more will consider it.
